

Wheat Allotments Will Be Reduced for Next Year

Wheat allotments for the 1968 wheat crop have been reduced by 13 per cent, according to a statement by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman last Friday.

The 1968 allotment for wheat will be 59.3 million acres compared with 68 million this year and 51.6 million in 1966.

The department offers payments to growers who plant within their ndividual allotments.

Freeman told a news confernce that a smaller acreage next year would produce sufficient wheat to meet both domestic needs and anticipated foreign requirements.


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
