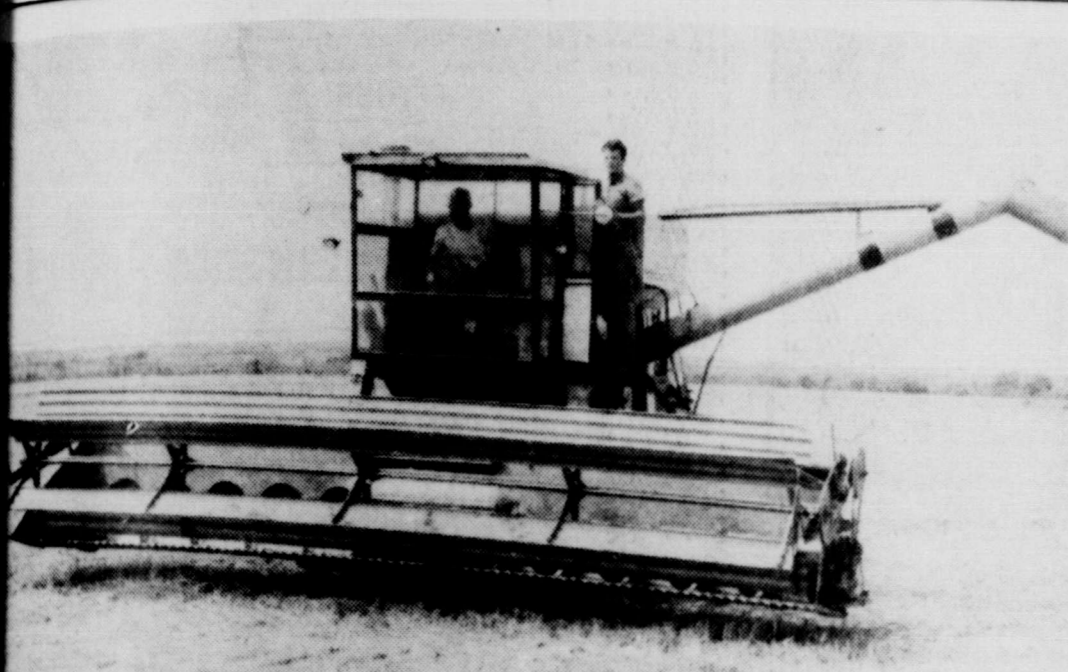

Mayor Kincaid presided at the meeting. Don Malone, administrator for the four-county EOAC, explained the program.

Coy Payne Edges Jesse Whitfield in Precinct 2 Race

Martin Wins over Spears in Only Other Race on Ballot

A total of 12 votes separated the two candidates in the race for Commissioner of Precinct No. 2 in Saturday's second Democratic primary which saw incumbent Coy Payne returned to office as he received 212 votes to 200 for his opponent, Jesse Whitfield.

In the only other race, Crawford Martin received 296 votes to 119 for Franklin Spears, in the race for state attorney general.

One New Vehicle

One new vehicle was registered here last week: June 3, Robert F. and Irmalee Snowden, 1966 Chevrolet station wagon.

With hot dry weather—ideal for ripening small grain—holding all last week, and this, wheat harvest in Foard County was wound up in record time, and is now complete except for possibly a few scattered patches.

Foard County's elevators reported Tuesday that they had received a total of 860,000 bushels of the new crop with an undetermined amount of wheat stored in private storage on farms.

Mrs. Jean Reeder, local ASCS office manager, said that a total of 53,000 acres of Foard County land were sowed to wheat this year, and this gives the county a 16.2 bushels-per-acre average on wheat delivered to the elevators.

The market price of wheat during the cutting season has been \$1.62 per bushel and with the certificate program of the Department of Agriculture, the cash price to farmers showed improvement over last year, when the market price during harvest was \$1.29 per bushel. Loan value this year has been \$1.25.

At this time last year, 808,000 bushels had been delivered to the elevators, and two years ago this week, the elevators had received 926,195 bushels.

Most of the combine crews have already moved on north to continue the harvest as it moves.

Two Vehicles Involved in Crash North of Town

Two Foard County men escaped serious injury about 3 p. m. Friday in a two-car accident five miles north of Crowell.

Drivers of the two vehicles were Charles Machac Sr. and Earl Davis. They were both traveling in the same direction at the time of the accident, Sheriff W. F. Bradford reported. Mr. Davis' vehicle went through a fence and stopped several hundred feet from the highway.

