Total of 93 Foard County Residents Register to Vote

These 93, added to the 669 Foard residents who paid poll taxes, will give the county a voting strength of 762—which does not include exemptions due to age.

Cotton Growers Reminded of 1966 Signup Deadline

Cotton farm operators are reminded of the fast-approaching deadline for signing up to take part in the 1966 upland cotton program. The last day for filing a program application is Friday, April 1.

Ray Hysinger, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Foard Committee, emphasizes the importance of signing up before the deadline. Program benefits include diversion payments and price-support payments in addition to the regular cotton price-support loan. But all program benefits, including the cotton loan, will be available only to farmers who sign up and then carry out the intentions indicated in the application.

If the producer wishes, he may request half of the estimated diversion payment to be made in advance at the time of the signup or as soon thereafter as possible. The rest of the diversion payment and the price-support payment will be made later after program performance has been determined.

Each of the teenagers from Crowell, Thalia, Truscott and their guests visited the wishing well.

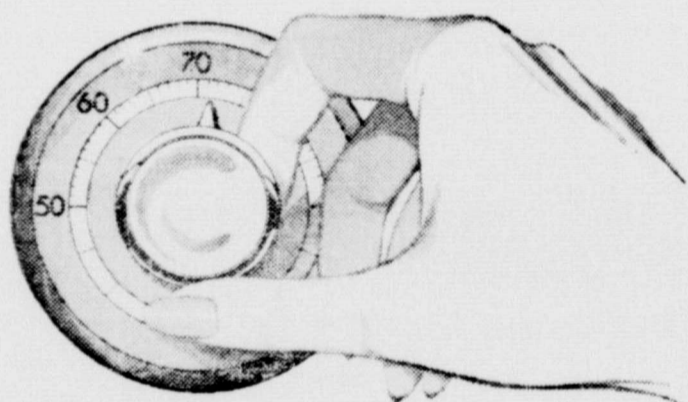
