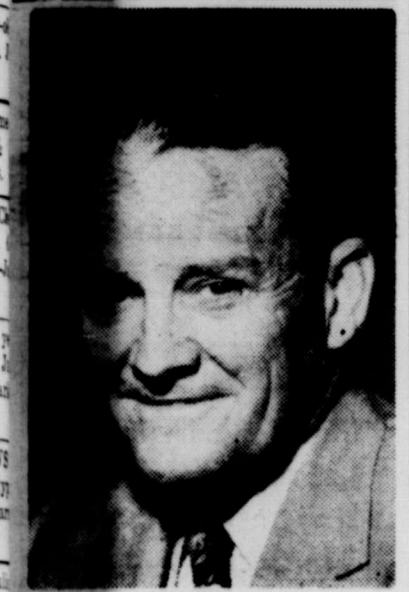

Mrs. R. R. Magee, life-time resident of Foard County, died in the Foard County Hospital at 10 p. m. Saturday after a long illness. Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon from the First Methodist Church conducted by Rev. M. H. Abbott, pastor. Mrs. Howard Ferguson provided vocal selections for the services.

Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge. Serving as pall bearers were DuWayne Elliott, Charles Branch, Ray Shirley, Cecil Driver, Mike Bird and Bill Klepper.

Mrs. Magee was born March 23, 1888, in Margaret, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Allee. Her father was the first sheriff of Hardeman County when the county seat was at Old Margaret.

She was married to R. R. Magee in Crowell on Nov. 22, 1911. She was an active member of the Methodist Church from girlhood until ill health prevented. Survivors include her husband; two sons, Milton Magee of Rock Island, Ill., and Joe M. Magee of Houston; one sister, Mrs. Carrie Hart of Crowell; and seven grandchildren, three of whom resided in her home until recently: Ernest, Rudy and Jo Beth Magee, of Houston.

The company which is leasing the land is the Aard Copper Co. of Las Vegas, Nevada. ## Chevrolts Give Fuel Economy in 1966 Mobil Run

Chevrolet has staked out a claim for superior fuel economy on the results of the 1966 annual Mobil Economy Run.

Full-sized Chevrolts won classes "E" and "F" for standard-sized cars with six and eight-cylinder engines, respectively, and won a second place in class "F" as well.

In class "A" where compact six-cylinder cars competed, a Corvair Monza finished third overall, getting 23.25 miles per gallon on the 3,300-mile trip from Los Angeles to Boston.

A six-cylinder Biscayne piloted by a mother-daughter team, Pat and Pam Sawyer, Hemet, Calif., won class "E" with an average of 21.04 miles per gallon.

In class "F" the winner was a Chevrolet Impala with 327 cu. in. V-8 engine in which Ron Royer, Encino, Calif., averaged 19.87 miles per gallon. Second place winner was Paul Prior, Troy, Mich., who averaged 18.68 miles per gallon in a Chevrolet Caprice with a 396 cu. in. V-8 engine.

## Social Security Numbers Must Be Reported

Dallas—Northern Texas taxpayers were reminded this week that the law requires them to list their Social Security number on their federal income tax return.

Where a husband and wife file a joint return, they should list both numbers in the spaces provided on page 1 of the 1965 federal income tax return.

Ellis Campbell Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for northern Texas, said that omission of the number delays the processing of the return, and inconveniences both the taxpayer and the government.

If you do not have a social security number, application form SS-5 may be obtained from your local Internal Revenue Service office, Social Security Administration office, or most post offices. You should file the application as soon as possible.

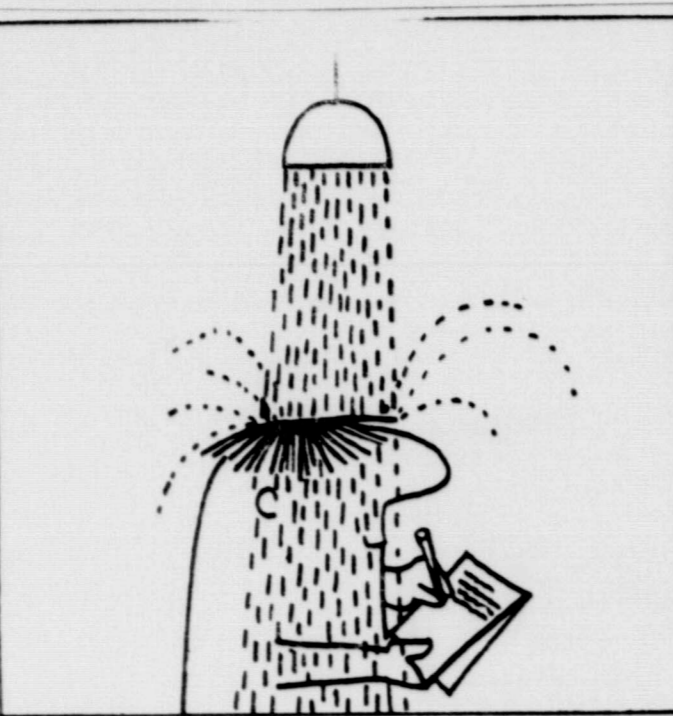

hunting the game birds. Dove hunting showed the greatest increase in leasing activity. There was some overlap in deer, dove, and quail leasing, said Klussmann. In 1965, about 3,000 private lakes were leased for fishing. Total return for the lake owners was about three quarters of a million dollars, according to the report. The average rate for fishing on a daily basis was about \$1 per fisherman. The family charge for annual fishing leases varied from \$25 to \$500.