Sheriff Bradford reported about \$150 damage to the Machac vehicle and \$400 to \$500 damage to the Davis vehicle.

BODY OF CHILDRESS FOUND SUNDAY

A partially-decomposed body of a child, identified as King, 34, of Childress, was found 24 miles northwest of Childress Sunday morning.

According to reports, King left Childress Wednesday en route to Ardmore, Okla., and relatives reportedly had attempted to locate him since Thursday.

J. H. Free of Crowell found the body on a narrow private road six miles from the nearest house on the ranch he leases. King's car, with keys in the ignition, was located three miles from the body.

Foard County Sheriff W. F. Bradford stated that death apparently was from natural causes. Childress police assisted in the investigation.

King was believed to have been dead two to three days. His body was brought to Womack's Funeral Home in Crowell and later transferred to Childress.

Cotton Farmers Veto Sale or Lease of Allotments

Mrs. Jean Reeder, office manager of the ASC committee, last week announced the sale or lease of cotton allotments to other counties will not be in effect for Foard County. This decision was reached after the counting of ballots in the recent referendum. A total of 219 acceptable ballots were cast with 60 voting in favor of transfers and 159 voting against transfers. At least two-thirds of the voters must be in favor of transfers before growers will be permitted to transfer allotments by sale or lease to farmers in other counties within the state.

Mrs. Reeder said that notices of 1967 wheat allotments will be mailed by not later than June 15.

Natural Disaster
Mrs. Reeder says that producers participating in 1966 wheat and feed grain programs who have lost all or part of their wheat seedlings as a result of natural disaster should look into the possibility of replanting a part of the wheat acreage to grain sorghum. If you intend to plant grain sorghum you will need to file a written request that the destroyed wheat acreage be reclassified as not planted to wheat. Upon approval of your request, you could then proceed under the program's substitution provision—substituting feed grains for the wheat acreage lost, up to 55 per cent of the wheat allotment without forfeiting wheat certificates or violating your agreement. You would be eligible for feed grain price-support payments on an acreage up to 50 per cent of the feed grain base.

The Brooks Auto Supply will move to the Self building this month, and Mr. Brooks says he expects to be completely moved to the new location by July 1.

Rolling Plains Cotton Insect Survey Begins

The Rolling Plains Cotton Insect survey began June 1 and will continue through August 31, according to Joe Burkett, county agent.

The survey is a part of the over-all effort of the Rolling Plains Cotton growers to achieve control and possible eradication of the boll weevil from the rolling plains of Texas. The cost of the survey is estimated at \$30,000. Funds are provided on a matching basis by the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers and the Texas Department of Agriculture. The survey will be conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service with Emory Boring, area entomologist, as coordinator. County agents in each of the 31 counties involved are responsible for local survey coordination.

Ten 2-man teams will be involved. The teams are composed of agriculture students from Texas A&M, Texas Tech and Sul Ross. Each of the twenty boys has had some entomology courses and all have been thoroughly trained to team will check 34 fields per week, conduct the insect counts. Each checking the same field at approximately the same time each week.

The team members have been instructed not to make insecticide recommendations. Farmers with questions regarding the advisability of spraying are urged to contact their local county agent.

The number of fields checked in each county is based on the cotton allotment within the county. Throughout the rolling plains, one field will be checked per 2,300 acres of cotton. In counties where small acreages are concerned, Wilbur Gruben, field advisor and entomologist with the RPCG, will be assisting with local insect counting. Gruben will also work closely with hot spot areas when they occur, and with counties that have organized for early season

control. It is hoped that farmers will quickly learn the fields being surveyed so they can keep up with the insect situation in their community this summer. Regular reports will be issued by the county agent and farmers are urged to contact them.

Fields being surveyed in Foard County are located on the following farms: Jesse Whitfield, H. L. Ayers, Anton Kajs and Sim V. Gamble.

Plans Being Made for Early-Season Insect Control

The Greenbelt Cotton Improvement Association, which includes Foard County, at a meeting held last Wednesday night, made plans in Foard and Wilbarger Counties for two early-season applications of low-volume Malathion on a community basis to control the first (over-wintered) generation of the boll weevil. Substantiating the need for

early control measures, the association says the first generation weevil moves to the nearest cotton field and does not begin production until cotton is one-third grown; the first generation is in a location and has not yet done damage in the cotton. He is weakest, easiest to kill and after a long winter of hibernation. If the first generation substantially reduced before production, all later generations will be fewer in number and damaging.

