Long-Time Vivian Resident Died in Anson Hospital

Egbert Fish, 83, long-time resident of the Vivian community, died in an Anson hospital Tuesday of last week. Mr. Fish had gone to Anson to visit his daughter for the holidays when he succumbed.

Funeral services were held at 10:30 a. m. Thursday, Dec. 30, from the First Methodist Church in Crowell. L. E. Fooks, Church of Christ Minister of Hereford, and Ole Prescott, Minister of the Paducah Church of Christ, where Mr. Fish was a member, officiated. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery under the direction of Womack Funeral Home.

Mr. Fish was born June 27, 1882, in Williamson County. He moved with his family to Callahan County for a time and then moved to Foard County in 1901. He was married to Miss Lucy Gallup on June 29, 1904. Mrs. Fish preceded her husband in death.

He was active as a farmer and rancher until a short time ago. Surviving are two sons, Herbert Fish of Vivian and Henry Fish of Crowell; three daughters, Mrs. Jewel Sosebee of Anson, Miss Rosalie Fish of Abilene and Miss Bernita Fish of Paducah; one brother, H. H. Fish and one sister, Mrs. C. S. Lewis, both of Paducah; six grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

N. J. Roberts Died Dec. 28 Following Lengthy Illness

Funeral Services Held Last Thursday at Methodist Church

N. J. Roberts, resident of this area since 1885, died in the Foard County Hospital Tuesday of last week following a long illness.

Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church at 2 p. m. Thursday with Rev. M. H. Abbott, pastor, officiating. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery under the direction of the Womack Funeral Home.

Funeral bearers were Moody Bursley, T. S. Haney, John Cogdell, Clinton McLain, Mike Rasberry and Foster Davis.

Mr. Roberts was born in Cooke County January 19, 1881, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Roberts. He came to what was then Hardeman County with his parents in 1885. His father, a lawyer and Methodist preacher, was the second county judge of Hardeman County and was one of the founders of Foard County in 1891.

On April 23, 1906, Mr. Roberts was married to the former Miss Ellen Young in Crowell. He retired in 1957 from the abstract business his father formed in 1895.

Mr. Roberts served on the Selective Service boards for Foard County during both World Wars. He was a volunteer worker with the National Youth Administration and the Texas Relief Commission, which was absorbed by the WPA in the 30's. He served on the local school board from 1931 to 1936.

He had been a member of the Crowell Methodist Church since 1891, and a member of its official board and trustee for more than 50 years. He was a past Worshipful Master of the Crowell Masonic Lodge and past Worshipful Patron of the Eastern Star. He was Foard County Democratic chairman for more than two decades.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Dr. Tom R. Roberts of Dallas and Joe Y. Roberts of Fort Worth; five brothers, John C. Roberts, Col. Standlee Roberts, Pat N. Roberts and Dr. Ector Roberts of Denton and Ben Roberts of Greenwood, La.; two sisters, Mrs. M. T. Linecum of Lubbock and Mrs. Claude Donaldson of Tahoka; three grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Farmers Asked to Send in Social Security Numbers to ASCS Office

Farmers who are receiving payments in connection with participation in farm-action programs are being asked to let the ASCS county office know what their social security numbers are.

According to Ray Hysinger, who is chairman of the county committee, a form requesting this information—"Request for Identifying Number—Farmer"—together with a postage-paid envelope, has been mailed to each known producer who receives program payments, to be filled in and returned to the ASCS county office as soon as convenient.

He explained that, beginning January 1, 1966, the identifying social security numbers will be entered on payment-drafts to producers, and they will also be used by the Department of Agriculture in reporting such payments to the Internal Revenue Service. Such identifying numbers now appear on all reports of income payments—such as bank interest, dividends, etc.—made by the paying companies or agencies. This is required under the Internal Revenue Code.

Any questions about this matter should be taken up with the ASCS county committee.

