## CAR AND PICKUP HAVE COLLISION ON U. S. 70

A near head-on collision between a California vehicle and a Foard County car about 3 a. m. Sunday sent several occupants to hospital.

The accident occurred near the Archie Campbell home about five miles east of Crowell.

George Sillemon of Crowell, Ola McMurtry and her 10-year-old son, James, of El Centro, Calif., were treated at the Foard County Hospital and released Sunday. Mr. McMurtry was not reported to have been injured. The family was en route to visit relatives at Waurika, Okla. at the time of the accident.

Occupants of the Crowell car were Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Sillemon, Mr. and Mrs. George Sillemon, Ophelia McGee and a small child. The Sillemons were hospitalized with various injuries, and Mrs. Wallace Sillemon was rushed to a Wichita Falls hospital early Sunday for further treatment.

## Joe Burkett Wins Distinguished Service Award

Joe E. Burkett, Foard County agricultural agent since 1946, this week was named a recipient of the National County Agricultural Agents Association's highest honor, their Distinguished Service Award for 1966. He was one of seven Texans so honored.

Burkett was nominated by the Texas Association and confirmation from the national organization was announced by Todd W. Berry, Van Zandt County agent and chairman of the Texas Awards Committee.

The awards are made annually to a select group of the nation's county agents who have, over a period of ten years or more, made contributions to agriculture and improved rural living. The Texas winners will be recognized at the association's annual meeting in Nacogdoches August 14-16, but presentation of their awards will come as a highlight of the national meeting scheduled for Honolulu, Hawaii, November 1-7.

Burkett was cited "for outstanding leadership in developing through the county program building committee a superior 4-H Club program and adult demonstrations which have improved soil fertility, livestock in the county and rural living; thus increasing farm and ranch income and making rural life more rewarding. Foard County was one of the first in Texas to develop a long range county program of work."

Burkett has worked with Foard County farmers for 20 years in the soil fertility program to encourage the use of balanced fertilizer applications for greater profits. He has helped to develop and improve the livestock industry through effective selection and performance programs. The well-balanced field crops program has meant higher profits to farmers, resulting from use of better management practices, adopted varieties, cultural methods and in-

## Showers Fall East of Town Saturday

## Greenbelt Water Line from Quanah to Crowell Now Under Construction

Work got underway last week by J. T. Brodie & Co., of Amarillo, contractors, to lay the water line of the Greenbelt Water Authority from Quanah to Crowell.

The Crowell line will be connected with the Greenbelt system at the same point Quanah is connected. Turning toward the highway between the W. M. Barber and Alvie Stepp places, its route will about 15 feet inside the property lines where easements have been secured. When the line reaches the Pease River bridge, it will be tied alongside the structure and on into Crowell.

Workmen were busy last week near the Country Club entrance boring under the highway where the water line will be placed as it continues on in to the Crowell water tower.

Unless an emergency develops, water will be put into the line for Crowell upon completion of

the dam near Hedley by the R. N. Adams Company of Kaufman and work on the filter plant by Brown-McKee of Lubbock is completed.

Work is progressing ahead of schedule on all phases of the Greenbelt dam. If rains fall at an opportune time, the authority will be able to furnish all the cities of the authority all the water their future needs will require within 18 months to 2 years, authorities estimate.

The workers of the school will be available to register the children planning to attend school the following week, August 8-13, from 8:30 to 11:30 each morning. The closing exercises will be on Saturday evening, August 13, at 7:30 p. m. The public is invited to attend.

The semi-annual visit of the Red River Regional Bloodmobile will be on Friday, August 5, in the basement of the Crowell Methodist Church, Mrs. Darwin Bell, chairman, announced this week.

Mrs. Bell has recently been named Foard County chairman replacing Mrs. Marion Crowell, who has resigned.

This is the tenth visit of the Bloodmobile to Foard County and it will be in operation from 12 noon until 6 p. m. Expectations by the new chairman and her co-workers are high that a large number will respond to the pleas for blood and make a donation.

Anyone between the ages of 18 and 60 years is urged to give blood; however, minors must have their parents' written consent. Each person is checked for temperature, pulse, hemoglobin, and medical history. Local officials say it is safe for a person to give blood every eight weeks, but not over five times a year.

The blood processing will be under the guidance of a medical doctor and registered nurse.

The bloodmobile usually sets up in the community center, but another group had already reserved the center for that day; hence, the change in location to the Methodist Church basement.

