### Five Accidents Reported in County During July

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Foard County during the month of July, according to Sgt. Floyd Etheridge, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$975.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first seven months of 1967 shows a total of sixteen accidents resulting in no one killed, eight persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$8,895.00.

### Additions Made for Safety-Checking of Motor Vehicles

New Stickers Will Go on Sale on Monday, August 28

Highway Patrol Safety Officer Chester Fant of Quanah reminded Foard County residents this week that new auto safety inspection stickers will become available on August 28.

In making the announcement, Mr. Fant pointed out that all the present requirements for the safety check will remain in effect, with the following additions:

- Front seat belts are required on every motor vehicle in which front seat belt anchorages were a part of the manufacturer's original equipment on the vehicle, including both American made and foreign made. This begins with the 1962 model autos and later. Belts and buckles must be in serviceable condition.
- Cars will be rejected if steering wheel has two inches or more play. The front wheels must turn from full right to full left without jamming, and the fluid in the power steering on autos so equipped must not be below recommended level.
- Vehicles will be rejected if any wheel has defective or bent rim flanges, or loose or missing bolts, nuts and lugs, or if rims have defects and cracks to the extent that they impair the safe mounting and proper retention of tires.
- A fee of \$1.75 will be charged by the inspection station for every inspection made, whether approved or rejected, except that any inspection station shall re-inspect free of charge any vehicle rejected by it, after necessary adjustments have been made, within a period of seven days.

### ASCS Community Committeemen Election to Be Held in September

The election of community committeemen for 1968 will be held the third week in September, according to Ray Hysinger, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

States of nominees for membership on ASC community committees soon will be established at the ASCS county office.

Mr. Hysinger pointed out that lists of eligible voters in each community are available in the ASCS county office. He explained that any local resident who is eligible to take part in an ASCS farm program may vote in the community committee elections, and he may hold office as a committeeman regardless of race, color, creed, or national origin. Further information regarding qualifications of committeemen is available at the ASCS county office.

Farmers who are eligible to vote in the community committee elections also have the right to nominate by petition candidates for committee membership any farmer who is eligible and who has indicated that he is willing to serve. Such petitions, each one nominating one farmer and signed by six or more eligible voters, may be filed at the county office any time before August 25, 1967. Eligible voters may sign as many petitions as they wish. Additional nominations may be made by the incumbent ASC community and county committees. A recent change in the nominating procedure seeks to insure fair and impartial elections by reducing vote splintering of minority group candidates, Hysinger said.

This year, for the first time, the election of ASC community committees throughout the nation will be held during the third week in September. Previously such elections had been held at various times in different states from July through December.

Boundaries of the various communities are the same as in the past and are posted in the ASCS office and will be posted in each community.

## DRIVERS LICENSE SCHOOL WILL BE HELD HERE NEXT MONTH

A Drivers License School will be taught in Crowell next month. The school will be open to the public and will be sponsored here in Foard County by Sheriff Dan Callaway and The Foard County News.

Dates for the school have been set for Monday, Tuesday and Thursday nights, Sept. 11, 12 and 14. The instructor for the school will be Highway Patrol Safety Officer Chester Fant of Quanah.

The approximate 2-hour sessions will begin at 8 o'clock each night.

In announcing the school, Officer Fant stressed three points in urging everyone to attend.

1. It is open to everyone, of any age, whether licensed or unlicensed.
2. The school is absolutely free.
3. He is not trying to find out who has a license, but he will be trying to help those who want help in learning. It will also be an excellent refresher course for licensed drivers.

The school is taught in such a manner as those having difficulty reading and writing can understand.

Older people who have never had a drivers license exam should be interested in attending, and he said the information learned in the school could be invaluable to them, especially if proposed legislation goes through requiring elderly drivers to be examined.

Mr. Fant said that he has held these drivers license schools in many towns in his territory, and that response has been excellent. He is hoping for a large attendance at the school in Crowell.

## FBI Seeking High Caliber Young Men and Women

On July 26, FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover completed 50 years of service in the United States Department of Justice. During this period he has seen many crises which threatened the nation's security. No crisis, however, has been more critical than that which faces the nation today, with world conflicts, threats of internal subversion, rising crime rates, and civil disobedience.

J. Gordon Shanklin, Special Agent in charge of the FBI's Dallas office, which covers this area, advises that high caliber young men and women are needed to fill vacancies at the FBI's Washington, D. C., headquarters and to share in the opportunity of meeting the challenges which are presented.

Mr. Shanklin informed that positions are available for typists and clerks. Starting salaries are \$4269 for typists, and \$3925 for clerks. Applicants must be citizens of the United States, high school graduates, and at least 16 years of age. Additional details can be obtained from the FBI resident agency in Wichita Falls.