When used on a community basis, low volume Malathion is lowest cost, effective insecticide for the control of boll weevil. Malathion, at this time, is only U. S. D. A. approved insecticide for low-volume application.

At the same time the first season applications are killing first generation weevils, it also be controlling thrips, hoppers and fleahoppers.

The Association invites Foard County cotton farmers join this insect-control effort.

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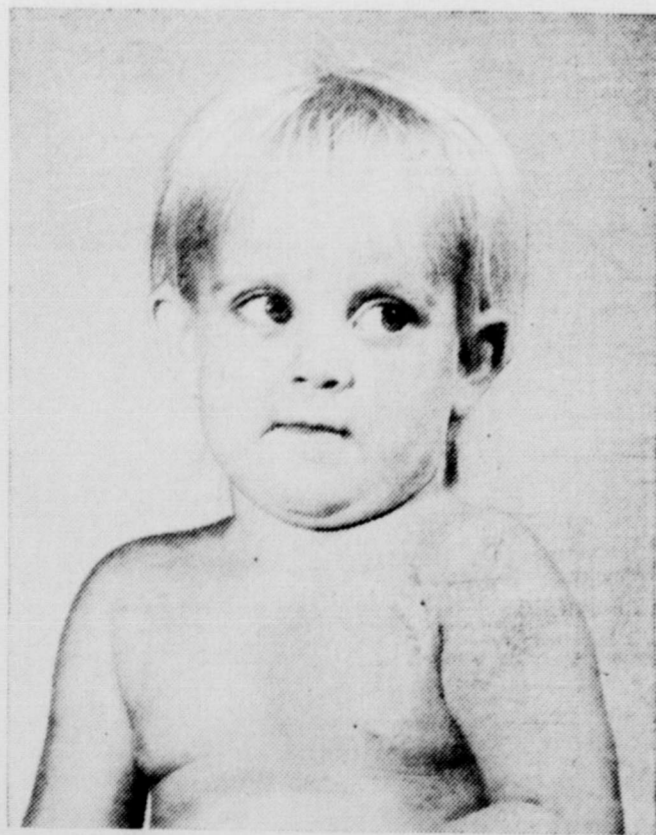

The Corps of Engineers has released part two of a survey report on the control of salt in Red River.

This is the second of a two-part report on the feasibility of plans to control major natural salt sources in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. Studies indicate that natural salt pollution, in conjunction with man-made pollution, must be controlled to alleviate short- and long-term water shortages in the Red River basin.

In the first report, parts of which were published in this paper, plans for controlling salt in the Wichita River forks were told.

In this second report, among the areas studied were the North and Middle Pease Rivers, which run together some distance west of the bridge on the Crowell-Quannah highway.

The chloride control plan selected for this area would utilize subsurface cut-off walls and collection conduits. Brine collected by the subsurface cut-off walls and collection conduits from both the North and Middle Pease Rivers would be pumped via pipeline to the Canal Creek Reservoir. The Canal Creek brine reservoir is a modification of the project reported in the part 1 report for the Wichita Rivers, in that brine storage would be shared by the two areas. By adding the Pease Rivers brines into the Canal Creek reservoir, the dam would be 20 feet higher than the dam required for the North Wichita brines alone.

The report states that complete impoundment of a 100-year flood on top of 100 years' accumulation of brine and sediment from the Wichita and Pease Rivers would require total storage of 319,500 acre-feet, including 313,630 acre-feet for brine and 5,870 acre-feet for sediment.

The Corps of Engineers estimate the cost of one system each on Elm Fork, North and Middle Pease Rivers, Jonah Creek and Pease Creek—to be known as the Salt River Chloride Control Project, and also four brine reservoirs would have a total first cost estimated at \$55,680,000, and the cost of annual operation, maintenance and major replacements is estimated at \$320,500.

Plans Being Made to Apply Low Volume Insecticide

Plans are being made in Foard and Wilbarger Counties for two early-season applications of low-volume insecticide on a mass community basis to control the first (over-wintered) generation of the boll weevil. These plans are being initiated by the newly-organized Greenbelt Cotton Improvement Association. Technical guidance on control applications will be made by entomologists from the Agricultural Extension Service, according to County Agent Joe Burkett.