The last time the Bloodmobile was in Crowell was on February 4. At that time, twenty-five persons contributed blood and four of these donors were made members of the "Gallon Club" at that time.

## Dates Changes for Social Security Visit to Foard County

The Social Security representative from the Vernon office will be at the Community Building in Crowell from 10 a. m. until 12 noon on Thursday, August 11, and Thursday, September 15.

The previously scheduled trips for August 25 and September 29 are being cancelled. This change is caused by a decrease in the workload on visiting days during the summer months. The change will result in a savings in administrative costs and will allow for an increase in service in later months if the workload increases.

## Savings Bonds Sales Are \$35,871 for First Half of '66

George Self, chairman of the Foard County Savings Bonds committee, reports that E and H Bond sales for the first six months of 1966 were \$35,871.00. This is 60 per cent of the 1966 goal of \$60,000. June sales for the county were \$1,019.00.

Texas sales were \$77,198,802 for the first six months of the year, and 52 per cent of the sales goal has been achieved. This represents a 3 per cent increase over the same period of last year.

Nationally, Series E sales of \$364 million are again at a peacetime peak of any June in 21 years, and 10 per cent above a year ago. E sales for the first six months of 1966 were \$2,282 million, 7 per cent more than a year ago.

H Bond sales were \$33 million during June which is a 6 per cent increase over June sales last year, and 6 per cent over H sales a year ago, bringing the January-June sales up to \$229 million.

## Quanah Car Hits Cow Friday Night

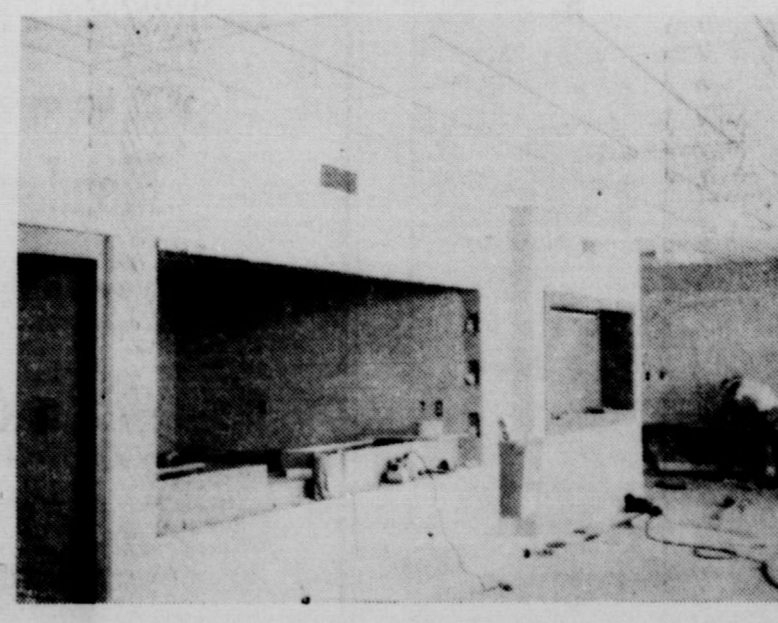

The driver was not reported to be injured, but heavy damage to the vehicle was reported by the sheriff.

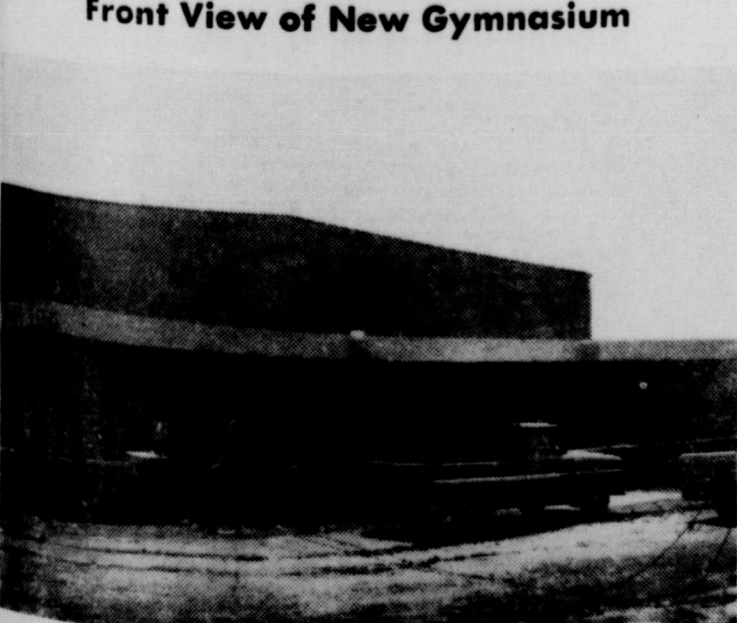
Playing Court and Goals

Jesse Tate and his mother, Mrs. J. B. Tate, moved to Brady from Crowell Monday to make their new home.

