Funeral Services Held at Margaret Tuesday Afternoon

Mrs. Louis Kempf, 77, a longtime resident of the Margaret community, died Sunday in the Taylor Rest Home in Vernon after a long illness.

Funeral services were held from the Methodist Church in Margaret Tuesday afternoon, March 8, at 2 o'clock conducted by Rev. E. H. Martin, pastor.

Interment was in the Big Valley Cemetery, with arrangements by Womack Funeral Home.

Mrs. Sadie Amelia Kempf was born at Corsicana Nov. 25, 1888, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Carl Drieschner. She was married to Louis Kempf Nov. 25, 1908, in Wilbarger County and they moved to their farm near Margaret where they had lived since.

Mr. Kempf died Sept. 13, 1963. She was a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors are one son, Richard Kempf of Farmers Valley; two daughters, Mrs. James Bowers of Margaret and Mrs. Floyd Ferguson of Crowell, and two grandchildren; and one great grandchild.

Judge Davis to Attend College of State Trial Judges

Judge Laurance M. Hyde Jr., Dean of the National College of State Trial Judges, at the University of Nevada and the University of Colorado, has announced that Judge Tom Davis of the 16th Judicial District of Texas, has been granted a fellowship to attend the National College of State Trial Judges at the session to be held in Boulder, Colo., from August 1 through 26, 1966.

The National College of State Trial Judges is sponsored by the Section of Judicial Administration of the American Bar Association. Justice Tom C. Clark of the Supreme Court of the United States, is chairman of the board of directors of the National College, consisting of eight other eminent jurists, professors of law, appellate and trial judges, and lawyers throughout the United States. Judge Laurance M. Hyde Jr., the Dean of the National College, was formerly a trial judge in St. Louis, Mo., prior to his appointment in 1965.

The selection of Judge Davis by the Committee on Admissions to receive his fellowship is an honor and a credit to his outstanding record as a trial judge for this judicial district.

Tax Collections Reported "Good" for Crowell School

Names Drawn for Candidates' Places on Ballot

At the March meeting of the Crowell School Board last Monday night, it was voted to buy \$1,262.41 worth of new books for the school libraries. This money will be reimbursed to the school under Title II of the federal education program.

February bills for the school were okayed for payment by the board.

The board approved the hiring of Glenn Shook to assess taxes in the rural areas of Foard County.

The board drew names for the order in which the four candidates for the board will appear on the ballot in the election to be held at the city hall April 2. The names will appear in the following order: (1) Cecil Driver; (2) R. C. Daniel; (3) Elton Carroll; (4) Roy M. Whitley.

Absentee voting for the trustee election will begin March 14.

Mrs. Marjorie Taylor, school board secretary, announced that tax collections from February 1 through March 7 were \$991.68 in current taxes and \$347.74 in delinquent taxes. She said that total collection for 1965 were about \$135,000 which is about 95 percent of the taxes assessed last year.

L. A. Andrews, retiring school secretary, did not attend the Monday night meeting. Mr. Andrews said Tuesday it was the first board meeting he had not attended since 1927.

The next regular meeting will be held in the home economics cottage with supper being served board members.

OTER REGISTRATION NOW IN PROGRESS

to the poll tax must register, and then only if they have not already paid a poll tax this year.

Registration may be made in the office of W. F. Bradford, tax assessor-collector either in person or by mail. Mail registration requests must reach the local office before midnight, March 17.

The registration period got underway March 3 and will end at midnight, March 17.

Anyone who is not subject to the poll tax—that is, they are over the maximum age or are just receiving their first vote—need not register.

The regular poll tax receipt form is being used in the voter registration, with the following words stamped on the form: "Conditional Voter Registration Certificate."

An application form for voter registration can be found on page 6 of this issue for use by anyone wishing to.

Sheriff W. F. Bradford reported that eight persons had registered under the new law up to Monday noon.

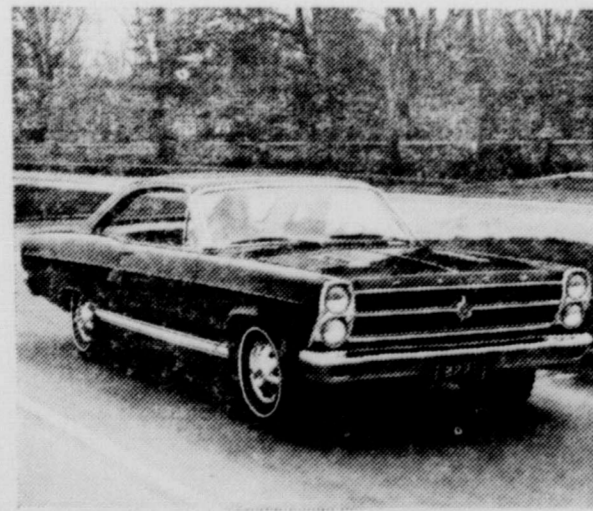

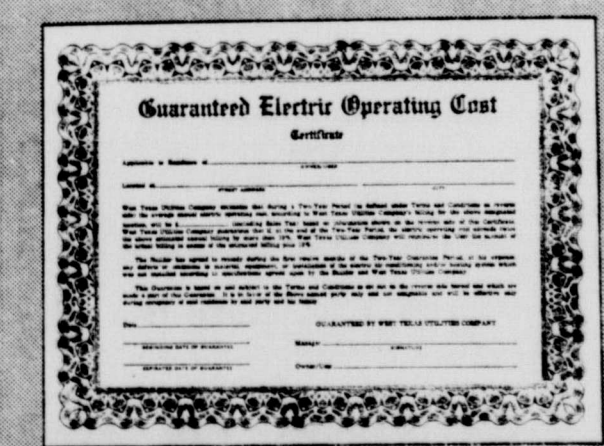

Tests Show Heavy Infestation of Boll Weevils

At the cotton meeting held in Crowell Tuesday night of last week, Norman Drake, Wilbarger County Agent, told those present about a sample survey made in that county recently to determine the extent of the over-wintering of the boll weevil. Samples of trash and weeds were collected—about 500 in all—and taken to a room with a heated table. Mr. Drake said that after the trash had been warmed, Mr. Boll Weevil, thinking it was summertime, began to move about. The actual number of live boll weevils were counted then, and in a survey in the Rayland community, there were found to be 2,968 weevils per acre. About the highest count obtained was in a shelterbelt that showed over 5,000 boll weevils per acre.

