### C. H. S. Qualifies Seven for Regional Track Meet

The Crowell Wildcat track team finished third in the district track meet Saturday, April 2. The number one and two finishers in each event will go to the Region II meet to be held in Denton on April 16, where winners will be determined for the state meet in Austin May 6.

Crowell qualified seven boys to the regional meet. The 440-yard relay consisting of Lee Looney, Paul Campbell, T. F. Lambert and Dan Mike Bird won first place honors with a time of 46.2. Dan Mike was the only double event winner in the meet, taking the 100-yard dash in 10.9 and the 220-yard dash with a time of 23.6. George Myers won second in the 880. Baldemar Brown won second in the mile run. The mile relay consisting of Paul Campbell, George Myers, Don Bill Statter and T. F. Lambert, won second place. These boys will represent the district at Denton.

The times in all events were hampered by a 40-50 mile-per-hour wind. Only one meet record fell and it was in the pole vault with the wind to the boy's back. Other boys placing in the meet were T. F. Lambert, third in the 440; Paul Campbell, third, and Lee Looney, fifth in the 100-yard dash; Randy Adkins, sixth in the 220-yard dash.

Other boys participating in the meet, but failing to place, were Randy Smith in the shot put and discus; Steve Bell in the shot put and discus; Rickey Evenson, broad jump and 220; Ronnie Evenson, high jump, broad jump and 180 low hurdles; Billy Hord, high jump, broad jump and 440-yard dash.

In the grade school division, Barry Branch won fourth in the 100 yard dash and fifth in the 220-yard dash. Gary Eddy ran the 330-yard dash and entered the broad jump. Jim Tom Smith ran the 100 and 220 yard dash.

Coaches Thayne Amnett and L. H. Wall and Manager Jimmy Gillespie accompanied the boys to Holliday.

### Junior Mechell Second High Individual in 4-H Land Judging Contest

Junior Mechell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Mechell, was the second high scoring individual in the 4-H Land Judging contest at District 4-H elimination contest held in Wichita Falls Saturday of last week.

This recognition was not given to Junior in the 4-H article in last week's paper.

A one-car crash about 4.3 miles west of Crowell Saturday night claimed the life of Mrs. Zelma Wheeler Britt, 24, of Lubbock.

The accident, which happened about 9 p. m., also injured the husband, Thomas Britt. The couple's children, Bethanna Dawn 4, and Warren Devon, 11 months, were uninjured. Mr. Britt was brought to the Crowell hospital, and was moved by ambulance to Lubbock Sunday.

According to the investigating patrolmen, Chester Fant and Stanley Hill, the car, which was traveling east, hit a concrete bridge and Mrs. Britt was thrown from the vehicle. She was a former resident of Wichita Falls.

An Electra truck driver was the first to arrive at the scene of the wreck.

The family was en route to Iowa Park for a family reunion at the time of the accident. The late-model car was a total loss.

**Jack Hightower  
 Makes Statement  
 on His Candidacy**

State Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon today formally announced his candidacy in the Democratic primary for re-election to a second term in the Texas Senate. He seeks election in the new 30th Senatorial District which includes Foard County.

Senator Hightower, 39, was the choice of a wide margin of voters in 1964 to succeed the well-

known Sen. George Moffett of Chillicothe.

During his first term in the Senate, Sen Hightower became well known as an effective and dedicated legislator. He has achieved the enviable record of appointment as chairman of an important committee and a member of twelve of the Senate's committees, some of the most important of which are water and conservation; finance, state affairs, counties, cities and towns, and agriculture and livestock. He has been named by the lieutenant governor to two interim committees to make studies of the Texas election laws and the needs of the nursing profession in Texas. The findings and recommendations of these committees will be made



