Don Keith Lyons, a senior student in the College of Veterinary Medicine, Texas A&M University, College Station, has been designated a "distinguished student" for the second semester of the 1965-66 term.

Three Billion Wills

As long as man remained obedient to the will of God, his Maker, all was well with him. His life was perfectly balanced be-

cause it was centered in God. As soon as he listened to Satan, however, and set his will against God's, all began to go wrong. His life was now off center and out of balance. It was no longer subject to one central Will. Alienated from God, man now reaped the fruit of his rebellion, not only in his banishment from Paradise, but in the self-will of his offspring.

Of the first two children born into the world, one bludgeoned the other to death and this was but the beginning. Whereas God had originally created man in His own "image" and "likeness" (Gen. 1:26,27), we read later that Adam begat Seth "in his own likeness,

after his image" (Gen. 5:3).

And so parents down through the ages have begotten children like themselves, with fallen natures and wills of their own, until today we have some three billion wills operating in the world instead of the one, central will of God.

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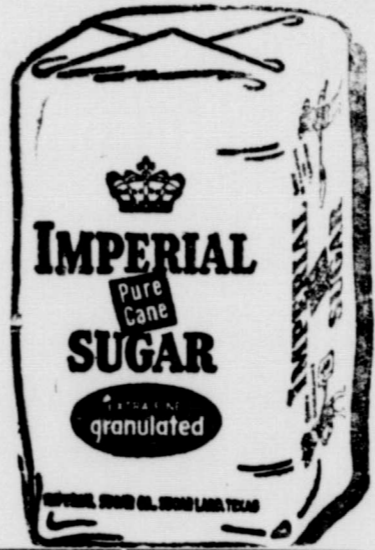

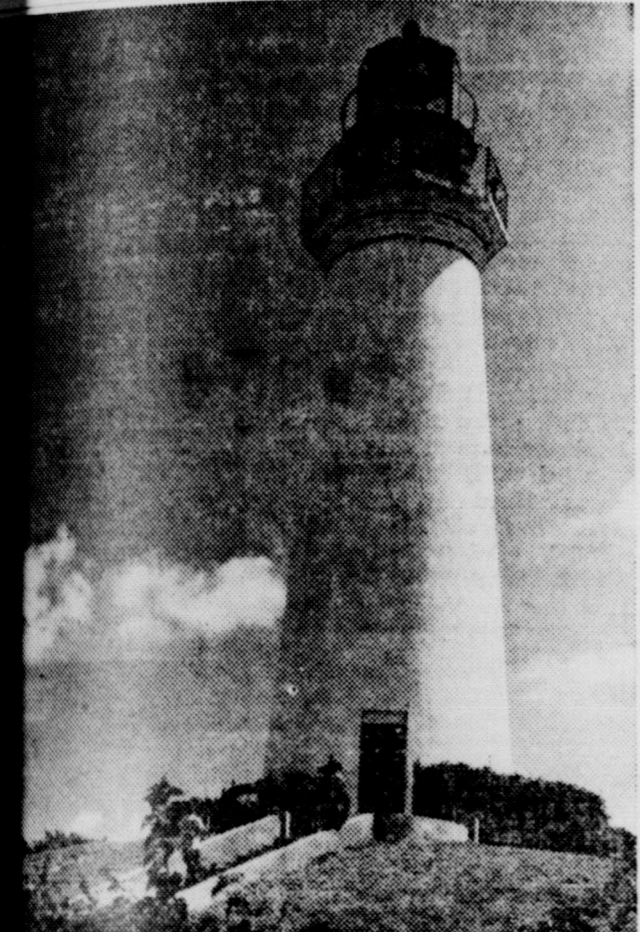

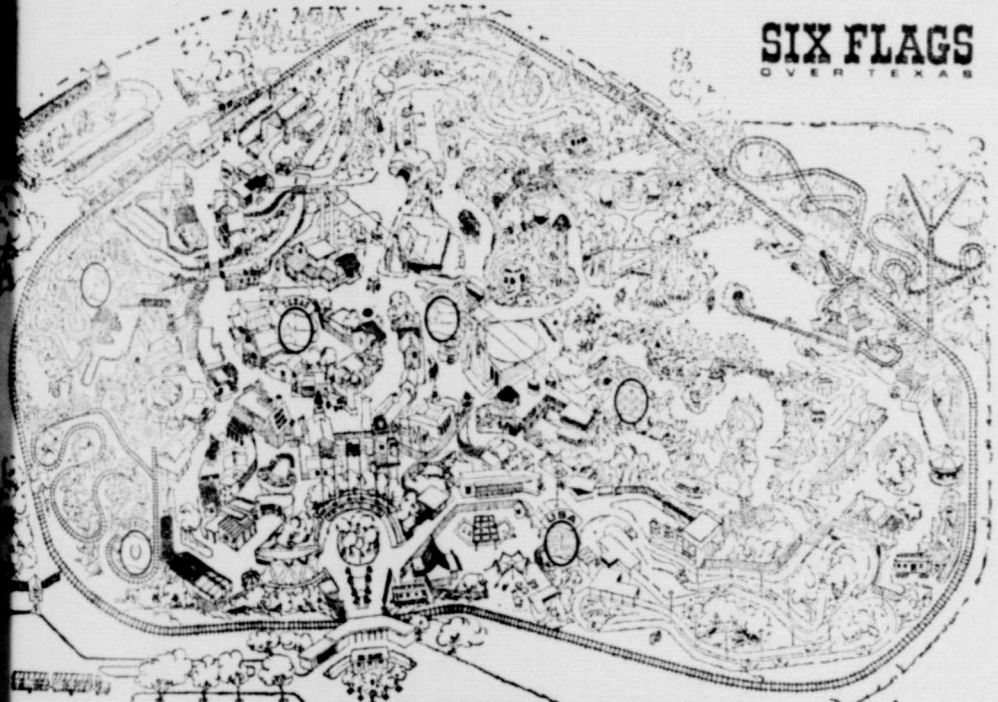

From the News . . .

THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Thursday, May 28, 1936, issue of The Foard County News:

The board of trustees for the Riverside school district has awarded the contract for a \$10,000 school building to be constructed by September 7 to Davis & Patterson of Matador.

Local showers since Friday of last week have amounted to 1.29 inches in Crowell. The rains have been scattered, and parts of the county have not received any measurable precipitation this month.

A motor caravan consisting of 20 to 25 automobiles from Crowell and Foard County attended the opening day of the Cottle-King Pioneer Jubilee at Paducah Tuesday and participated in the parade staged during the morning.

In a report from the Texas Health Department at Austin, the Crowell city water was given a rating of "Good. No contamination." The rating received by Crowell was the best that the department issues.

Work on repairing the Crowell High School football field was completed last week and the field will be in excellent condition by the time for the opening of the football season this fall, according to I. T. Graves, school superintendent. The damage was caused by the four rodeo performances held on it during Foard County's 45th Anniversary Jubilee on April 27 and 28. Pat McDaniel, janitor for the school, was in charge of the repair work done by about 30 boys furnished by the National Youth Administration.

Plans are underway to resume work on the State Park three miles north of town on the Crowell-Quanah highway. The park contains 6.1 acres. The land was obtained from F. A. Davis and it was deeded to the State Highway Department. Land for another park south of Crowell was given by Dr. J. M. Hill.