According to Mr. Shanklin, many persons occupying clerical positions in Washington attend the colleges and universities in the nation's Capitol while working for the FBI. Effort is made to arrange working hours whereby any employee desiring to further his education may do so. The FBI also assists employees in locating suitable living accommodations.

Mr. Shanklin pointed out that many FBI Special Agents began as clerks in Bureau headquarters. Mr. Shanklin noted that recent high school graduates and returning servicemen who have not yet settled in permanent employment may find careers in the FBI of interest. He said the FBI has need for a limited number of radio operators, in addition to the positions described above.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund thereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that a much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds hereafter issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-

irement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.



**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT**  
 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
 Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:  
 "Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."  
 "AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

Austin, Tex.—State and hospital officials are confident the far-reaching new medicare program will begin functioning as scheduled on September 1.

Program will bring medical and hospital benefits to 350,000 needy Texans. It is authorized by the federal law which provides medicare to old folks.

Texas Department of Public Welfare, which will administer medicare, estimates benefits during the first year of operation will total \$125,000,000. Federal funds will match a \$26,700,000 state outlay on a four-to-one basis.

Points to remember:

- Eligible for benefits are Texans on public welfare assistance rolls—old age assistance, aid to blind, families with dependent children and the totally and permanently disabled, or those eligible for such assistance who are patients at state mental and tuberculosis hospitals. (Coverage is automatic for the latter, with no application as such required.)

- Services include in-patient and out-patient hospital care, diagnostic work such as laboratory fees and x-ray costs, doctor bills and nursing home charges.

- Bills will be paid through a "fiscal intermediary." Welfare Department will contract with Blue Cross-Blue Shield to handle doctors' bills (on strict basis of prevailing charges.) Hospitals will be paid actual costs shown by audit. Blue Cross-Blue Shield will be reimbursed by the state and will receive an additional service fee.

- Eligible welfare enrollees will receive identification cards from the Department of Public Wel-

fare. Cards can be presented to insure care as limited by details of the federal act (Title 19).

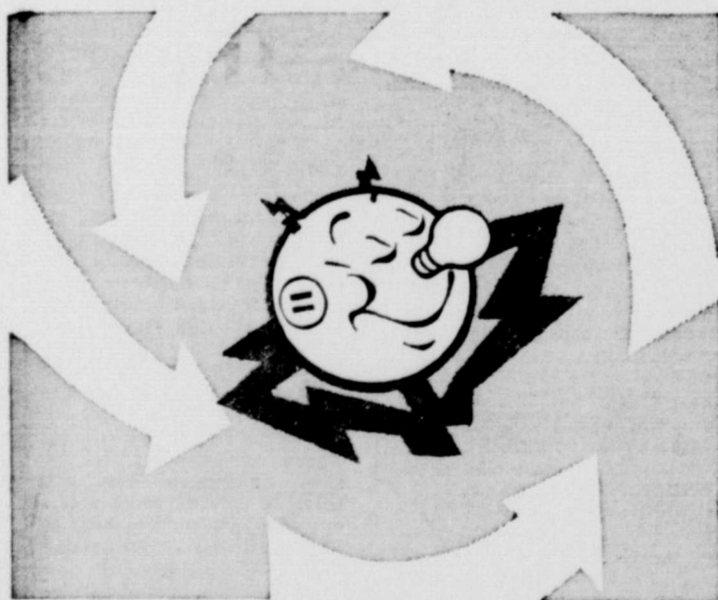

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also author-

ize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxing voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13, to be known as Section 52e, reading as follows:

"Section 52e. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49e, as follows:

"Section 49e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). 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## Consumers Eat More for Less

Total food expenditures for 1967 are increasing but, at the same time, consumers are spending less of their income to stock the family pantry.

Texas A&M University reports that the money spent for food in the first quarter of 1967 averaged 17.5 per cent of the consumer's take-home pay.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture reports that share of income for food for all of 1967 will likely average around 17.5 per cent of the family's disposable income as compared with 18 per cent in 1966.

While consumers are spending less of their income percentage-wise, total food expenditures nationwide are expected to exceed the 1966 level by about 4 per cent. However, this 4 per cent increase amounts to only about two-thirds of the increase expected for disposable income.

Part of the 1967 increase in total food expenditures will likely be because of price increases, the University says. However, about one-half of the expenditure gain is attributable to a one per cent increase in per capita food consumption and a similar population increase. The balance will probably be caused by shifts to higher priced items in the food budget.

