Foard Savings Bond Sales for Year Now Total \$43,227.00

Savings Bond sales for the first seven months of 1966 in Foard County totaled \$43,227.00, according to a report released by George Self, Foard County Savings Bonds chairman. This is 60 per cent of the 1966 sales goal for the county of \$60,000. July sales were \$7,356.00.

Series E and H Savings Bond sales in Texas for the first seven months of 1966 totaled \$90,239,889 which is an increase of 3.6 per cent over July of 1965.

October 25 Geese, November 19 Ducks; Early Opening

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission set October 25 as the goose season opener and November 19 as the duck season opener, at a meeting in Austin. Shooting may begin at one half hour before sunrise.

The goose and duck season will both close January 7.

The goose season will be 75 days, same as last year, and the duck season 50 days, an increase of ten days over 1965.

The goose limit will be five per day, and five in possession. Hunters may take two Canadas, or one Canada and one speckled belly.

The duck bag of four a day or eight in possession after the first day was relaxed to allow two mallards per day, or four in possession.

The 1965 restrictions on pintails was eliminated to permit a limit of these species alone.

Sandhill or little brown cranes may be legally taken in a speci-

fied portion of West Texas from October 29 through November 27. The open portion of the state is west of U. S. Highway 277 beginning at the International toll bridge in Del Rio, north to San Angelo, then along Highway 27 to US 287, at Dumas, then along 287 to the Oklahoma border.

Bag and possession limits are unchanged from last year. The daily total is four ducks with not more than 2 wood ducks, 2 canvasbacks, or 2 mallards. The possession limit is just twice the daily bag. Up to 5 merganser ducks may be taken per day but no more than 1 hooded merganser. Ten coots per day rounds out a full bag.

The goose and brant limit is 5 per day or in possession and may not include more than 1 Ross' goose, or 2 Canada geese or subspecies; or 1 Canada and 1 white-front; or 1 whitefronted goose. Sandhill cranes may be taken at the rate of 2 per day but the possession limit is 4.

Hunters are reminded that during the special early teal hunt (September 10 through 18) the shooting day begins at sunrise rather than one-half hour before sunrise. During this season a special permit is required and the

Farm Bureau Makes Comment on Proposed Amendment

Texas voters will decide how agricultural land of this state will be taxed by voting for or against the first constitutional amendment in the November 8 general election, Glenn Jones, president of the Foard County Farm Bureau, said Tuesday.

The amendment will read: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

Should the amendment pass, owners of agricultural land will be taxed to the productive value of land. "Passage of this amendment will save Texas farmers and ranchers \$6 million dollars annually," said C. H. DeVaney, Texas Farm Bureau president.

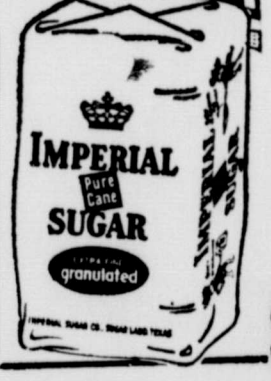

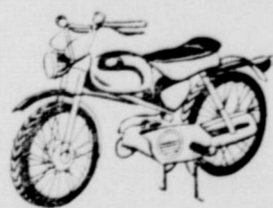

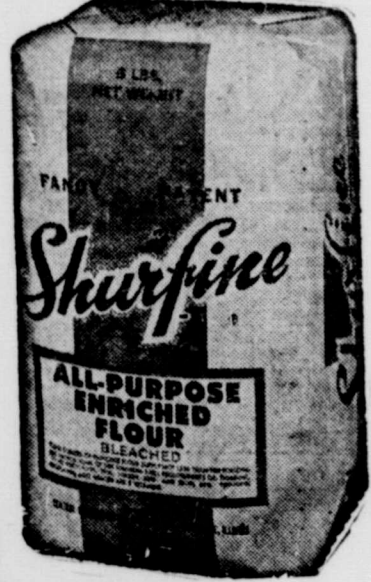

Gun Peril Cited for Hunting Fans

Scores of hunting trips are marred every year in Texas by shooting accidents, many of them fatal, grimly reminds the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

In a dove season opener, the Department said that since the oldest causes are the most common causes of field tragedies, they are being repeated:

Removing a loaded gun muzzle first from a vehicle;
Crawling through or over a fence with a loaded gun;
Failing to notice that dirt or foreign substance blocks gun barrel;

Jumping up in front of a companion into the line of fire;
Dropping a loaded gun;
Pointing a loaded gun at another person;

And, of course, "I didn't know it was loaded."
Besides being careful with firearms, hunters, according to the Department, should operate cautiously in hot weather. This is because of the general utilization of air conditioning that provides a serious contrasting temperature hazard, particularly for persons not in the best of health.

Each Sunset Cuts Minute Off Hunting

Before dove hunters become involved in a luminous dial crisis, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department suggested taking note of the actual sunset times marking the end of legal shooting.

A hunter down in a draw, in a wooded area, or even in tall vegetation might not notice the actual sunset. And guessing on a cloudy late day also is not recommended for those eager to quit firing within the time limit, noted the Department.

Sunset time for the north zone opening day September 1 is 7 p. m. in Wichita Falls.
