Contract Let for Highway Work

A contract for 13,135 miles on Farm to Market Roads 2006 and 267 in Foard and Hardeman Counties has been awarded to a Vernon firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Luca Construction Co., Inc., submitted the low bid of \$172,173.17 on the project for reconstruction, grading, base and surfacing. V. J. McGee, District Highway Engineer at Childress, said the project is expected to take 120 working days.

Howard W. Bartley, Resident Engineer at Quanah, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

The 11-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack W. Brown of Truscott, correctly spelled the word "knee" to win over her last opponent, Darryl Worley, a seventh grader. The 13-year-old runner-up is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. R. Worley of Crowell.

It was the first time the champion had entered bee competition. She spelled her words without hesitation and afterward admitted that she had put much effort into studying the practice booklet. She spelled against the champion of the fifth, seventh and eighth grades to gain the district round.

Three Candidates File for Two Places on School Board

The names of three men will appear on the ballot for the trustee election of the Crowell School District. The election is set for Saturday, April 1.

Two men will be elected from the three candidates: Felix Taylor, Merl Kincaid and Mike Bird.

Kincaid is seeking his second three-year term, Taylor is seeking his first term, and Bird is seeking his sixth term, having been a member and president of the local school board since April, 1952.

Time Running Out for Inspection of Motor Vehicles

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reminded motorists this week that only six weeks remain before enforcement begins on the 1967 vehicle inspection stickers.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS Director, said that the law allows for no extension of the April 15 deadline and urged drivers to have their vehicles inspected before the last-minute lines begin forming.

Garrison pointed out that some two and one-quarter million vehicles in Texas remain to be inspected in order to comply with state law. This amounts to approximately 14 vehicles per working day for each of the 5,500 official inspection stations.

"Undoubtedly," Garrison said, "many motorists will wait until the last day, and it may be very difficult to find an inspection station that is not swamped with late-comers."

"In order to secure an orderly flow of the remaining uninspected vehicles through the inspection stations we would urge each motorist to have the inspection attended to as soon as possible. This can easily be taken care of during a routine visit to an authorized neighborhood inspection station."

January Savings Bonds Sales in Foard County Total \$8,069

The 1967 United States Savings Bond goal for Foard County is \$70,000, according to an announcement made by George Self, chairman of the Foard County Savings Bonds Committee.

January sales in the county totaled \$8,069.00 which represents 12 per cent of the 1967 sales goal.

The Texas 1967 Savings Bond goal is \$181.3 million. E and H sales during the month of January totaled \$15,191,696, which is an increase of 18 per cent over January 1966.

"The County Savings Bonds Committee was happy to learn about the new 'Freedom Shares' announced by President Johnson on February 21. They will go on sale May 1, 1967. Freedom Shares along with E and H Savings Bonds play an important role this year in supporting our forces in Vietnam and in helping stabilize the nation's economy," Self stated.

Cancer Society to Distribute Materials on Life-Saving Facts About Cancer

This year, volunteer workers of the American Cancer Society will distribute printed material containing life-saving facts about cancer, when they make their house-to-house calls in the April Crusade. Half of all those who develop cancer could be saved through earlier detection and prompt treatment. Yet, one in three is actually saved. Every individual should know cancer's warning signals, should act promptly if one appears and in any event should have a health checkup once a year.

Concerned because studies have shown that only 69 per cent of the people in the United States can name the warning signals, the society is including in these life-saving leaflets detachable stickers—with the warning signals—which can be posted in medicine cabinet in full view of every member of the family. The volunteer workers are not only working to collect money in the April Crusade, but striving to educate the public about cancer.

Dale Byerly of Lubbock met with Foard County Chapter on Tuesday, Feb. 28, giving them this information, and showed them the film, "Tell Your Neighbor," which also emphasized the aspect of personal responsibility in the prevention and control of cancer.

News About Our MEN IN SERVICE

Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Robertson of Margaret received word last week that their son, Pfc. Johnny M. Robertson, had been wounded in action in Vietnam.

Monday, March 6, a letter via the Red Cross was received from Johnny, written March 2. He said during an operation near An Hai, the Marines were being overrun by the enemy and after counter-attacking they were commanded to dig in. It was then that Johnny tripped a booby trap, causing his injuries. Official notice from Washington said the injuries were caused by "fragmentation from enemy exploding device."

He was sent to Guam for two months before returning to the battlefield. He wrote his parents that he was to receive a Purple Heart.

Speaker Gives Tips on How to Avoid Heart Attack

"Be born of parents without history of heart trouble, don't eat the foods you like best, quit smoking cigarettes, exercise regularly, and keep your blood pressure low . . . that's all it takes to keep your chances low on having a heart attack, according to Dr. Julian Acker, president of the Texas Heart Association, and speaker here on Thursday, Feb. 23.

Dr. Acker spoke to a joint luncheon meeting of the Rotary and Lions Clubs and Women's Service League in the basement of the Methodist Church.

