



Let the News send it ifting and carrying of fertilizer in for you. bags. With proper equipment, liquid fertilizers can be applied very accurately and combine easily with many herbicides, fumi-

gants and insecticides. Disadvantages of liquids are that they require special application equipment and storage facilities; and some nitrogen solutions must be handled under presure. Also, with variations in temperature there is some chance the dissolved solids may "salt out" resulting in clogging of storage facilities and application equip-

Most agronomists agree the se of liquid fertilizer will continue to increase, but any advantage they enjoy lies in convenience and ease of handling and not in any special agronomic value, concludes Burkett.


