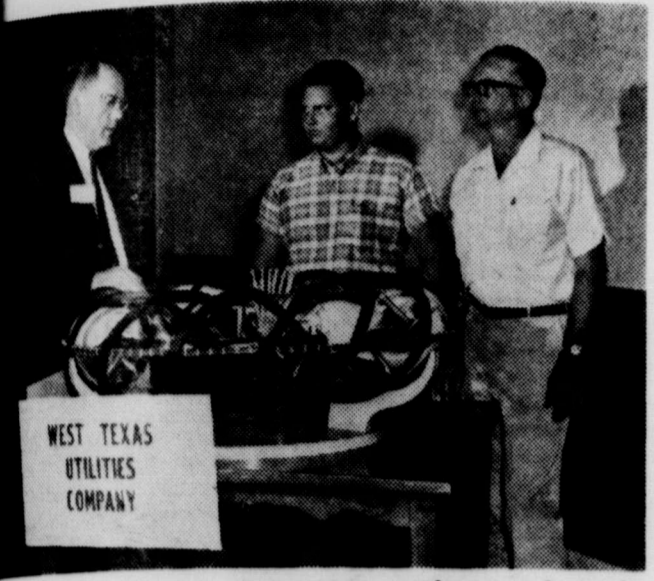

## Crowell Receives 2.65 Inch Rain Wednesday

An intense electrical storm shut off the electricity for about a half hour in Crowell, accompanied a heavy downpour of rain here Wednesday night of 2.65 inches.

Arthur Bell received about four inches at his place west of Crowell and the southwest part of the county received up to 3 inches, according to reports. The rain was lighter in the north and east parts of the county, however.

The moisture will prove extremely beneficial to cotton and grain farmers, and will give them ample moisture to top their crops.

The turbulent weather preceded a cool front which dropped the mercury to the fifties at night and eighties in the daytime for a few days. It was a pleasant relief from the hot dry winds from the south which had blown for several days and brought the daytime mercury readings to 100 degrees and over.

Another rain of about 1/2 inch fell Tuesday night.

### Foard County Hospital Approved to Participate in Medicare Program

The Foard County Hospital was on the list released Saturday by the federal government of the names of hospitals eligible to participate in Medicare. But the government made it clear simultaneously that this eligibility will be canceled if later inspection discloses racial discrimination.

In its drive to enroll as many as possible of the country's 7,654 qualified hospitals before the program of care for the elderly begins July 1, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare is accepting their assurances in writing that they are in compliance with the nondiscrimination requirements of the 1964 Civil Rights Act.

The results of this hurry-up effort were disclosed Saturday when the department made public a list of 5,558 hospitals which have been formally signed up for participation or have provided written assurances that they are in compliance with the law against discriminatory racial practices.

But HEW specified that this clearance is "subject to an on-site visit later" by government representatives who will check for discrimination not only in the handling of patients and employees but in giving hospital staff privileges to doctors regardless of color.

Although 2,143 hospitals—mostly in the South—as of Thursday had not yet been cleared under the rights law, Secretary of Welfare John W. Gardner predicted on that day that virtually all will be certified in time for the start of health insurance benefits for 19 million Americans.

### 4-H Club Members' Record Books Due in Agent's Office by July 20

All 4-H Clubbers are reminded by Mrs. Virginia J. Ilseing and Joe Burkett, County Extension Agents, that their records are due in the county extension office no later than Wednesday, July 20, if they plan to enter them in the 1966 Texas 4-H Awards program.

Mrs. Ilseing and Mr. Burkett also said that they would be glad to help any 4-H'er with his or her record book or in deciding which awards program to enter.

Following is a list of the awards programs which may be entered: achievement, boys agricultural, beautification of home grounds, beef production, citizenship, clothing, crop production, Dansforth Leadership Training Camp, electric, foods and nutrition, home economics, home improvement, leadership, recreation, safety, Santa Fe, swine production, wildlife conservation, tractor maintenance, fire prevention and several other contests.

All 4-H'ers who were not 14 years old January 1, 1966, may enter the junior division of any of the above programs and their record books will be due at the same date as the senior records.

Wheat harvest in Foard County is over, the combines have all moved on, and Foard County farmers delivered a total of 917,812 bushels of 1966 wheat to the elevators. As usual, a portion of the wheat was stored on the farms in private storage, which has been estimated at 60,000 bushels.

With a total of 60,300 acres of land sowed to wheat this year, the average yield for the county this year is 16.2 bushels per acre.

Last year's wheat crop totaled 862,000 bushels, almost 51,000 less than that this year, while in 1964, some 974,000 bushels of wheat were delivered to the elevators.

The market price this year was much better than last year, also.

Prospects during the winter looked extremely good for wheat following the heavy rains of last September. However, a hot, dry and windy March took its toll and for a time, much of the wheat looked as if it would never head out. But a timely rain which some said came too late brought the wheat out again, and from the total bushels cut, evidently did come in time to benefit the crop.

Harvest conditions were ideal, with harvest being completed in record time without being stopped by any wet weather, and by the time of the rain last Wednesday night, harvest was all but completed.

T. O. Ellis, Santa Fe Agent in Crowell, reported Tuesday that the railroad had shipped a total of 165 cars of new wheat.

Obtaining leads on industries that might locate in a community is one of the hardest parts of any sound economic development program. The lack of an industrial prospecting program that produces several leads may cause serious mistakes by a community in financing or other endeavors to attract unsound or unwise industry. A community needs a well balanced program, combining all the techniques and utilizing all of the sources that will give it increased effectiveness and chances for real success.

**LOCAL PEOPLE AS A SOURCE OF INDUSTRIAL PROSPECTS**—usually provide a sound reason or give the community a competitive advantage in attracting the industry.

- BUSINESSMEN**—should ask the company representatives they buy from if the company needs additional manufacturing facilities to serve this market area, also, service stations, restaurants and motel people can ask their customers.
- CITIZENS**—who know someone that works for an industry should inquire if that industry might be interested in locating a plant.
- EXISTING INDUSTRY**—may need a companion industry to supply them with raw materials or services. Expansion of existing industry is sound economic development.
- LOCAL IDEAS**—can provide leads for the local people to establish an industry of their own or attract a certain type industry.
- EX-CITIZENS**—should be contacted, advising them and asking their help to obtain leads on any industry that could logically locate in the town.

**CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ACTIVITY**—should utilize such programs as direct mail, asking local citizens to call on industries when they are on a trip—watching all news media for possible leads or indications that a company might expand.

**COOPERATION WITH OTHER AGENCIES**—such as utilities, banks, railroads, regional and state development organizations can provide leads for new industry. Keep all of these organizations fully advised of the local programs, advantages, activities and community interest for attracting new industry for improved economy in your community.

**ANY and ALL industrial leads should be handled through and by the local group that has been delegated this responsibility, usually the Chamber of Commerce.**