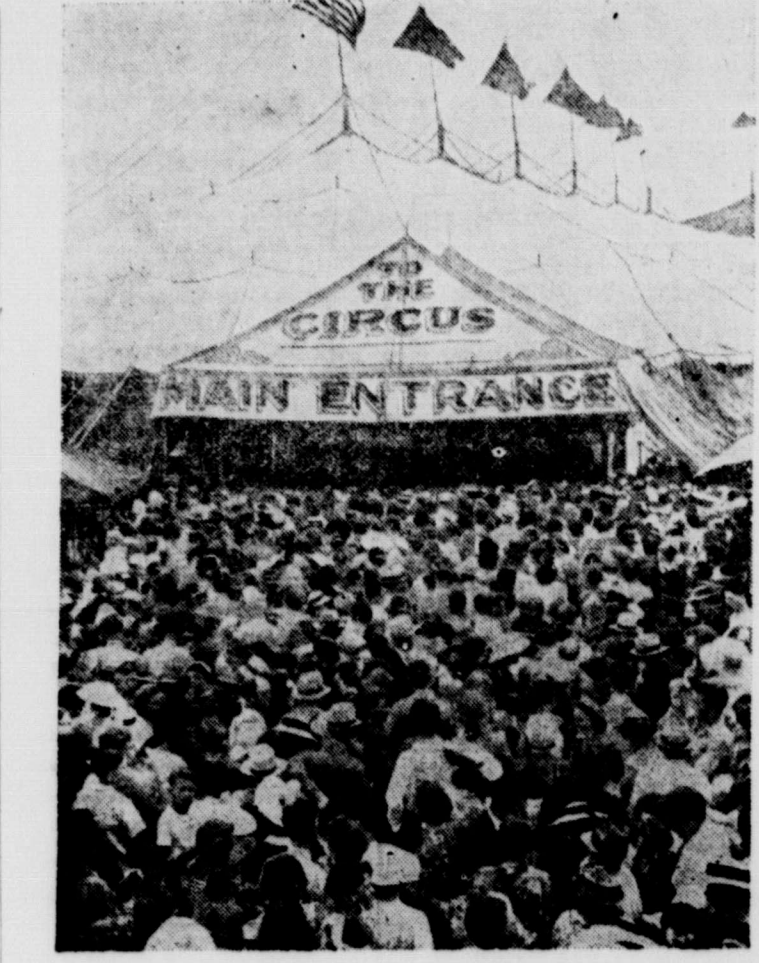

to the next legislature.

Sen. Hightower's distinguished service earned his appointment by Gov. Connally as a delegate to the Southern Regional Education Board Conference on Higher Education. His effectiveness has been fully demonstrated in his support of important legislative measures concerning water and soil conservation, education, law enforcement, water and air pollution, health, etc.

Sen. Hightower has an impressive record of public service. He served two years in the Texas House of Representatives and seven years as district attorney. In 1957 he was appointed by the governor to the Texas Law Enforcement Study Commission, and at the time of his election to the Texas Senate, was vice chairman of the board of regents of Midwestern University.

A native of Memphis, where his mother, Mrs. Walter Hightower, still resides, Sen. Hightower moved to Vernon in 1951 to begin the practice of law upon his graduation from Baylor University.

He served in the U. S. Navy during World War II. He is a leader in civic, religious and fraternal affairs on the local and state level. He and his wife have three daughters, Ann, Amy and Alison. mately 60 per cent of whom live in that part of the new district heretofore represented by Sen. Hightower and approximately 40 per cent live in that part of the district heretofore represented by another senator.

I have been privileged to know many people all over the wide area that is now the 30th district. I hope to become better acquainted with many hundreds more during this campaign. My promise is to serve you sincerely," Senator Hightower said.

**Will a Bride Use Her College Degree?**

There is a practical value to sending a girl through college, says Extension Home Management Specialists Mrs. Doris Myers and Mrs. Elsie Short of Texas A&M University.

This is demonstrated later in life, when the children are less dependent on their mothers. Many women then discover that the demands of the home do not use up all of their energies.

Mary Dublin Keyserling, director of the Women's Bureau of the U. S. Department of Labor, pointed out recently that women are marrying earlier these days. As a consequence, one out of two will be sending their last child off to school by the time they are 35. It is at this time that many women begin to feel restless and need an outlet for their talents and skills.

Surveys reveal that women want to spend this time in as constructive a manner as possible; thus they seek employment. Since 1940, the number of women between the ages of 35 and 44 with jobs has more than doubled and the number between 45 and 54 has tripled.

A woman whose family responsibilities have tapered off will learn that her college degree may not immediately guarantee her a responsible position. Many women have found that they must up-date old skills and knowledge. Former training makes this brush-up period not only shorter but easier. Many women go back to school to up-date their education and add confidence to their approach before seeking employment.

One job survey found that women were unsure of themselves if they had not held a job before, or if their last job dated back ten years.

If they look to the generation of women who immediately preceded them, today's woman will find that a college education greatly improves the chances of securing a job. Among college educated women 45 to 54 years old, seven out of ten now hold jobs and the chances improve with a year or more of schooling beyond college.

**High Fixed Costs Make Efficient Production a Must**

Today's high fixed farming costs make efficient production a must. High costs necessitate high yields for maximum profits and soil testing is needed, says County Agent Joe Burkett, in order to keep soil producing at top levels and to get the most from liming and fertilizing.

