## FIRE INSURANCE GOES UP IN CITY OF CROWELL

Mayor Robert Kincaid told members of the Crowell Volunteer Fire Department Monday night that the effect of Crowell being declared an unprotected town in regard to fire insurance will be felt in the pocketbooks of local residents, and the mayor offered several suggestions on possible ways this situation can be improved.

Although poor attendance at fire drills is only a part of the factors involved in the rating, the mayor said that each business will be contacted and asked to sponsor one man at fire department meetings at least once a month. Fire extinguishers in local businesses will be checked.

The city secretary will call each

member of the department on the afternoon preceding the night's meeting to remind them of fire practice. A check will also be made of arson reward signs posted over town.

Following an inspection by the State Insurance Board shortly after the first of the year, Crowell's key rate was jumped from .58 to .83, effective February 8.

Although Crowell is rated as unprotected, the key rate of .83 is still below the maximum of \$1.00 which can be placed on towns in Texas. J. T. Hughston gave an illustration of the cost of the raise Tuesday. He said that a home owners policy on an \$8,000 home with \$3,200 in furniture would be increased \$62.00 over a 3-year period.

Other causes for the insurance raise as cited by the state include inadequate water storage, and water mains being too small.

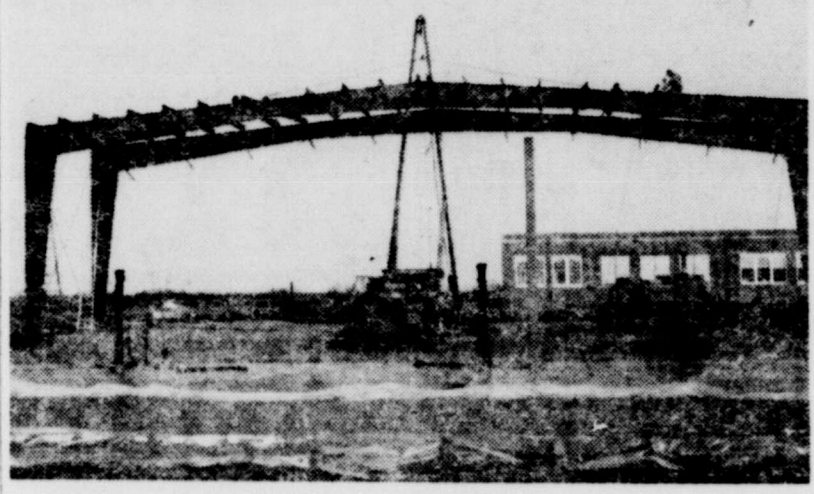
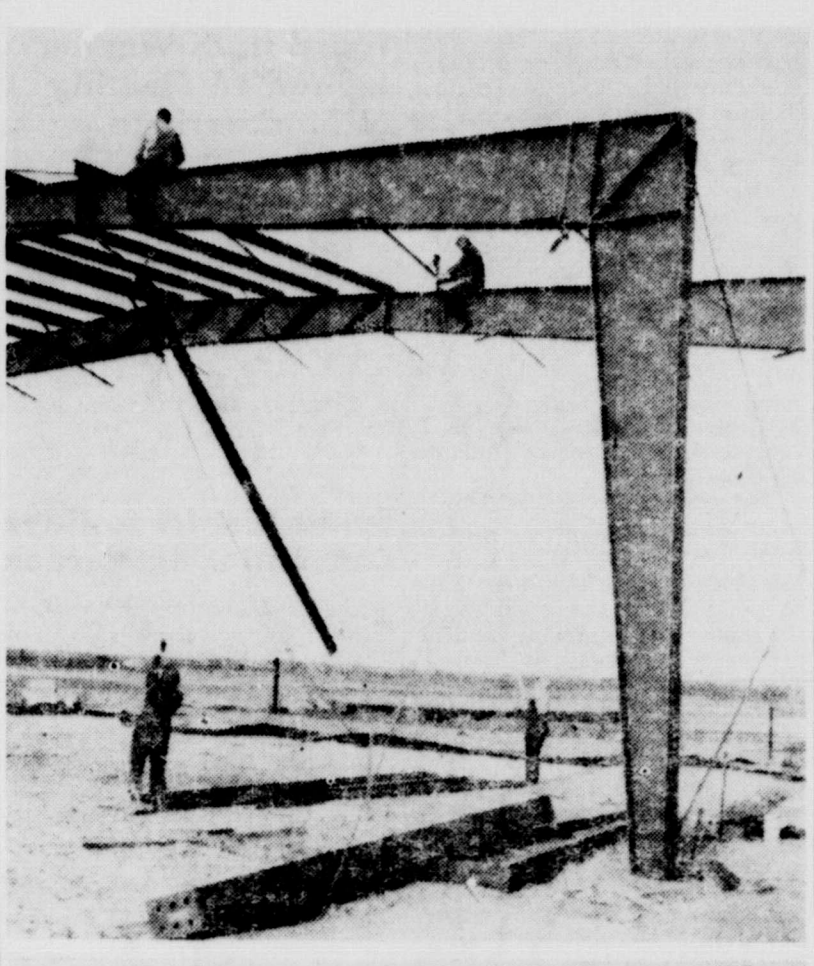

Common errors in filing federal tax returns complicate the processing of taxpayers' refunds, said Ellis Campbell Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue in northern Texas.

Simple errors on returns delay refunds and cause taxpayers trouble.

Mr. Campbell suggests this simple checklist:

1. Check arithmetic.
2. Attach all Forms W-2.
3. Sign your return. (Both husband and wife should sign a joint return.)
4. Print or type name and address, and write figures plainly.
5. Use correct tax table.
6. Total your deduction if you itemize on page 2.
7. List your social security number correctly. (Both husband's and wife's number should be reported on joint return.)

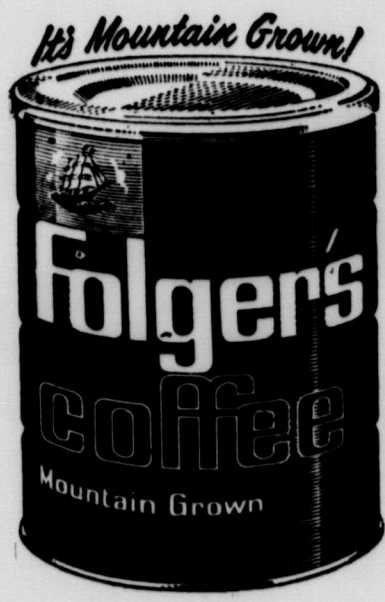
