"Salt Lake" Being Planned for Pease River

Delay in an appropriation from Congress is apparently all that is holding up planning on construction of low flow dams and brine reservoirs proposed by the Army Corps of Engineers to control salt water pollution in the Pease and Wichita river basins.

Col. George E. Rehb of Tulsa, Okla., district engineer for the Tulsa district, said in an announcement last week that both initial planning and construction funds must yet be approved by Congress, indicating that the project is still a number of years in the future for completion, although Congress approved the projects for construction last year.

He said about five years will be required to build the project. The largest reservoir in the overall project, which extends into four counties—Foard, Cottle, Knox, and King—will be located northwest of Crowell.

The brine reservoir area near Crowell will cover 5,870 acres. It will be located on Canal Creek, a tributary of the Pease River. Elevation of the stream bed at the brine damsite is 1,350 feet and the elevation at the top of the dam will be 1,487 feet.

A 36-inch pipeline will pump high concentrate brine from a 710-acre reservoir on the North Fork of the Wichita River just inside the Cottle County line near Hackberry to the larger reservoir near Crowell.

A similar brine reservoir of about 50 acres in size will also be built northwest of Truscott near the Knox-Foard County line. Large pipelines will carry concentrated brine from low flow dams west of Foard City in Foard County and from King County southwest of Truscott to the Truscott area facility.

Col. Rehb said that purchase of land will start upon receipt of construction funds, and that land required for reservoirs will be purchased in fee. Right-of-way easements will be acquired for the pipelines.

He said that inquires relative to the construction of the projects should be made to the District Engineer, U. S. Army Engineer District, Tulsa, Okla.

Water Lost to Mesquite Is Stopped



This has been accomplished in this instance by root plowing the mesquite. Mesquite when growing on rangeland normally requires from 1500 to 2500 pounds of water to produce a pound of wood. Native grasses such as sideots grama, blue grama and buffalo grass need only about 500 pounds of water to produce a pound of grass. Mesquite then robs the farmer or rancher of about 3 to 5 pounds of grass for every pound of mesquite produced. Rangeland free of mesquite will produce about one-third more pounds of grass than rangeland infested with mesquite, according to Steve Smith, range conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service.

Root plowing is only one method of controlling mesquite. Other

mechanical methods of control are tree dozing and hand grubbing. Mesquite can also be effectively controlled by aerial spraying and basal treatment. The size of the mesquite, density of the stand, cost of control, and amount of desirable grasses under the mesquite all should be considered in determining which method of control is the best to use on a particular pasture or part of a pasture. Because of the disturbance to the soil, perennial grasses should be seeded when any form of mechanical control is performed. This should also be accompanied by a rest until the end of the first growing season. This will give the grass seeding a chance to become established. Pastures that have been aerial sprayed or basal treated should be rested for at least 90 days following control.

Pictured above is a root-plowed area on the Jeff Bell farm southeast of Crowell. Mr. Bell plowed the area and seeded it to switch grass, sideots grama and green sprangletop. This pasture is now being deferred until after frost next fall. This conservation practice and others on Mr. Bell's farm are being carried out by him through the Great Plains Conservation Program which is administered by the Soil Conservation Service.