A recommendation from the soil testing lab takes into account the plant nutrients already available in the soil and adds those necessary to balance the nutrients for most efficient production. If the recommendations are changed by the producer, the nutrient balance is not maintained, explains Burkett. In some cases this change may not be serious, but in others, it can be disastrous.

Burkett says he is a firm believer in the old saying, "the most profitable fertilizer dollar is the one spent for a soil test." There is still time to get soil tested before spring planting but samples must be taken very soon and mailed to a testing lab.

## Kaufman Firm Is Apparent Low Bidder on Greenbelt Project

The A. N. Adams Construction Co. of Kaufman was apparent low bidder Tuesday of last week for the largest contract on the final phase of the \$11 million Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority project.

The Kaufman firm bid \$1,795,514 for work on the dam.

Brown-McKee Inc. of Lubbock bid \$2,494,941 for construction of the filtering plant, and the J. T. Brodie Construction Co. bid \$1,230,180 for work on the supply line. No decision was made on a contract for pumps. Officials said the contract would be about \$35,000.

Only 40 construction firms, compared with an expected 144, submitted bids. After all bids were read to more than 400 area residents who gathered on the Clarendon Junior College gymnasium, engineering officials took the figures to Fort Worth for tabulation. Contracts were let late last week.

The authority received 156 preliminary applications to bid for the work, and 144 firms had announced they would bid. But only the 40 actually submitted offers.

The final construction phase will consist of building an earthen dam, erecting a filtration plant and laying a pipeline which will ultimately furnish water to Clarendon, Hedley and Crowell.

A collection point was completed on Lake Creek, north of Lelia Lake, last summer to provide water for Childress and Quannah.

## Many Texas Vehicles Still Must Be Inspected

Approximately three million Texas vehicles will be inspected by Friday, April 15, inspected as required by the order of Captain Alan J. Commander of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Department of Public Safety.

"In the remaining days of the inspection period, it is expected that the state's 5,350 inspection stations to handle last minute inspections of motorists take their vehicles immediately so there will be no delayed periods between taking one vehicle and the next," said. The first of the last inspection lines began forming last two days due to motorists waiting to the very last minute.

"From now until the end of every minute of the inspection station's time will be at a premium, and waiting lines will come general throughout the state as it approaches."

Johnson urged all Texas motorists to avoid the inconvenience of standing in line to get the safety inspection sticker for 1966 by taking immediate action now. He said that beginning Saturday, April 16, officers will be on the streets to start handing out non-compliance with the Motor Vehicle Inspection law which requires an annual safety inspection of vehicles.

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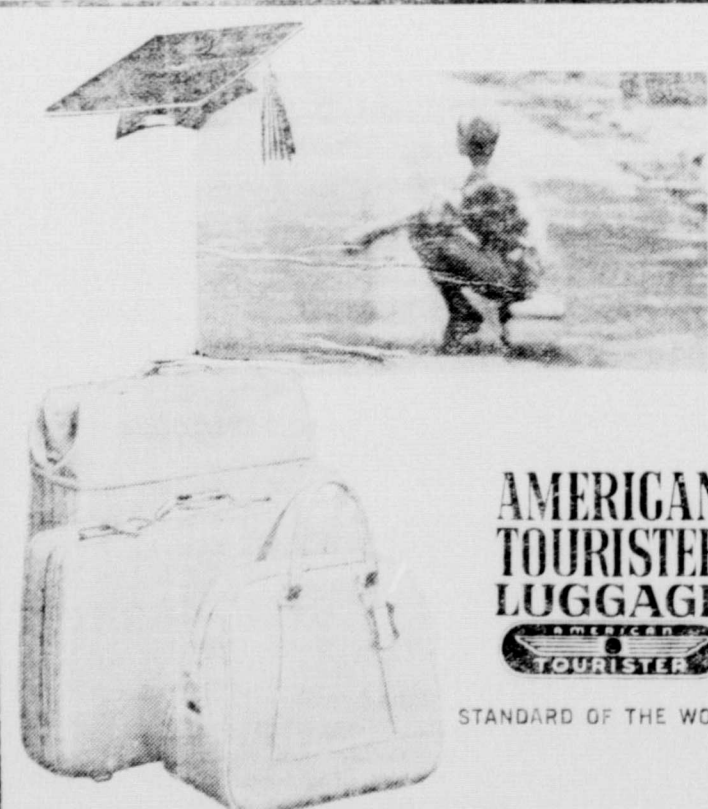
