## Carl Lovelady of Truscott Died in Dallas Saturday

### Victim Suffered Severe Burns in Dec. 11 Accident

Carl Curtis Lovelady, 59, of Truscott, died in a Dallas hospital Saturday morning of burns received in an accident near Truscott.

Mr. Lovelady was born May 2, 1907, in Clifton, Texas, and lived in Knox and King Counties the past twelve years. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Benjamin and veteran of World War II. He was employed as a pumper by Ard Drilling Company.

He was severely burned last December 11 at Truscott and was taken to a Wichita Falls hospital before being transferred to Dallas.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Jerry Wayne of the home; three brothers, Clyde of Knox County, Murle of Benjamin and Lee of Abilene; five sisters, Mrs. Ola Weatherby of Levelland, Mrs. Mary Everts of Valley Mills and Mrs. Selma Stewart of Lamesa.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Sunday from the First Baptist Church in Benjamin with the Rev. K. E. Wooley, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in the Benjamin cemetery under the direction of Smith Funeral Home.

## Former Truscott Woman Has Cornea Transplant

"If stores had charged me for looking, I would have spent a million dollars during the Christmas shopping season."

This was the remark of Mrs. Irvin L. Eubank of Lubbock, a former Truscott resident, who for the first time in years was able to see all of the festive decorations and items on sale during the yule holidays.

The "new look" this year came about thanks to modern surgery and the Lions Clubs' eye banks.

"Since I was a child, I thought blurry vision was a part of life," said Mrs. Eubank, "but now I know how really good it is to see clearly."

Mrs. Eubank had not been able to see well due to pressure exerted on the cornea of her eyes. Last March things began to change for her when she found that a cornea transplant could almost completely correct her problem which in the past few years had rendered her 95 per cent blind.

Her doctor in Dallas examined her eyes and immediately put her on the emergency eye bank list, which meant that as soon as an eye donor died she would receive the cornea from his eye which would be transplanted on her own eye.

"It was three weeks before the eye was received," she said. "We were afraid that before we got the eye, my own would rupture."

The eye was obtained from a 75-year-old woman who had died in the Dallas hospital where Mrs. Eubank's surgery was performed.

While recuperating from the first transplant she was given the second from the eye of a teenager in Indiana.

"I will never be able to say anything bad about any teenager, after knowing that one 19-year-old girl had the foresight to leave her eyes so that someone else might be benefitted," she added.

"The procedure for getting the eyes is relatively simple," Mrs. Eubank explained.

"When a person is placed on the emergency list, their case is sent out on one of two daily broadcasts on the eye bank ham network."

"After the eyes are located they are flown to the hospital where they will be used. The eyes must be removed from the deceased person within three to six hours after death and must be used for surgery within 48 hours after removal."

"Expenses of flying the eyes over the country to hospitals are paid by Lions Clubs over the nation. The Hi-Plains Eye Bank, which is sponsored by District 2-T-1 Lions, serves the West Texas area out of Amarillo.

After eye surgery, Mrs. Eubank has devoted much of her time to getting persons to donate their eyes to the Hi-Plains Eye Bank. "It is the least I can do," she said, "after what they have done for me."

She spends many of her mornings talking to groups and telling them of the work of the eye bank. "Anyone can donate their eyes to the bank," she explained, "how good or how bad their vision is has nothing to do with whether their eyes can be used or not."

"Also many persons think that the eye bank is like the blood bank, where the commodity can be obtained immediately, but there is nearly always a waiting period for persons needing eyes," she said.

## Two Wheat Fertilizer Demonstrations Established in Different Parts of County

Two wheat fertilizer demonstrations have been established in Foard County by County Agent Joe Burkett, in cooperation with Dr. Jim Mulkey, Superintendent of the Chillicothe Experiment Station of Texas A&M University.

One is located on Jesse Whitfield's farm northeast of Crowell and the other is on Kenneth Halbert's farm north of Foard City.

Eleven different rates and combinations of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium fertilizers were used in each demonstration. Each of these rates and combinations were repeated four times in each demonstration.

Later in the year, these plots will be marked, showing the different rates and combinations of fertilizer used, so the wheat farmers and others interested can observe them. When the wheat is harvested, the yield will be figured for each rate and combination of fertilizer and the results made available to those who want it.

Complete information on these demonstrations can be obtained from Mr. Whitfield, Mr. Halbert, Mr. Burkett or Dr. Mulkey.

## Voter Registration Now Totals 244

With only fourteen days remaining that the county tax assessor-collector's office will be open until the deadline on January 31, a total of 244 Foard County registrants have taken advantage of the new voter registration law. It's free, remember, but you do have to register. A husband may register for his wife, and vice versa. Registration can be made in the office of Sheriff W. F. Bradford.

