## Commissioners to Adopt Budget at Aug. 22 Meeting

At 10 a. m. on Monday, August 22, the Commissioners Court of Foard County will adopt the budget for Foard County for the coming year. The meeting will take place in the county judge's office.

## How's the New Insurance Rates to Affect Foard Co.?

Foard County motorists will generally not find much change in the cost of their automobile insurance as a result of the new rates which went into effect on August 1.

Property damage protection has increased \$1.00, and comprehensive coverage will be up .3 per cent. However, for collision insurance, the \$50 deductible rate is down 3.4 per cent and the \$100 deductible is down 3.9 per cent.

Motorists will be more or less determining whether their insurance rates will be higher next year as the merit plan also began August 1, and points accumulated between August 1 this year and August 1, 1967, will determine rates for that time.

Motorists who accumulate only one point during the year will pay a 15 per cent penalty for car insurance; two points will bring a 35 per cent increase; 3 points will up the cost 60 per cent; and 4 points will bring a 90 per cent rise in rates to the motorist.

The new penalty rates start August 1, 1967. Driving while intoxicated, driving without a license, accidents involving damages over \$50 where in the motorist is partly at fault, speeding—these are among law violations that will cause demerits.

Mr. Wallen was converted at the age of 78 and was baptized and joined the First Baptist Church in Crowell ten years ago while Rev. C. T. Aly was pastor.

He practiced veterinary work in Foard County since 1931. He had practiced medicine and doctored stock since 1900.

## 29 MEDICARE PATIENTS IN HOSPITAL IN JULY

During the first month of operation of the Medicare program in Foard County, a total of 29 patients entered the hospital under the program while 28 were admitted not under Medicare.

While the difference in numbers is only 1 between Medicare and non-Medicare patients, the hospital bills incurred by the patients is vastly different.

The 29 Medicare patients ran up a combined bill of \$3,505.95, while the 28 non-Medicare patients accumulated a total bill of \$1,873.24—about half that of the Medicare patients.

Out-patient treatment at the hospital for Medicare patients totaled \$112.85, while out-patient treatment for non-Medicare patients was \$341.60 during the first month of Medicare.

Total income for both in- and out-patients during the month of July was \$5,833.64.

During Dr. Todd's schooling, he represented the Southwestern Medical School and presented medical papers at a number of meetings, seminars and conferences. These include 1963 in Indianapolis, Ind.; 1964 urology

**Urges Viet Nam Servicemen Be Given Priority in Voting**

Texas battlefield veterans in Viet Nam should be given top priority in absentee voting for November's general election, the State Attorney General's office said this week.

In a letter to the county clerks of Texas, the department urged that they "do all within your power to see that no serviceman from Texas is denied his right to vote."

"These Texans are fighting to assure the citizens of South Viet Nam may share in the basic right of free election. It would be an injustice if these same servicemen were not given the maximum opportunity to cast their ballots at home," the attorney general's department added.

The letter detailed Texas' absentee voting regulations for ser-

vicemen. The request was in cooperation with the Department of Defense, which this week said Americans in Viet Nam should know about and have an opportunity to vote in the November general election.

The A. G. department also mailed the list of voting requirements, plus names and addresses of Texas' 254 county clerks, to the Defense Department.

Defense Secretary Robert McNamara was told, "Certainly, every effort should be made to assure constitutional rights, privileges and responsibilities of those men and women in Viet Nam."

In the letter to county clerks, it was noted that under Texas law, absentee ballots may not be mailed until 20 days prior to the election date, although servicemen may request the absentee ballot at any time. Under Texas law, civilians cannot request an absentee ballot until 60 days prior to the election date.



It was noted that Texas law made no provision for the return of mailing absentee ballots but urged the clerks to airmail all such ballots to overseas service-

men. "Maximum time for our servicemen is necessary for the return of the ballot," the letter added.

Clerks were asked to see that ballots are printed and available on the 20th day before election. "Delay in mailing the ballot to our servicemen could prevent many of them from getting ballots back to you in time to be counted," the letter continued.

Many Americans overlook the significance of their freedom of choice in free elections. "Perhaps we would vote in greater numbers if we could realize the great sacrifice many Americans have made on battlefields of the world in order that we might truly have a government of the people. We should be aware of the sacrifice that our Texas servicemen are making and we should allow nothing to prevent these Texans from exercising their right to vote in our elections," the Attorney General Department's letter concluded.

Department spokesman. Also, the old licenses will be necessary for sportsmen to have on their person through August 31.

