THIRTY YEARS AGO

A certain amount of tree planting, under the Shelterbelt program, will be permitted this year in Foard County, officials state. About a ten-mile strip of sandy land in the Rayland and Riverside area is the probable location of the planting program in this county.

The Haliburton Oil Well Cementing Co. of Lawton, Okla., had to be called in to kill the well.

Arrest of one negro man and the aid of medical service to another was the result of a cutting scrape in the colored section of Crowell about 2:30 Sunday morning.
