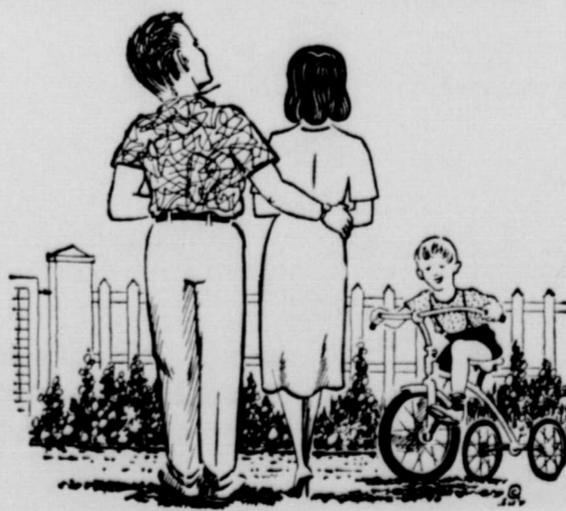
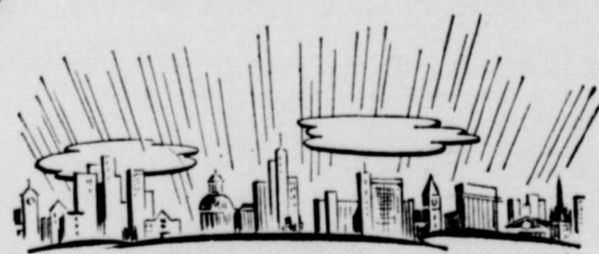

O. A. C. BOARD HAS MEETING HERE FEB. 7

The Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation held its quarterly board meeting for 1967 on February 7 in the Crowell Community Center.

Chairman Henry Scott of Vernon presided over the meeting. Scott called for a report from executive director, Don Ross, on progress being made in implementing new programs and problems encountered. Mr. Ross reported that "We now have a chance of getting our L.V.N. training school started." It was reported that the organization received a grant for a Neighborhood Center project in Hardeman county for the conduct and administration of the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation office. Mr. Malone added, though we might not get our request for a grant, the prospects of getting the training center established in Vernon at the Booker T. Washington school are good. A discussion of these projects followed and it was decided that each county's representatives on the board of directors should constitute the employment committee for projects in their respective county.

The possible expansion of the Community Action Program to include other counties was discussed. Everyone was in accord that the Community Action Program could be expanded in the event that it becomes necessary or advisable to do so. There was a motion to this effect.

The board of directors also tentatively approved an amendment to the by-laws of the corporation to the effect that representative groups including, but not limited to minority groups, elderly and rural population who feel themselves inadequately represented on the board of directors, may petition the board for adequate representation. Final action on this will be taken at the next meeting. An amendment to this effect was needed so that the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation will remain in compliance with the 1966 amendments to the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964.

Joe Meador, program consultant from the Texas Office of Economic Opportunities, praised the board of directors for their work in this program. He also reported that Community Action Programs throughout West Texas were severely limited in their operation because of the lack of funds.

Mayor Sam Breedlove gave a report on Quanah's "Operation Sparkle" and the goals which they hope to achieve through this program.

Henry Black gave an interest-

ing and informative talk on Crowell's clean-up campaign and stated that Crowell had had a successful recreation and reading program during the summer months.

It was decided that all regular meetings of the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation will be held in Crowell since it is the most centrally located city.

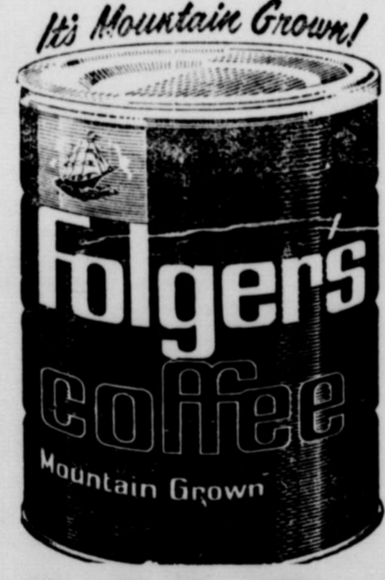
