GOP Congressman Doesn't Want Foard County in District

(Editor's Note: Below is a news article copied from the Matador Tribune. It first appeared in a recent edition of the Amarillo Daily News.)

If U. S. Rep. Bob Price of Pampana had his way, he would like to get two South Plains counties out of his congressional district, make sure three others aren't added, and possibly annex a "fairly good Republican county."

Price's gerrymandering preferences were revealed to Globe-News Austin bureau reporter Clyde Walter by a statehouse source.

They were contained in a letter written by Price to his four fellow Republicans in the Texas Legislature, one who is drawing legislation to redistrict the state's congressional districts.

The two counties he wishes taken out of his 18th Congressional District are Motley and Cottle counties, and the three he wants kept out are Floyd, Hardeman and Foard counties.

Price refers in his letter to Motley and Cottle counties as "my worst in the district as far as gaining Republican votes," and states that "Floyd, Hardeman and Foard counties are traditionally old southern Democratic cotton counties with a very poor Republican voting record, just like Motley and Cottle counties."

As for adding counties, Price said in his letter, "If we need to add Hale County to bring our population numbers up, history I think will show it has been a fairly good Republican county. However, this would open the door to Rep. Ralph Wayne to enter the congressional race against me in 1968."

Contacted last Thursday in Washington, Price said he was surprised the newspaper had access to the letter and added, "I don't know if I can add anything because it is pretty plain what I said in the letter."

He said he had written the letter in response to telephone conversations he had had with Republican members of the Texas Legislature concerning the vote history of counties in and adjacent to his district.

The conversations, he said, regarded the redistricting bill which is being written by the state legislature.

Concerning the letter, he said, "I don't know what harm it will do other than it might make some people mad in Motley and Cottle counties, but I guess that is one of the hazards of politics."

He said his intention in writing the letter was to protect the GOP cause "which is natural, after all."

Republican members of the Texas House of Representatives are Malouf Abraham of Canadian, Frank Cahoon of Midland and Frank Scoggins of Corpus Christi. Cahoon has authored one bill aimed at redistricting congressional districts in the state.

The lone Republican member of the Senate is Henry Grover of Houston.

The letter continued, "Lamb County has quite a few voters more than Bailey County. Traditionally, it is a rather bad county for us. I lost Lamb County by four votes in 1966. It possibly would be one of the first counties to go against me heavily in a bad year, but it still would be better than Floyd, Motley, Cottle, Foard and Hardeman."

"In closing," the letter said, "I believe the most ideal situation would be for me to retain Bailey, Lamb and Hale Counties, and not have Floyd, Motley, Cottle, Foard and Hardeman."

Temporary Relief



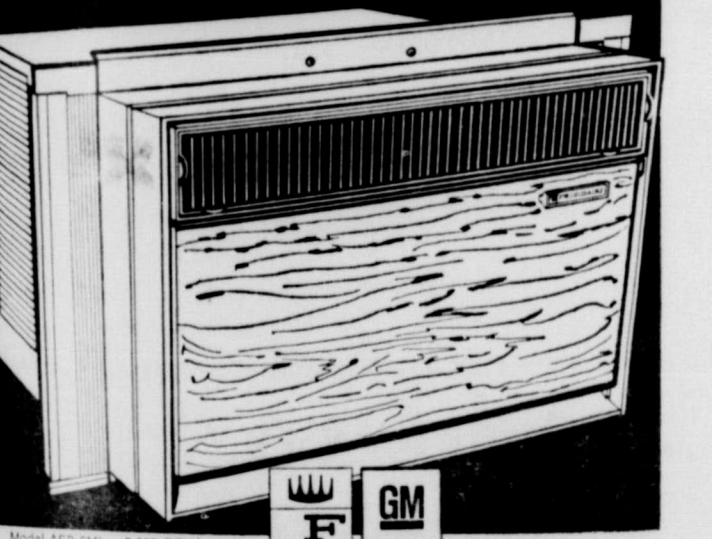

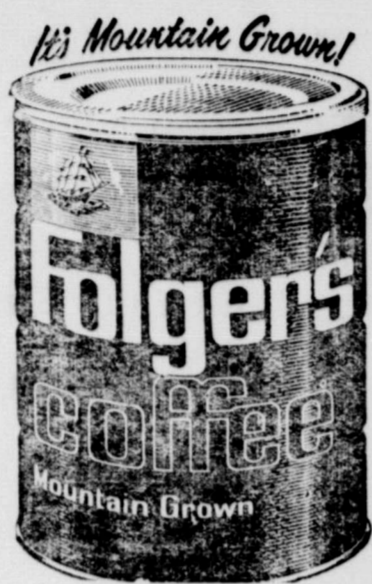
