



Help in Preventing Home Freeze Ups

Water freeze up problems around the farm and home can often be prevented by using an inexpensive electric heating cable. says County Agent Joe Burkett. Some places are especially vulnerable to winter freeze up, such as a short section of exposed pipe in an unheated part of the barn or an outside faucet that must operate, he says. All that is needed is to wrap the heating cable around the pipe in spiral fashion and plug it into a convenient electrical outlet. It is best to wrap some kind of insulating material around the cable to conserve heat and electricity, he adds.