## New Approach to Stocking of Fish Yields Bigger Bass

A new approach in fisheries management has produced three pound black bass in 14 months at Lake Casa Blanca near Laredo, according to L. V. Guerra, aquatic biologist for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Instead of the usual 100 black bass fingerlings per surface acre, Department fisheries crews stock only 60 in an effort to find out if reduced stocking ratios could produce larger fish in a shorter time, Guerra said.

In 14 months following a complete renovation of the lake by the fisheries crews of the Department, Guerra reports black bass weighing up to three pounds, six ounces taken in sampling nets. On a monthly basis, the bass have gained an average of more than three ounces in weight and an inch in length.

Reports also indicated that fish taken from the lake in netting surveys were fat and healthy.

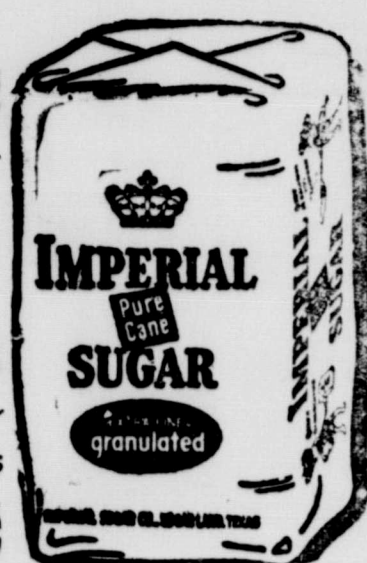

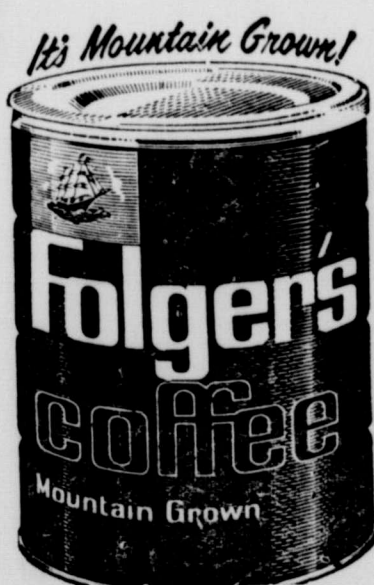

## Water to Flow from Greenbelt Reservoir Soon

Editor's note: The article which follows was taken from the Friday, August 11, edition of the Amarillo Daily News. The paper was given to the News by C. C. McLaughlin.)

Clarendon—Engineers with the Greenbelt Municipal Water Authority will twist a valve within the next week to admit millions of gallons of treated water into an aqueduct which will carry it 110 miles eastward to water mains in Childress and Quanah.

The maneuver marks the completion of the \$8½ million Greenbelt Reservoir, aqueduct system and treatment plant and almost assures the cities of Clarendon, Childress, Crowell, Hedley and Quanah a "sweet" and reliable water supply.

R. C. Alexander, resident engineer of the engineering firm of Freese, Nichols and Endress of Fort Worth, said the dam and aqueduct is complete and the filter plant is about 95 per cent finished and practically functional.

He said treated water from the dam which now impounds 3,200 acre feet of water should be dispatched eastward within a week. Childress and Quanah, both of which have long suffered summer water shortages, have been receiving supplemental water this summer from the Lelia Creek gathering system, a part of the Greenbelt project.

At normal level, Greenbelt reservoir will impound 60,000 acre feet of water and the treatment plant will have a capacity of 6 million gallons daily.

Alexander pointed out that the Greenbelt watershed has missed most of the heavy rains enjoyed by other parts of the Panhandle this summer and that the water stored there is primarily from spring flows from the Salt Fork of the Red River, Kelly and Carroll Creeks, all of which feed into the lake.

The Greenbelt project which was started three years ago is similar, but smaller in scope to the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority. Its primary function is a municipal water supply, but it is also designed for recreation.

The lake is presently closed to both water sports and fishing because of its relatively low level, Alexander said. It will be closed until the water level reaches the dam's rip rap or another 25 feet. Alexander said excessive wave action caused by boats made it necessary to close the lake.

Greenbelt is stocked with bass, pike and other game fish and its water is among the best available in the Panhandle.

Alexander described the water as "very soft" containing only about 212 parts mineral per million.

Greenbelt dam is exceeded in size in the Panhandle only by Lake Meredith. It is 110 feet deep, 6,000 feet long, 700 feet wide at the base and contains 3.6 million cubic yards of dirt fill and 3,400 cubic yards of concrete.

R. N. Adams of Kaufman was general contractor for the dam; Brown-McKee of Lubbock built the filter plant and J. T. Brodie of Amarillo and R. H. Fulton of Lubbock were contractors for the aqueduct.

James L. Kuhn of Childress, general manager of the authority, will occupy offices at the treatment plant as soon as the administrative offices there are complete.

Dr. Shell Townsend of Childress is president of the authority.
