**1965 Voluntary Wheat Program**

Mrs. Reeder also announced that a total of 514 wheat farms with 456 operators are participating in the wheat program. A total of 787 producers received payments for diversion in the amount of \$47,050.00 and price support in the amount of \$476,527.00. A total of 11,148 acres was diverted from production.

Out of a total of 327 feed grain farms eligible to participate in the program, 275 farms participated. A total of 447 producers received payments for diversion in the amount of \$88,132.00 and 25 farms received price support in the amount of \$2,892.00. A total of 7,278 acres was diverted from production.

A total of 19 producers received payments totaling \$20,499.16 under the Conservation Reserve Program in 1965.

In the domestic cotton program, there are a total of 289 cotton farms in the county with 93 farms participating in the program and total payments made are \$22,510.00. A total of 8 wool producers received payments in the amount of \$209.82, and 2 unshorn lamb producers received payments totaling \$26.23. Under the facility loan program, there were six loans made in the amount of \$788.99 and a storage capacity of 10,050 bushels.

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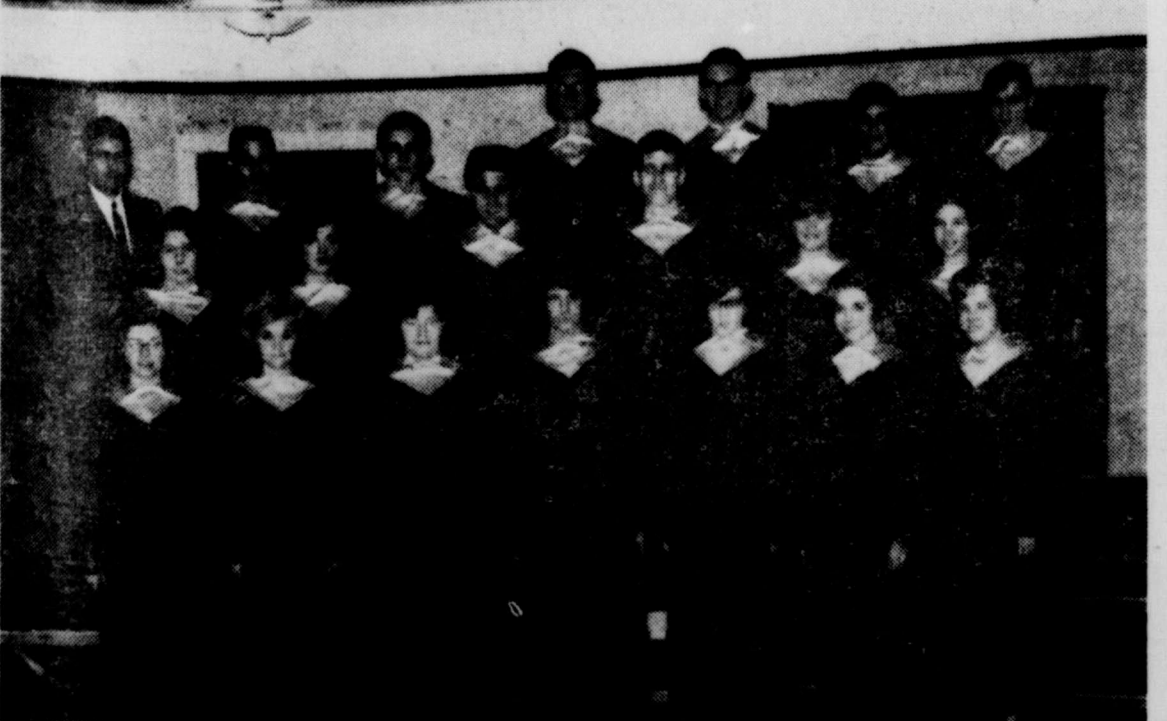
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## Draft Status on '66 High School Grads Is Clarified

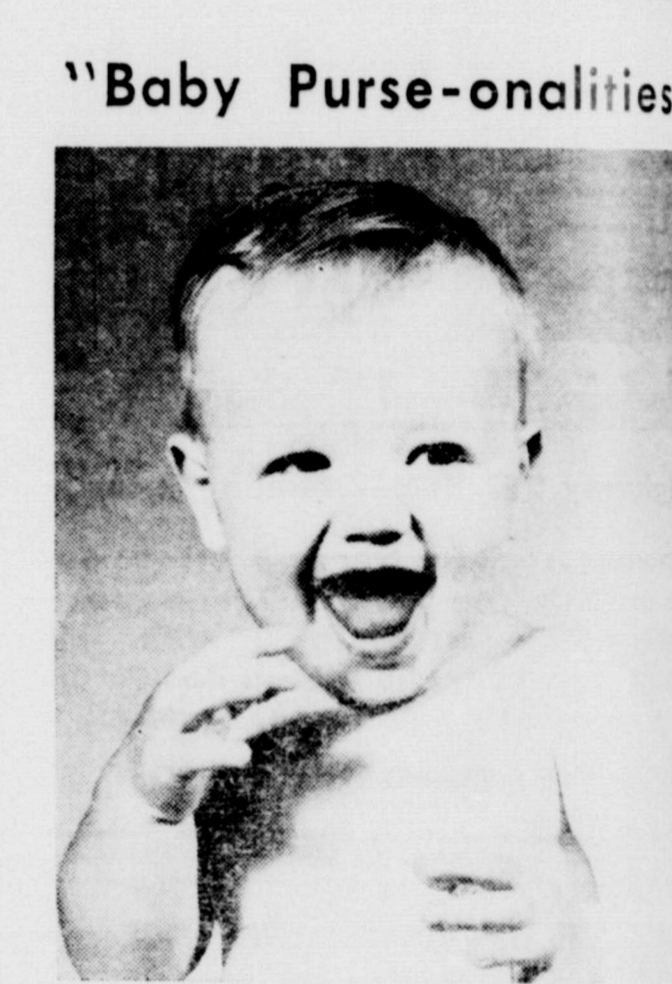
## Cat Villain Vainly Bids for Stardom

### Say, Sport! Gas'll Get You Quail

Biologist Joe Davidson of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is looking for sportsmen interested in swapping a few gallons of tractor gasoline for a cooey or two of bobwhite quail.

Cut up a little sod, is his formula, especially around the edge of timber, allowing weeds to furnish quail food. And almost always the quail will move into nature's pantry.

Birds, say Davidson, sometimes starve to death during hard winter months. This is usually indicative of a near-starvation situation rather than cold weather.

Birds will tolerate cold, according to Davidson, if they have food to generate body heat. Let them lose one ounce of weight from lack of food, and trouble's ahead.

A little tractor gasoline used for soil disturbance will furnish food necessary to tolerate winter-time, advises the veteran.

**ASCS Releases  
April Newsletter**

The April newsletter to farmers of Foard County from the A. S. C. S. office has been released by Mrs. Jean Reeder, office manager. It follows:  
May 1, 1966—Date to Remember: Disposition of wheat and barley must be reported to this office by May 1, 1966, or 15 days from the date of your notice. If you have disposed of the excess by grazing it must also be reported to this office.  
Cotton or feed grain must be planted in workman like manner. To be eligible for payment under the cotton and feed grain program these crops must be planted in a workmanlike manner; which means that the land preparation, planting and cultivation of the crop must be done with the same care as if planting your full allotment. Diverted acres. Diverted acreage may not be grazed from May 1, 1966, to November 1, 1966. No hay may be harvested from diverted land.  
Mesquite spraying. Applications for mesquite spraying are now being taken. May 13th is the earliest date spraying can be done and we must have sufficient moisture by that time.