Although 1967 is not a regular election year, there will be school and city elections coming up, and possibly others during the year.

This time last year, 330 Foard residents had purchased poll tax receipts for voting. This is a thing of the past, now; but registration is essential for those who are not under age or over age, if they intend to vote this year.

## Bank Deposits Here Take Jump of \$221,065.61 During the Past Year

Deposits in Crowell State Bank took a \$221,065.61 jump over the preceding year, a statement of condition published in this week's edition shows.

Deposits on December 31, 1966, totaled \$2,858,734.75 and on that date a year ago, they were \$2,637,699.14.

The latest deposit figure is also ahead of the last day of the year in 1964 at which time deposits totaled \$2,745,043.40. Three years ago, however, deposits at this date were \$3,304,114.52.

The last statement of condition prior to the one this week was on September 20, 1966, and at that time the deposits totaled \$3,051,795.28.

## Vehicle Inspection Lagging in State and Foard County

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reminded Texas motorists this week that most vehicles have not yet been inspected for their 1967 vehicle inspection sticker.

"The inspection period is two-thirds over and only about one-third of the vehicles have been inspected," said Garrison. "This means that during the 14 weeks remaining before the April 15 deadline for inspections, more than twice as many persons each week must have their car inspected to avoid long lines forming at the end of the period."

In urging motorists to have their vehicle inspected at an early date, Garrison pointed out that official inspection stations are easily identified by the standard sign displayed at or near the service entrance of the garage.

He advised that inspection stations are being urged to request permission to inspect any vehicle brought into the garage for repairs or regular service.

"In this way," Garrison pointed out, "time will be saved for the motorists as well as for the inspection station."

"And if you have not had your vehicle inspected, take it to one of the 5,500 authorized inspection stations for a 'check-up' and start the new year off right with a safe vehicle."

## Three Fires in City Reported Thursday, Friday

The Crowell Volunteer Fire Department was called out three times prior to the one this week.

Last Thursday afternoon, the department extinguished a hay fire in a barn belonging to Roy Barker at the airport. Friday morning the truck was called to a grass fire at the home of Dr. and Mrs. C. A. Powell.

On Friday afternoon, weeds and grass near the Farmers Gin in Crowell caught fire. The flames moved rapidly east and south pushed by the high wind which blew that afternoon. Fire Chief Leonard Tole said Monday that if the clearing on the railroad right-of-way had not stopped the flames, the entire colored and Latin sections of towns would have been in grave danger of being burned.

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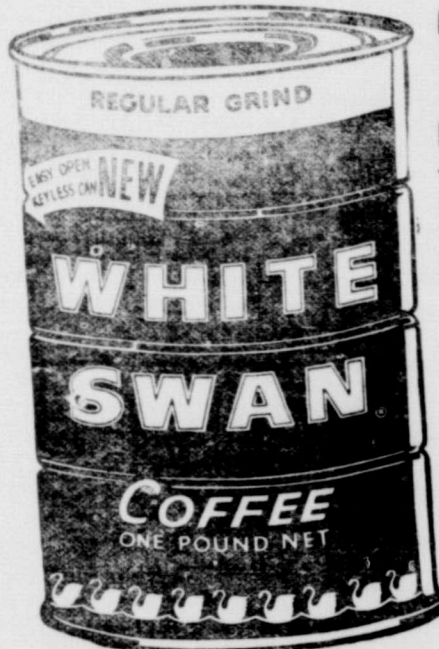

## Warning Given on Damaging Mailboxes

Mailboxes are protected by federal law, and pranksters or vandals who damage or destroy the boxes and their contents may be in for a heavy fine or imprisonment, Postmaster Ted Reeder warned today.

The postmaster noted that some 25,000 mail receptacles were damaged or destroyed in the past year. It was also noted that 2,641 persons were arrested in the year up to June 30 for damaging or destroying mail receptacles.

Postmaster Reeder quoted from the law: "Whoever wilfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letterbox or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail on any mail route, or breaks open the same or wilfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than three years."

This applies to all mail receptacles and the mail in them, even though the boxes are bought by citizens and are their personal property. Postmaster Reeder emphasized.

"Pranksters — and especially children who do not know any better—should be made to realize the seriousness of their actions," the postmaster said. "A \$1,000 fine or a term in jail is enough to take the humor out of any prank."

Often the mailbox damage is the work of youths, who do it for "kicks." And the courts have shown little sympathy for this youthful means of expression.

