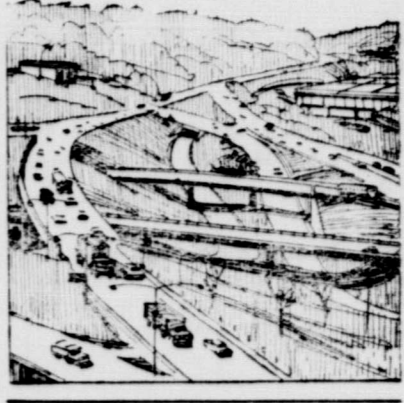

## Entomologist Files Report on Cotton for This Region

Most cotton is planted, but dry-land cotton producers continue to plant and replant in several of the 36 Rolling Plains Counties due to unfavorable weather conditions, reports Emory P. Boring of Vernon, area entomologist with the Extension Service, in his first

"Rolling Plains Cotton Insect Report" of the season. Mr. Boring's cotton insect reports, compiled from field data gathered by two Rolling Plains Cotton Insect Survey teams, county agricultural agents and other individuals, will be released weekly. This report covers Wilbarger, Foard, Hardeman, Jones, Mitchell, Nolan, Scurry and Fisher counties. Mr. Boring sums up the insect situation something like this: Thrips—Light to medium infestations in Wilbarger and heavy populations in Hardeman County. Aphids—Medium infestations in several Wilbarger County fields and light to medium populations

reported in counties from which reports were received. Fleahoppers—Currently not detected in damaging numbers, but as cotton plants begin to fruit, they are expected to move in. Boll Weevils—Found in several fields in Wilbarger and one field in Foard County in populations ranging from 65 to 131 weevils per acre. Yellow-striped armyworms—Found damaging leaves of very young cotton in Wilbarger County. Garden webworms—Found damaging leaves of young cotton in Wilbarger County. Darkling beetles—Found dam-

aging young cotton in Jones County. Grasshoppers—Reported heavy in some fields in Hardeman County. **Wheat Allotments Will Be Reduced for Next Year**

Wheat allotments for the 1968 wheat crop have been reduced by 13 per cent, according to a statement by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman last Friday. The 1968 allotment for wheat will be 59.3 million acres compared with 68 million this year and 51.6 million in 1966.

The department offers payments to growers who plant within their individual allotments.

Freeman told a news conference that a smaller acreage next year would produce sufficient wheat to meet both domestic needs and anticipated foreign requirements.