The licenses will be distributed through approximately 2,500 dealers, mainly stores featuring hunting and fishing equipment, as well as many bait stores.

The Department said the "sportsmen's credentials" will be in the hands of the agents well in advance of the new fiscal year to preclude any necessity for hunters and fishermen having to line up.

Individual fishing licenses cost \$2.15 for both residents and non-residents. Resident hunting licenses cost \$3.15.

Non-resident hunting licenses cost \$25. A special \$5 five-day non-resident license entitles the holder to hunt migratory birds, for five consecutive days, mainly waterfowl and doves.

This license is popular, the Department notes, with visitors patronizing the Rio Grande Valley white-winged dove harvest in early September and with duck and goose hunters who come from distant mid-west areas in late November and December.

There are many resident and fishing exemptions as described in the Department's official hunting and fishing guide but basically

persons 17 years of age and under 65 must have the regular state licenses.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1** proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a new Section 12, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties; authorizing the creation of a board of directors by appointment or election; providing that the membership of the board shall be based upon the proportionate part of the population of each county, with no county having less than one member; providing for the necessary election; authorizing the levy of an annual tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority; authorizing the Authority to employ or appoint an assessor and collector of taxes whose duty it shall be to assess and collect the taxes on the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors of said Authority; said taxes to be assessed equally and uniformly throughout the county or counties, comprising the Authority, as required by the Constitution; granting to such Authority the power to acquire by purchase, or through eminent domain proceedings existing publicly financed airport properties or other sites necessary to have and to improve the same, power to issue and sell general obligation bonds and revenue bonds, or either of them; authorizing the assumption of outstanding indebtedness secured by general obligation bonds and assuming the obligations of the city or cities under ordinances and bond indentures under which revenue bonds have been issued and sold; to enact zoning regulations and other measures to protect the airport facilities from hazards and obstructions; providing for the adding of an additional county or counties to the Authority.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 12, reading as follows:

"Section 12. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of

thereon vote in favor thereof; Airport Authority may be created and be composed of the county or counties that vote in favor of its creation if separate propositions are submitted to the voters of each county so that they may vote for one or more county Authority; or a single county Authority; provide for the appointment by the Board of Directors of an Assessor and Collector of Taxes in the Authority, whether constituted of one or more counties, whose duty it shall be to assess all taxable property, both real and personal, and collect the taxes thereon, based upon the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors; the tax to be levied not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) assessed valuation of the property, provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority; said taxable property shall be assessed on a valuation not to exceed the market value and shall be taxed uniformly throughout the Authority as is otherwise provided by the Constitution; the Legislature shall authorize the purchase or acquisition by the Authority of any existing airport facility publicly owned and financed and served by certificated airlines, in fee or of any interest therein, or to enter into any lease agreement therefor, upon such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreeable to the Authority and the owner of such facilities, or authorize the acquisition of same through the exercise of the power of eminent domain, and in the event of such acquisition, if there are any general obligation bonds that the owner of the publicly owned airport facility has outstanding, the same shall be fully assumed by the Authority and sufficient taxes levied by the Authority to discharge said outstanding indebtedness; and likewise any city or owner that has outstanding revenue bonds where the revenues of the airport have been pledged or said bonds constitute a lien against the airport facilities, the Authority shall assume and discharge all the obligations of the city under the ordinances and bond indentures under which said revenue bonds have been issued and sold. Any city which owns airport facilities not serving certificated airlines which are not purchased or acquired or taken over as herein provided by such Authority, shall have the power to operate the same under the existing laws or as the same may hereafter be amended. Any such Authority when created may be granted the power and authority to promulgate, adopt and enforce appropriate zoning regulations to protect the airport from

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts created under Article IX of the Constitution.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less than all

the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose; and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district.

Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxpaying voters in the district concerned.

The Legislature may also provide for the dissolution of hospital districts provided that a process is afforded by statute for:

(1) determining the desire of a majority of the qualified voters within the district to dissolve it;

(2) disposing of or transferring the assets, if any, of the district; and

(3) satisfying the debts and bond obligations, if any, of the district, in such manner as to protect the interest of the citizens within the district, including their collective property rights in the assets and property of the district, provided, however, that any grant from federal funds, however dispensed, shall be considered an obligation to be repaid in satisfaction and provided that no election to dissolve shall be held more often than once each year. In such connection, the statute shall provide against disposal or transfer of the assets of the district except for due compensation unless such assets are transferred to another governmental agency, such as a county, embracing such district and using such transferred assets in such a way as to benefit citizens formerly within the district.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts.