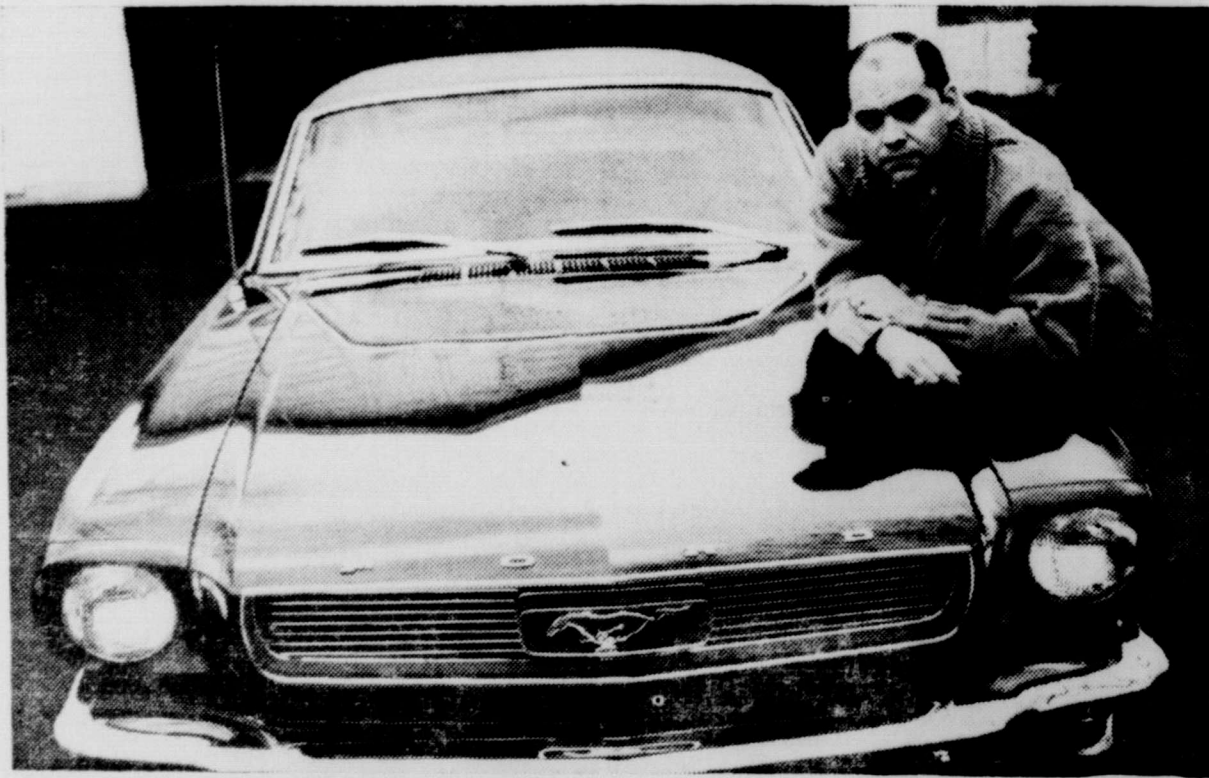

THIRTY YEARS AGO

During 1935, there were 44 marriage certificates issued in Foard County while divorces during the same period totaled seven.





"Farmer's Tax Guide" Now Available

The 1966 edition of the "Farmer's Tax Guide," prepared especially for farmers to use in working up their 1965 income tax reports, is available at local county extension offices or from offices of the Internal Revenue Service reports County Agent Joe Burkett.

It would be hard to place value on this publication, explain the county agent. It is written and illustrated for farmer use and is just about a must for tax filing purposes, Burkett adds.

One of its most useful sections is the example tax return. On this simple tax return, Schedule B, D, and F are used. Also the major form of all, Schedule 1041 is shown with the completed return and computed tax. Each step in preparing the return is illustrated and explained, Burkett says.

Every tax payer who receives two-thirds of his gross income from farming is due to file his return and pay the tax by Feb. 15, 1966, unless he files an estimate and pays this amount by January 17, 1966.