## Many Vehicles Still Not Safety Checked

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reported this week the owners of more than one and one-quarter million motor vehicles still need to have them safety checked at official inspection stations before their current inspection stickers expire on April 15.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr. said this means Texas' 5,350 inspection stations must collectively check over 65,000 vehicles per day in order to meet the deadline.

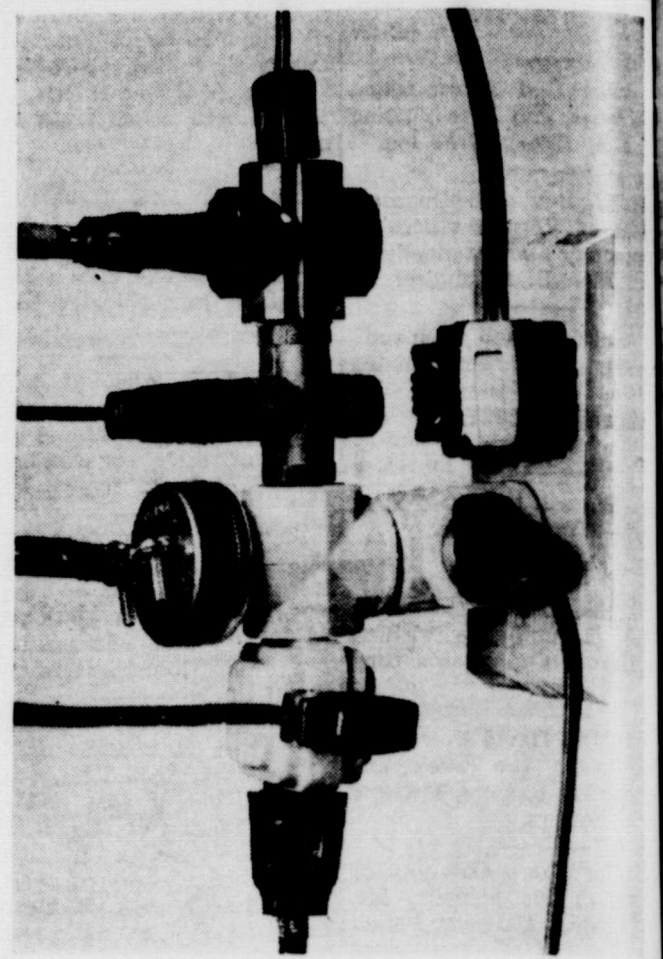
"This breaks down to an average of 12 cars per day per station," Garrison said. "And although this may seem like a small enough number to run through each station, it adds up to a total of over 1,378,000 individual vehicles."

He pointed out that the load on some inspection stations is greater than on others, resulting in the development of frustrating waiting lines in some places as the deadline approaches.

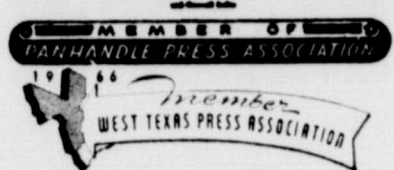

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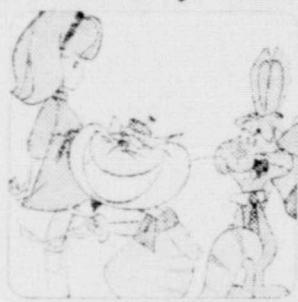

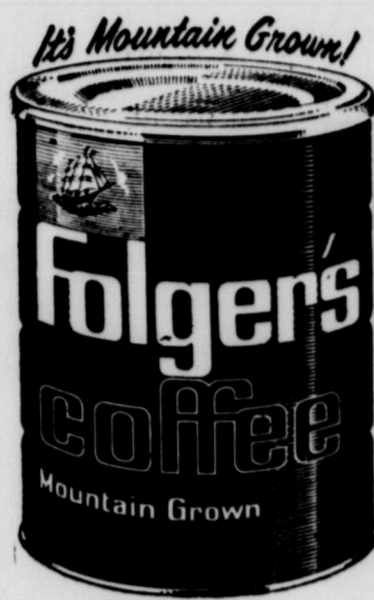