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

## Massive Weevil Control Program Rated Effective

The Greenbelt Cotton Improvement Association's early season massive boll weevil control program was described Saturday as "very effective."

Otto Streit, president of the association, reported on a meeting of directors to discuss and evaluate the early season control

phase. He said that reports concerning the early season control program conducted in Wilbarger and Foard Counties were given by Emory P. Boring, area entomologist; Norman Drake, Wilbarger County Agent; Joe Burkett, Foard County Agent; Harold Hancock, American Dusting Co.; and Hamp Naylor, Naylor Flying Service.

According to Mr. Hancock and Mr. Naylor, about 5,229 acres were sprayed during the first application and 9,747 the second application for a total of 14,976 acres during the two application control program.

Mr. Streit said that it was the

opinion of the directors that Boring's interest and participation was very good considering the weather and the first year of the program. The only problem the applications reported was trouble in finding some fields because of insufficient instructions concerning field locations. The directors have taken this problem under study.

Mr. Boring, Mr. Drake and Mr. Burkett stated in their reports that the two applications of low volume Malathion insecticide had been very effective from the standpoint of early season thrip, fleahopper and boll weevil control. Greatest benefit was received by cotton producers whose cotton had not reached the one-third

grown square stage by the last application. The over-wintered weevil population was eliminated in the sprayed fields.

The only fields with weevil problems after the spray program were earlier planted fields in which the over-wintered weevils had already laid eggs in one-third grown squares before they were killed. Weevils now in spray program fields are first generation weevils from over-wintered weevils and should be controlled if in damaging numbers.

President Streit asked Mr. Drake to conduct tests during the applicator's ability to effectively cover an acre of cotton with 12 ounces of insecticide. In order to make

this type of coverage the aircraft had to fly about 25 to 30 feet high and cover 100 feet to the swath. Drake placed mirrors between cotton rows in selected spray program fields to check the coverage. He reported to the directors that the mirror tests indicated the applicators had done an outstanding job in giving excellent insecticide coverage.

In a discussion of bollworm populations, it was agreed by the directors, applicators, and extension representatives that the early season control program had little or no direct bearing on the bollworm buildups. Bollworms have been found in sprayed and unsprayed fields and many fields in

and out of the early season control program do not have bollworms.

The directors feel the early season phase of the "Massive Boll Weevil Control Program" was a success. They discussed the need of completing the remaining phases of the massive program, which are:

1. Effective in season control program for late weevil buildup and other damaging insects.
2. End of season control of diapause weevils by adding one-fourth pound per acre Guthion or one-half pound per acre Methyl Parathion to defoliant or desiccants. Also, early stalk destruction and plow-up to clean the field of food

and hibernation areas for pause weevils.

3. Clean, clear, or eliminate hibernation sites such as shrubs, chinaberry thickets and er broad leaf cover that rank as good hibernation areas for over-wintered weevils.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT  
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.  
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4, proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Section 62 of Article XVI a new subsection (c), of said Section 62; authorizing the Legislature to enact laws establishing, subject to the limitations stated, a State-wide System of Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation benefits for the officers and employees of the counties and other political subdivisions of the state, and of the political subdivisions of any county.  
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a subsection (c) which shall read as follows:  
"(c) The Texas Legislature is authorized to enact appropriate laws to provide for a System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for all the officers and employees of a county or other political subdivision of the state, or a political subdivision of a county; providing that when the necessary enabling legislation pursuant to the Constitutional authorization, then the governing body of the county, or other political subdivision of the state, or political subdivision of a county shall make the determination as to whether a particular county or other political subdivision of the state, or political subdivision of a county shall participate in the System; providing further that such System shall be operated at the expense of the county or other political subdivision of the state, or political subdivision of a county; and providing that the Legislature of the State of Texas shall never make an appropriation to pay the costs of this Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System.  
The Legislature may provide for a voluntary merger into the System herein authorized by this Constitutional Amendment of any System of Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Benefits which may now exist or that may hereafter be established under subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution; providing further that the Texas Legislature in the enabling statute will make the determination as to the amount of money that will be contributed by the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county to the State-wide System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits, and the Legislature shall further provide that the amount of money contributed by the county or other political subdivision of the state or other political subdivision of the county shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each officer and employee covered by this State-wide System.  
"It is the further intention of the Legislature, in submitting this Constitutional Amendment, that the officers and employees of the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of a county may be included in those systems regardless of whether the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county participates in the Retirement, Disability and Death Benefit System authorized by this Constitutional Amendment, or whether they participate in a System under the provisions of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution as the same is herein amended."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1966, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:  
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Texas Legislature to establish a State-wide Cooperative System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for the officials and employees of the various counties or other political subdivisions of the state, or political subdivisions of a county; authorizing the Legislature to provide for a voluntary merger into the system authorized by this Amendment of any System of Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Benefits which may now exist or that may hereafter be established; providing that the costs of this System shall be borne by the counties and other political subdivisions of the state and political subdivisions of the county electing to participate therein and the officers and employees covered by the System; and forbidding the Legislature from making any appropriations for the operation of this System."  
If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of such amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.  
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have notice of said proposed Amendment and of said election published in the Constitution of the State of Texas, and laws of this state.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section, Section 51-d, so as to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen.