R. R. Kelly of Stamford, in his talk about the Jones County uniform planting project said that only 30 acres of the 87,570 acres of cotton in the county were not planted during the specified period last year. Some farmers who had already planted their cotton when the plan was begun, plowed up their cotton and re-planted so as to cooperate with the project.

In speaking of cotton, Mr. Kelly pointed out that last year cotton added some \$741,890,000 to the economy of Texas.

J. C. Hays, who assisted with the Jones County program last year, told the group how, using charts and graphs, the best time for planting was determined.

In the balloting of Foard County cotton farmers at the end of the program, those present voted 100 per cent for the program. The ballot also asked the farmers to select what they considered

Widows' S. S. Benefits

Recent changes in the social security law make it possible for widows age 60 or 61 to receive benefits reduced slightly from the full benefit payable at age 62.

Attorney General Explains New Voter Registration

Following is the text of a letter from Attorney General Waggoner Carr to all county tax assessor-collectors of Texas. It clarifies some points as to the voter registration now in progress.

Last Saturday, February 24, the Federal District Court hearing the Texas Poll Tax Case granted the State's request for a 10-day stay of its original decree declaring the poll tax to be unconstitutional. I requested this stay in order to give our State a reasonable time in which to put the Registration Act passed by the recent

Special Session of the Legislature into effect. As a result, persons subject to the poll tax who had not registered prior to February 1, 1964, either by obtaining a "poll tax not paid" receipt for voting in federal elections cannot vote at any election held before March 24, 1964, but can vote at elections held on or after that date, if otherwise qualified, by registering during the 10-day period beginning on March 3, 1964, and ending on March 17, 1964.

Without this stay it would have been impossible to protect the honesty of our elections from anyone who wanted to vote under a fictitious name or vote in more than one polling place since we would not have had time to let our citizens register and get an alphabetical list of those who registered into the hands of the local election judges throughout the State.

The U. S. Attorney General fought our request for the stay. Furthermore, he attacked the new registration law stating that the 15 days allowed for registration was not a sufficient time to afford everyone who might want to register a reasonable chance to do so. I answered the Attorney General of the United States by stating to the court that I was sure the court could depend on the Tax Assessor-Collectors of Texas to do their clear-out duty to provide a reasonable opportunity to register everyone in their respective counties. I renewed my confidence in you both, at the insistence of the Justice Department, the court returned jurisdiction of the case to allow the Justice Department to make further complaints to the court in the event the 15 days actually proved to be insufficient time. In this connection the court said, "The Court has taken into consideration the obligation of all officials of the State of Texas and each of its counties, including the Tax Assessor-Collectors of the respective counties to afford full and adequate facilities for registration during said period after having given adequate publicity to the right of all persons to so register and the times and places that deputies will be available for such purpose. Such facilities and opportunity to register shall be commensurate with that afforded by the permanent annual registration machinery contemplated in and prescribed by S. B. 1."

I respectfully make the following recommendations to you:

(1) Application for the conditional Voter Registration Certificate may be made by mail. Such applications must be actually delivered to the tax collector by midnight March 17.

(2) We anticipate there will be considerable misunderstanding among voters and potential voters as to who should and should not apply for a conditional Voter Registration Certificate. We suggest you request your local news media to give publicity to the following information:

(a) Persons who were subject to paying the poll tax during the period which ended on January 31, 1964, in order to be qualified to vote in the 1964 elections, but who did not pay the poll tax or obtain a "poll tax not paid" (for voting in federal elections) should now register.

(b) Persons holding a paid poll tax receipt, a receipt stamped "poll tax not paid" (for voting in federal elections) or those who have received an exemption certificate do not need to register and should not be allowed to do so.

(Editor's note: this is not the complete letter, but contains those portions which are of interest and apply to Foard County residents.)

In this connection the court said, "The Court has taken into consideration the obligation of all officials of the State of Texas and each of its counties, including the Tax Assessor-Collectors of the respective counties to afford full and adequate facilities for registration during said period after having given adequate publicity to the right of all persons to so register and the times and places that deputies will be available for such purpose. Such facilities and opportunity to register shall be commensurate with that afforded by the permanent annual registration machinery contemplated in and prescribed by S. S. 1."

I respectfully make the following recommendations to you:

(1) Application for the conditional Voter Registration Certificate may be made by mail. Such applications must be actually delivered to the tax collector by midnight March 17.

(2) We anticipate there will be considerable misunderstanding among voters and potential voters as to who should and should not apply for a conditional Voter Registration Certificate. We suggest you request your local news media to give publicity to the following information:

(a) Persons who were subject to paying the poll tax during the period which ended on January 31, 1966, in order to be qualified to vote in the 1966 elections, but who did not pay the poll tax or obtain a "poll tax not paid" (for voting in federal elections) should now register.

(b) Persons holding a paid poll tax receipt, a receipt stamped "poll tax not paid" (for voting in federal elections) or those who have received an exemption certificate do not need to register and should not be allowed to do so.

(Editor's note: this is not the complete letter, but contains those portions which are of interest and apply to Foard County residents.)