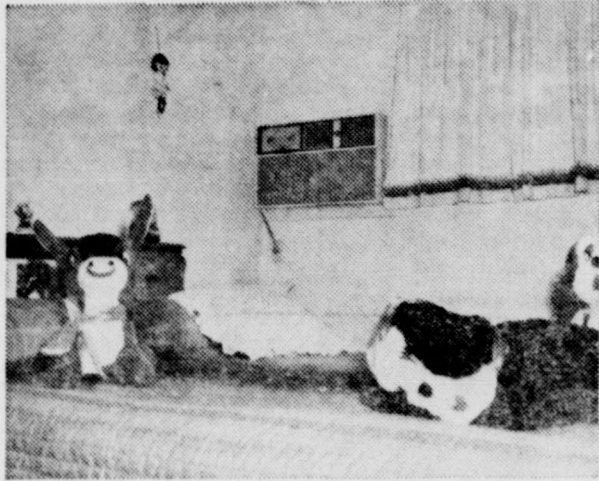
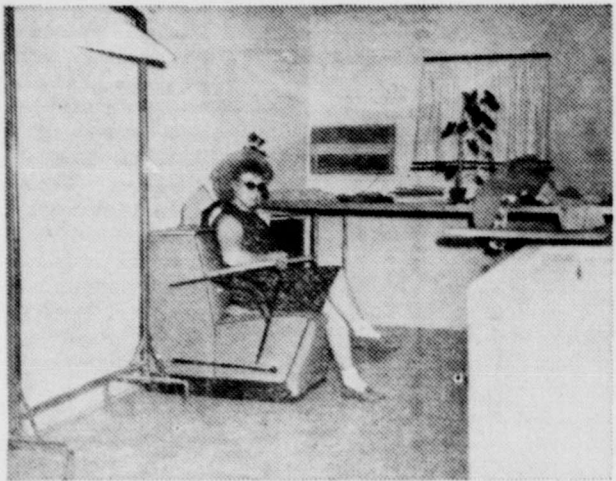

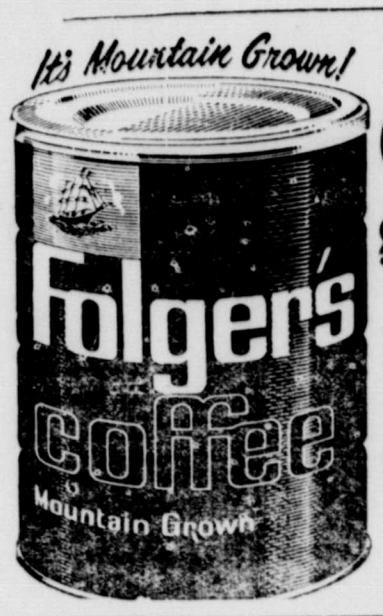

The Texas Easter Seal Society helps support 23 treatment facilities where children and adults are treated, regardless of ability to pay. Physical therapy and speech and hearing programs are offered to help the disabled make their lives fuller, despite their handicaps.

Mr. Kincaid urged every person in Foard County to increase their support of the Texas Easter Seal Society and its program of services to the crippled children and adults.

He added that anyone who could benefit from rehabilitation services should contact him at the Crowell State Bank to request services from the Easter Seal Society.



Local Baptist Pastor Opposes Liquor by the Drink Bill

"More than 24,000 new crimes will be committed each year in Texas, if the saloon bill passes," Rev. Glenn Willson, pastor of the First Baptist Church said this week in urging defeat of the law that would allow sales of liquor by the drink.

According to statistics released by Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education, the crimes per 100,000 population in open saloon states is 232.7 crimes a year higher than states with package sales only laws, such as Texas now has.

The proponents of the saloon bill claim it would be good because it would bring needed tax revenue. Rev. Willson said that "Now, for each \$1 of liquor tax collected, alcohol costs \$37 in law enforcement, welfare, lost jobs, courts, etc. The saloon bill would actually cost the state money to pay for the extra costs involved in the more than 8,000,000 additional gallons of liquor that would be consumed each year," Rev. Willson said.

"For our children's sakes," he urged Crowell residents to ask their legislators and state senators to defeat the saloon bill.

Grounds Around New Gym Are Landscaped

Last week Marvin Myers and Supt. Henry Black made a trip to Wichita Falls to purchase shrubs to landscape the grounds around the new gymnasium. The Vocational Agriculture first- and second-year students planted the shrubs and trees under the direction of their instructor, Mr. Myers.

Burford holly and gold spot euonymus were placed in the planters in front and on the south side of the gym. Other plantings included two non-bearing mulberry trees, red pyracantha, a spiny Greek juniper, Italian cypress and Arizona cypress, and a Baker Goldman arbutus. Grass will be planted at a later date.

Grade School Principal Gordon Erwin also replaced several pyracantha and pfitzer junipers on the grounds around the grade school. He was assisted in planting these shrubs by the students.

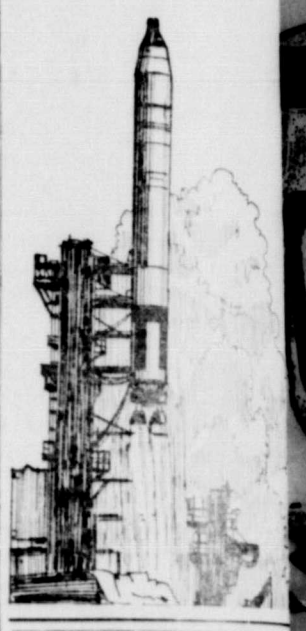

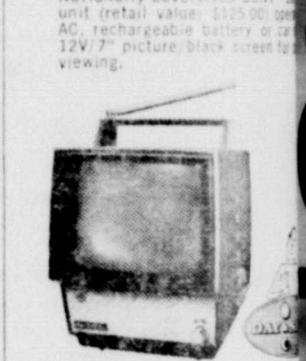
