Three Teams Deadlocked for L. L. Lead

Although it sounds highly improbable, Foard County Little League teams proved last week that it was possible, and, as of last Friday night, three teams were deadlocked for the top slot in the local league, each with two wins, one loss, and one tie game. In the Tuesday night games, both the early and late games ended in a tie. Then, on Thursday night, Farmers Elevator clipped the other two teams leading Crowell State Bank Yankees by a 19-5 score, and Foard County Mill outscored VFW by an 8-5 count to place the league standings in their tightest ever in history.

Details of the week's games are as follows:

Tuesday night, May 16, 7:30 p. m.: Foard County Mill 10, VFW 10. Curfew ended this game with the score all even as Johnny Hernandez came through with a clutch base hit in the fifth to tie the game. David Stapp was the leading hitter for VFW with a two-for-three hitting performance. Hernandez, Tim Daniels, Lynn Nelson and Ernest Barrera each got one hit for the Yankees.

For Foard County Mill, Jackie Blackburn hit two-for-four; Jim Shook, Randy Prince, Rocky Bachman and Mark Abbott each picked up one hit.

Tuesday night, May 16, 9:30 p. m.: Crowell State Bank 6, Farmers Elevator 6. The Yankees didn't score for the first three innings in this one, but they coupled back-to-back doubles by Allen Tapp and Philip Bell with three walks to score four times in the fourth, then picked up two more on walks in the sixth for the tie game. Rudy Rodriguez also hit a double for the Yankees, and Philip Bell came through with a game-saving catch in the last inning.

For the Braves, David Fish was the hitting star of the game with two-for-three; Adrian Martinez, Don Ray Santos, Billy Evenson and Joel Watson each banged out one hit, and Watson made two fine catches in centerfield.

Thursday night, May 19, 7:30 p. m.: Farmers Elevator 19, Crowell State Bank 6. The Yankees had on their "hittin' britches" on this night and gave the Braves a shellacking to the tune of eleven hits and ten walks. Philip Bell and Ricky Nichols hit three-for-four; Reed Davis and Allen Tapp hit two-for-four; and Bob Taylor picked up one hit. Philip Bell was featured in a double play, also.

David Fish continued to do the best hitting for the Braves with a two-for-three performance; Danny Johnson, Adrian Martinez and Billy Evenson each hit safely once.

Thursday night, May 18, 9:30 p. m.: Foard County Mill 8, VFW 5.

Rocky Bachman pitched the entire five innings for the Cardinals and helped his cause by hitting two-for-three; Mark Abbott also hit two-for-three; Randy Prince hit two-for-four, and Jackie Blackburn and Emmitt Newman each garnered one hit.

David Stapp continued as leading hitter for the Veterans with a two-for-two performance; Johnny Hernandez got the only other Veteran hit with a single in the third frame.

During this week, VFW is playing Farmers Elevator with pre-season favorite, Foard County Mill, knocking heads with Crowell State Bank.

Counties presently making up the corporation, formed to operate Office of Economic Opportunity programs in the area, are Wilbarger, Hardeman, Foard and Cottle.

—Mapped plans for a visit by OEO officials to the four counties last Friday.

Sheriff Callaway Warns Out-of-State Truckers to Buy Texas Stickers

Out-of-state licensed trucks carrying grain in Foard County must have a sticker certifying the Texas fee has been paid.

Sheriff Dan Callaway said Tuesday these stickers are available at county and state tax assessor's

office, and the Sheriff said the cost is about one-twelfth of the annual Texas registration fee.

Sheriff Callaway added that as in the past, weights and measure men from the state will be operating here again during the harvest. He urged local farmers who employ out-of-state trucks to haul their grain to the elevator, to urge the operator to buy a sticker.

In this way, no delay will result by having the truck stopped and a ticket written by the state authorities.




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

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World War II Outfit to Have Reunion in Quanah June 9-10

The Normandy Invasion, Battle of the Bulge and other experiences will be recalled when members of the 535th Antiaircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion hold their first national reunion at Quanah June 9 and 10.
 James E. Long of Quanah, who is heading arrangements, said that approximately 75 persons including wives and children are expected for the get-together.
 Meetings and visits are scheduled for Lake Pauline club house, Tours of Quanah industries and a memorial service also are planned.

Quanah Chamber of Commerce, headed by President Doug Jeffrey, will cooperate in welcoming the group.

Long said the 535th trained in California, Camp Atterbury, Ind., Tennessee and Camp Davis, N. C. The 40mm. guns and half-tracks of the outfit began landing on D-Day in Normandy and the battalion later took part in the Battle of the Bulge, defense of the Remagen bridgehead against air attack, and the mop-up of the Ruhr pocket.

The 535th was on occupation duty for a short time in Germany, then guarded German prisoners in rehabilitation work at LaHavre, France, in late 1945, before members finally were shipped back to the United States.

Each member will be presented with a two-color permanent facsimile of the certificate awarded to the original member of the association at their annual reunion in Waco in 1967. All of those applications received and verified by June 1, 1967, will be considered for charter membership.

It is planned to publish a new annual newsletter and hold annual reunions as the original association did. Two types of memberships have been designated regular and honorary. The former is reserved for direct descendants of members of the brigade and the latter (of which no more than five will be awarded annually) is reserved for those individuals who have made a worthwhile contribution to Texas Confederate history or have contributed to the Confederate Research Center, either materially or promotionally.

THIRTY YEARS AGO

The brick work on the new grammar school building is rapidly nearing completion and building of the roof should start within the next two or three weeks.

Bus drivers for the Crowell Independent School District, W. W. Wood, Roy Fox, Ernest Spears, Dale Jones and John L. Hester Jr., gave a luncheon at North Pocket Park last Friday afternoon for the school children of this district who rode their buses during the school term. Other guests attending the luncheon were Supt. I. T. Graves and all members of the Crowell school board.

One inch of precipitation was recorded at the Crowell State Bank following the rainfall early Tuesday morning. A general rain was received over the western portion of Foard County and light showers were recorded in the eastern part.

The first load of Foard County wheat from the 1937 crop was brought in by Louie Riehmayer from the H. Gloyna farm five miles northeast of Crowell Tuesday and was sold to Self Grain Co. One dollar, plus a life premium, was paid by E. W. Self, manager, for this first load of wheat. It was combined from one and one-half acres.

Foundation work for three new units to be added to the Texas gasoline plant in the southwest part of Foard County are being constructed and the new machinery will be installed within a short time. The additional power units are being installed to aid in boosting natural gas to the Lake Pauline plant of the West Texas Utilities Co., near Quanah, commercial users of the entire output of the Texasaco plant. When the three new units are installed, they will complete a total of ten.







**Ask County Agent
About Treatment
for Shrub Disease**

Iron chlorosis has been showing up in ornamental plants in Foard County. Symptoms, according to County Agent Joe Burkett, are generally a yellowing of the green foliage due to failure of chlorophyll to develop normally.

The chlorosis occurs in susceptible plants where and when iron is not available to them, adds the county agent. This lack of iron may be due to a deficiency or to the iron being unavailable because of alkaline conditions. In either case, iron supplied by ferrous sulfate or iron chelates will be beneficial.

Ferrous sulfate can be applied as a foliar spray at the rate of two teaspoons per gallon of water, plus a spreader-sticker. A teaspoon of household detergent can be used as the spreader-sticker. The county agent says the spray should be applied in the late afternoon to avoid leaf burn and should be repeated in about 10 days if the yellowing persists.

Further information can be obtained from Burkett.