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 51-d to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen.

Each voter shall mark one of said clauses on the lot, leaving the one checked by his vote on the ballot. In counties voting machines, the provision for voting against this Constitutional Amendment, shall be in the manner that each voter vote on such machines against the Constitutional Amendment."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election lots shall have printed the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39 proposing an amendment to Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, to withdraw Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements for the Texas A & M University System, including Texas A & M University, Prairie View Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas at Prairie View, Tarleton State College at Stephenville, Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Engineering Experiment Station at College Station, Texas Engineering Extension Service at College Station, and the Texas Forest Service, the Board of Directors is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of one-third (1/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any part of the Texas A & M University System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, Texas A & M University, Tarleton State College, and Prairie View A & M College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval; and for the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements for the University of Texas System, includ-

ing The Main University of Texas at Austin, The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston, The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas, The University of Texas Dental Branch at Houston, Texas Western College of the University of Texas at El Paso, The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute at Houston, The University of Texas Postgraduate School of Medicine, The University of Texas School of Public Health, McDonald Observatory at Mount Locke, and the Marine Science Institute at Port Aransas, the Board of Regents of the University of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds and notes not to exceed a total amount of two-thirds (2/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any institution of The University of Texas System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, The Main University and Texas Western College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval.

"The Texas A & M University System and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, shall not receive any General Revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case

an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of General Revenue funds.

"Said Bonds are severally authorized to pledge the whole or any part of the respective interests of Texas A & M University and of The University of Texas in the income from the Permanent University Fund, as such interests are now apportioned by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature of the State of Texas, for the purpose of securing the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds or notes. The Permanent University Fund may be invested in such bonds or notes.

"All bonds or notes issued pursuant hereto shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be incontestable. This Amendment shall be self-enacting provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing any obligation heretofore created by the issuance of any outstanding notes or bonds under this Section by the respective Boards prior to the adoption of this Amendment but any such outstanding notes or bonds shall be paid in full, both principal and interest, in accordance with the terms of such contracts."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to omit the requirement that members of the armed services vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the service.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by deleting the following language:

"Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

The text of this Section is shown below, with a broken line through the sentence which is to be deleted:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like man-

ner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering the service."

Sec. 2. The only purpose of this Resolution is to make the aforesaid deletion. The adoption of this amendment shall not be deemed to have the effect of readopting the remainder of the Section, and if any other amendment to this Section, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an earlier election or at the same election, the adoption of this amendment shall not be construed as nullifying the change made by such other amendment.

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."

Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 5. If the foregoing amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Section as amended herein and by any other proposed amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, appointments, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election.

"The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and continue in office until the expiration of the term of office for which each has

been elected or appointed under the present Constitution and laws of this state, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

"The two members of the Commission of Appeals in aid of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and shall hold their offices, one for a term of two years and the other for a term of four years, beginning the first day of January following the adoption of this Amendment and until their successors are elected and qualified. Said Judges shall by agreement or otherwise designate the incumbent for each of the terms mentioned.

"The Governor shall designate one of the five Judges as Presiding Judge and at the expiration of his term and each six years thereafter a Presiding Judge shall be elected."

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of the Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction coextensive with the limits of the state in all criminal cases of whatever grade, with such exceptions and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law.

"The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue the writ of habeas corpus, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have power upon affidavit or otherwise to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the exercise of its jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Ap-

peals may sit for the transaction of business at any time from the first Monday in October to the last Saturday in September in each year, at the State Capitol. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall appoint a clerk of the court who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and who shall hold his office for a term of four years unless sooner removed by the court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said court.

"The Clerk of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall continue in office for the term of his appointment."

Sec. 3. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

Each voter favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this state.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election shall be held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.

## Plans Being Made for Revival at First Baptist Church