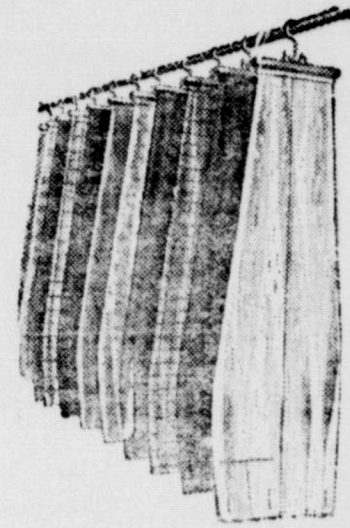

Farmers who earned at least two-thirds of their 1966 gross income from farming should file their declaration of estimated federal income tax for 1966 on or before Monday, January 16, 1967. Form 1040ES should be used for this purpose.

However, Ellis Campbell Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue in northern Texas, said that farmers need not file an estimate if they file their 1966 Federal income tax return, form 1040, and pay in full any tax due by February 15, 1967.

"Farmer's Tax Guide," (Publication No. 2251), which furnishes

information on this subject, may be obtained by dropping a post card to the District Director, Internal Revenue Service, 1600 Patterson Street, Dallas, Texas 75201 or from the county farm agent.

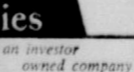

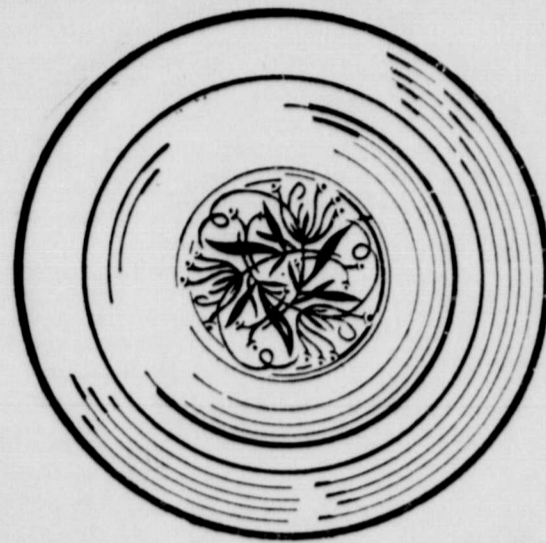

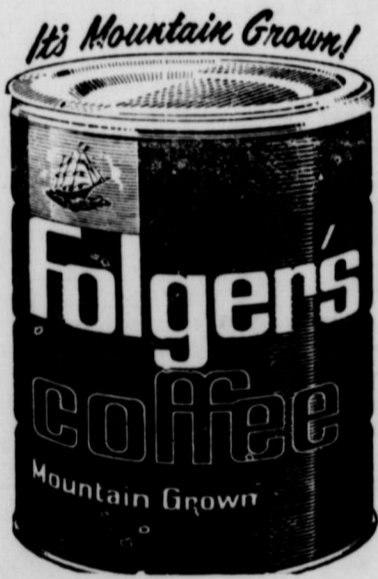

**ZIP Code Use to Aid in Mailing of Packages after Jan. 15**

Use of ZIP code will make it easier to mail packages after January 15, Postmaster Ted Reeder said today. New rates and a new system for identifying parcel post zones will go into effect on that date as provided in legislation signed into law by President Johnson on September 20, 1966. The rate increases will average about 10 cents a parcel, Reeder said. Starting July 1, the law provides for a series of size and weight increases on packages mailed between first-class offices. The Crowell Post Office is a second class office. The size and weight increases will be in five annual steps, the last coming in July 1, 1971.

Use of ZIP code in the recipient's address will enable the sender or a mail clerk to quickly determine the proper zone, and thus the rate, for the package. The zones will be based on the distance a parcel travels between the 552 sectional centers in the country, Mr. Reeder said.

By consulting a simple chart, which is available at all post offices, the zone can be readily identified because the first three numbers of the ZIP code represent the sectional center. This replaces a method in which a directory often had to be consulted to locate the proper zone for each of the nation's 33,000 post offices.

The new rates will range from 40 cents for a three-pound parcel destined for local delivery to 60 cents for the same parcel to zone 3 (150 to 300 miles) to \$1.05 to zone 8 (over 1,800). The new zoning method will also apply to air parcel post, catalogs and to publishers who pay zone rates on the advertising portion of their periodicals.

Mr. Reeder noted that all parcels mailed between post offices within the Childress sectional center will be charged at the first zone rate. There are 39 post offices within the Childress sectional center.

The new rates are expected to provide an additional \$74 million a year for the post office department. The later size and weight increases will add another \$32 a year. The additional revenue is to help keep the department within 4 per cent of costs on parcel post as the law requires.