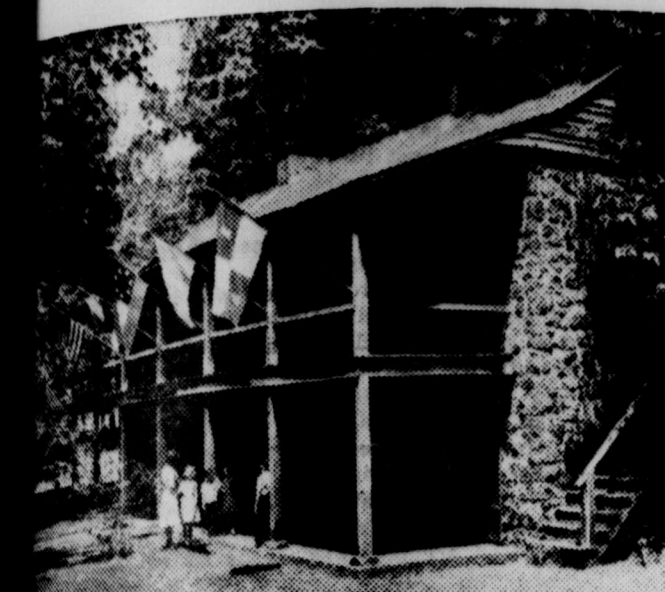
Mr. Tate was head of the local work unit of the Soil Conservation Service for the past five years and will have a similar position in Brady.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 12** proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the terms of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding new Section to read as follows:

Section 2. (a) The terms of office of persons serving on a governing body of a political subdivision of the State created to further the purposes of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article VII, of this Constitution, shall never exceed six years.

(b) Statutory provisions enacted before the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, relating to terms of office of governing bodies of political subdivisions created to further the

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13** proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to repeal the provision making payment of the tax a requirement for filing and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, by deleting the following language:

and provided further, that any voter who is subject to any poll tax under the laws of this State shall pay said tax before voting at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be in writing and left with the judge of the election. The wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19** proposing an Amendment to Section 49-d, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, declaring state policy regarding water reservoirs and development of water facilities and any system of works properly appurtenant thereto; providing for the sale, lease or transfer of such facilities under General Laws; providing for long-term contracts for water storage facilities; authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each house; providing that anticipatory legislation shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot; and proclamation and publication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 49-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the state, which waters are held in trust for the public, and benefit of the public. The proceeds from the sale of the additional bonds authorized hereunder deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund and the proceeds of bonds previously authorized by Article III, Section 49-c of this Constitution, shall provide terms and conditions under which the Texas Water Development Board may sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any reservoir and associated system or works

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 69** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section, Section 3, to Article III, relating to the performance of functions of government.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to establish the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

Section 3. The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new Senate shall be chosen after every appointment, and the Senators elected after each appointment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of the second class at the expiration of four years, so that one half of the Senators shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Senators shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified.

Section 2. That Article III, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

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**"PRACTICE PESTICIDE SAFETY!"**

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**Publication Accuses Government of "Double Standard"**

Washington Report, official weekly publication of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, criticized the Federal Government for what it calls a double standard of dealing with unions and management.

A front-page article, headlined "Does Government Double Standard Feed Union Power?" cites the Government's denunciation of molybdenum price increases (later rolled back) while failing to criticize the Machinist Union for striking against the recommendations of a Presidential Board as "new examples of union irresponsibility and Government bias."

Washington Report goes to nearly 120,000 National Chamber members and subscribers.

Text of the article follows:

How long, we wonder, will thoughtful citizens tolerate Government codding of unions against the public interest and the efforts of employers to provide good jobs at high wages and earn the profits which are neces-

sary to maintain our prosperity and high living standards?

How long are we going to see cities immobilized by illegal transit strikes, schools shut down by illegal teacher strikes—and politicians bending over backwards to protect the unions from appropriate legal actions?

How long are the Federal Government and some local and state governments going to apply a double standard in dealing with unions and employers, and how long will they keep seeking legislation which would increase excessive union power even more?

Recent developments offer new examples of union irresponsibility and Government bias.