A united effort by all cotton producers is a "must" for such a program to be successful.

The first generation weevil moves to the nearest cotton field and does not begin reproduction until cotton squares are one-third grown; therefore, the first generation is in a known location and has not yet caused damage in the cotton. He is in his weakest, easiest-to-kill condition after a long winter of hibernation. If the first generation is substantially reduced before reproduction, all later generations will be fewer in number and less damaging.

When used on a community basis, LV insecticide is the lowest cost, effective insecticide for the control of boll weevils. It will also control thrips and fleahoppers.

Under research LV will not control the cotton bollworm effectively. It is recommended that early season application of LV insecticide be made prior to the time the squares are one-third grown and stay out of fields with insecticide to allow "beneficials" to build up to aid in the bollworm control.

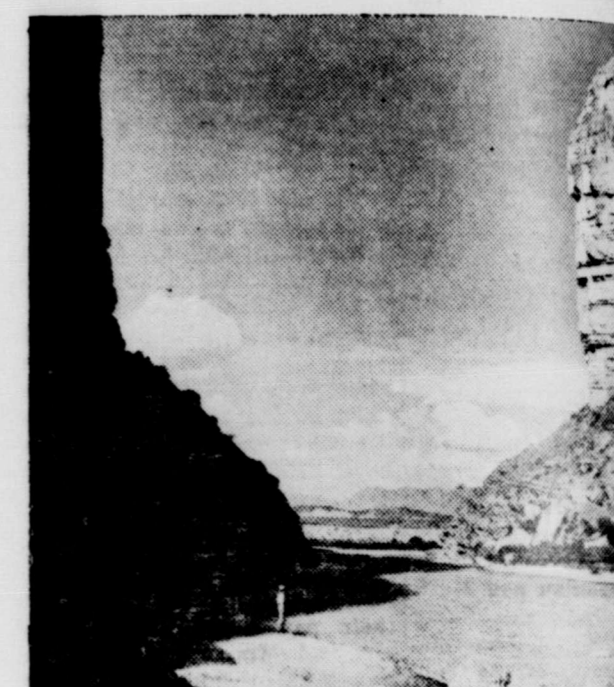

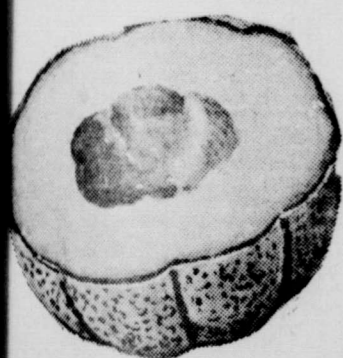

Four-Stage Boll Weevil Control Program Started

The Greenbelt Cotton Improvement Association in a meeting last Wednesday night in Vernon announced its support of a four-stage boll weevil control program.

The four-stage program as outlined by the association includes the following points:

1. United community effort: Farmers must plan and work together to control the weevil on a community basis at a lower cost.

2. Uniform Planting: April and early May cotton gives the first weevils out of hibernation a feeding and reproduction area. Early fields of cotton cause fast build-ups of weevils in damaging populations. A Wilbarger County survey showed 87 per cent of the county's cotton in 1964 was planted after May 20.

3. Massive Weevil Control Program: Two early-season applications of low-volume Malathion on a community basis for the control of the over-wintered weevil population before the one-third grown square stage. If the first generation is substantially reduced before reproduction, all later generations will be fewer in number and less damaging.

Effective in-season control program of late weevil build-up and other damaging insects.

End-of-season control of diapause weevils by adding one-fourth pound per acre Guthion or 1/2 pound per acre Methal Parathion to the defoliant or desiccant. Also early stalk destruction and plow-up to clean the field of food and hibernation areas for diapause weevils.

4. Clean-Up of Hibernation Sites: Shelterbelts, chinaberry thickets and other tree leaf cover rank high as good hibernation areas which should be cleared, cleaned, or eliminated. A program of fence, turn row, and drainage ditch clean-up should be started.

The over-wintered boll weevil survey conducted in February in Wilbarger and Foard Counties list types of hibernation sites which have high over-wintered weevil populations.

The association, which includes Foard County, considers this program and its adoption one of the keys to better cotton production and all Foard County cotton farmers are urged to give their cooperation to the effort.

Newell Hofmann of Crowell is secretary of the organization and a number of Foard County men are members of the board, representing the various communities.