Gardner Ackley's outspoken attack on molybdenum price increases appeared in the same newspapers that carried big headlines about the biggest airline strike in history and its public impact.

"Totally unjustified and . . . inflationary," stormed the chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisers in what United Press International described as an "emphatic protest" against the rise of about 5 percent in the price of the alloying agent for high-grade steels.

What about the Machinist Union's strike against five major airlines which were offering wage

increases even larger than the Administration's 3.2 per cent anti-inflation guidepost and larger than recommended by the President's own Emergency Board, and which would raise top mechanic's pay to \$4 an hour, or more than \$8,000 a year, plus increased fringe benefits?

Nowhere in the strike news could we find comparable denunciation by the Administration of the union which has been the country's fourth largest and claims to have grown enough in the past year to move up to third.

The Administration was typically shy of criticizing or putting pressure on the union even though:

—President Johnson backed his Emergency Board's recommendations as the basis for "a just and prompt settlement."

—The union was insisting on increases 50 per cent higher than the recommendations.

—Government efforts to minimize the strike's impact by easing airline regulations were obstructed by the union.

—The strike cut off air service completely to 70 cities and af-

**Disciples and Apostles**

"And when it was day, He called unto Him His disciples; and of them He chose twelve, whom also He named apostles" (Luke 6:13).

Many people fail to distinguish between our Lord's disciples and His apostles. This suppose they are the same. This is incorrect, however, for our Lord had a multitude of disciples while He had only a few apostles. tament prophets we find Samuel, a young lad, saying: "Speak Lord, for Thy servant heareth" (I Sam. 3:9).

Before we can do or say anything for God, then, we must listen to God. This explains why the reading and study of the Word of God is so important.

First, salvation itself comes by hearing and believing God's Word, especially about Christ, and His death for our sins. Rom. 10:17 says: "Faith cometh by hearing, and I Pet. 1:23: "Being born and hearing by the Word of God," again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the Word of God, which liveth and abideth forever." Then, having been saved, we can serve God acceptably only by diligent study of His

Word. Perhaps the most important passage in the Bible on this subject is II Tim. 2:15.

"Study to show thyself approved unto God; a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of Truth."

(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting absentee voting for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in this State by former residents of this State (1) who have moved to another state, and (2) who meet all qualifications, except residency requirements, for voting for electors for President and Vice President in this State at the time of the election, but the privileges of suffrage so granted shall be only for

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts created under Article IX of the Constitution.  
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 9, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less than all

the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (75¢) on the One Hundred Dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose; and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district.  
Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of taxpaying voters in the district concerned.  
The Legislature may also provide for the dissolution of hospital districts provided that a process is afforded by statute for:

(1) determining the desire of a majority of the qualified voters within the district to dissolve it;  
(2) disposing of or transferring the assets, if any, of the district; and  
(3) satisfying the debts and bond obligations, if any, of the district, in such manner as to protect the interest of the citizens within the district, including their collective property rights in the assets and property of the district, provided, however, that any grant from federal funds, however dispensed, shall be considered an obligation to be repaid in satisfaction and provided that no election to dissolve shall be held more often than once each year. In such connection, the statute shall provide against disposal or transfer of the assets of the district except for due compensation unless such assets are transferred to another governmental agency, such as a county, embracing such district and using such transferred assets in such a way as to benefit citizens formerly within the district.  
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:  
"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."  
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."  
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

The per capita apportionment to Texas schools for the term 1936-37 has been set at \$19, according to figures from the State Department of Education. This is the highest rate that has ever been set by the state.

The Boy Scout Council of the Wichita Falls area, of which Foard County is a part, is planning a special trip to Dallas and Fort Worth Centennial shows. The trip is planned for three days beginning August 10, and will cost each boy \$8.00.

Latest figures show that 14 loans amounting to \$4,351.75 have been made in Foard County under the Modernization Credit Plan or Title I of the National Housing Act.

The primary election held Saturday polled the largest vote in Foard County since the first primary election in 1928. Total votes cast last Saturday were 1,632.

**Right to Work States**

Right to work states are those in which state laws provide that unless they wish to do so, individuals need not join a union as a condition of employment. These states lead the nation in the creation of new jobs in business and industry, in wage improvement in industrial jobs and in producing new wealth and personal income. Among the top 15 states in actual wages paid industrial workers, six were right to work states. The top three states in the nation in rate of new jobs created by industry are Nevada, Arizona and Florida—all right to work states. Unemployment in right to work states is substantially below non-right to work states.
