EVERYONE 21 AND OVER MUST REGISTER TO VOTE

VOTER REGISTRATION DRIVE UNDERWAY IN COUNTY

With three weeks remaining before the deadline of January 31, a total of 767 Foard County residents have registered to vote in the tax assessor-collector's office.

Residents should keep in mind that although they have not had to pay a poll tax or register in a number of years due to being over the required age, new provisions of the law call for EVERYONE who expects to vote this year to have registered to vote before the deadline.

In order to accommodate rural residents, Sheriff Dan Callaway said this week that he will be in three rural areas next week to register voters. Next Tuesday, January 16, he will be at Lawson's Store in Rayland; on Wednesday, January 17, he will be at Margaret; and Thursday, January 18, he will be in the Thalia community. Residents of these communities who have not already registered are urged to register while the sheriff is in their community.

Callaway also said that for anyone in Crowell who would like to register, and is unable to climb the steps, should call him and he will bring a registration blank to their car or to their home.

This concentrated effort to register all qualified persons to vote is part of a drive to get the vote out during the many elections to be coming up this year.

Remember, everyone who expects to vote this year must register before the deadline.

A form will be found on page 5 which can be filled out and mailed to the local tax assessor-collector's office to register.

grain reserve would have stored 3 1/2 million bushels of wheat for emergencies, and he believed that the bill would have brought the price of wheat upward.

Adding that the nation used about 500 million bushels of wheat each year, he said that the wheat growers needed some sort of public relations program to stimulate the use of more wheat domestically.

The Congressman expressed optimism about the future of the American farmer, with his optimism based principally on the ever-increasing population of the nation and the world.

He cited the important role of the farmer in feeding people at a lower cost to the consumer than any country in the world.

In answer to a question from one of the group about his possible appointment to a federal judgeship, Purcell expressed no knowledge of the appointment coming up, although the daily newspapers of the state have speculated that Purcell would receive the appointment.

Also at the community center, the Congressman visited classes for LVN nurse training that are underway here. Twenty-one women are taking the course financed by federal funds.

The Congressman was accompanied to Crowell by Joe Brown, farm editor of the Times Publishing Co., and Bill Neal, Quanah attorney.

Thin Layer of Ice Covers This Area Last Wednesday

The thin layer of ice which covered Foard County last Wednesday morning, made driving and walking extremely hazardous, and several persons reported falls during the ice storm.

However, weather forecasts of continuing freezing moisture did not pan out, and the ice had melted from the streets by Wednesday afternoon, thus preventing more accidents and falls.

The ice glaze was so thin that it was barely visible and no beneficial moisture of measurable amount was received.

Another front struck Saturday, and dropped the mercury to about 7 degrees early Sunday to record the coldest weather of the winter. The low Sunday night was 19 degrees. No moisture accompanied the last front.

A repetition of last Wednesday's ice occurred Tuesday morning of this week, when another thin layer of ice blanketed the area, and made outside travel hazardous.

November Savings Bonds Sales Here Total \$914,000

During the month of November, United States Savings Bond sales in Foard County totaled \$914,000. The January-November sales totaled \$36,413,000, and this is 52 per cent of the 1967 goal of \$70,000,000.

During the first eleven months of 1967, savings bond sales in Texas totaled \$153,756,962, which is 85 per cent of the 1967 sales goal and a 10.3 per cent increase over sales during the same period last year.

Nationally, the total sales of Series E and H savings bonds for the first eleven months of 1967 amounted to \$4,546 million — 1.3 per cent above a year earlier.

Sales of the new Savings Notes available only to regular buyers of E bonds totaled \$17.3 million during November, bringing the cumulative total to \$62.8 million since May.

With a rampage of flu, sore throats and colds immobilizing a large number of Foard County residents, the Crowell Schools dismissed last Wednesday afternoon for the remainder of the week, one day after students returned to

the classrooms following the Christmas vacation.

About 60 students were absent last week, to prompt the decision to close.

The Foard County Hospital has been swamped with patients, too, with the in-patient count rising to over 30 this week.

It was hoped by school officials that the dispersing of the school children would prevent any further spread of the seige of winter-time ailments.

However, when school resumed Monday, a total of 107 students were absent; however, school officials decided not to dismiss.

A total of 83 students were absent from school Tuesday.

Deposits Take Big Jump Over One Year Ago

\$361,654.47 Increase Noted in Past Year at Crowell State Bank

Over one third of a million dollars increase in deposits at the Crowell State Bank over the same date last year was reported following the issuing of the statement of condition of the local bank on January 1.

Deposits on January 1, 1968 were \$3,220,419.21, which is \$361,654.47 more than on Dec. 31, 1966. Deposits are up some \$582,000 over the same date two years ago.

The last bank call before the one this Jan. 1 showed deposits now are \$48,430.55 more than on that date, October 4, 1967.

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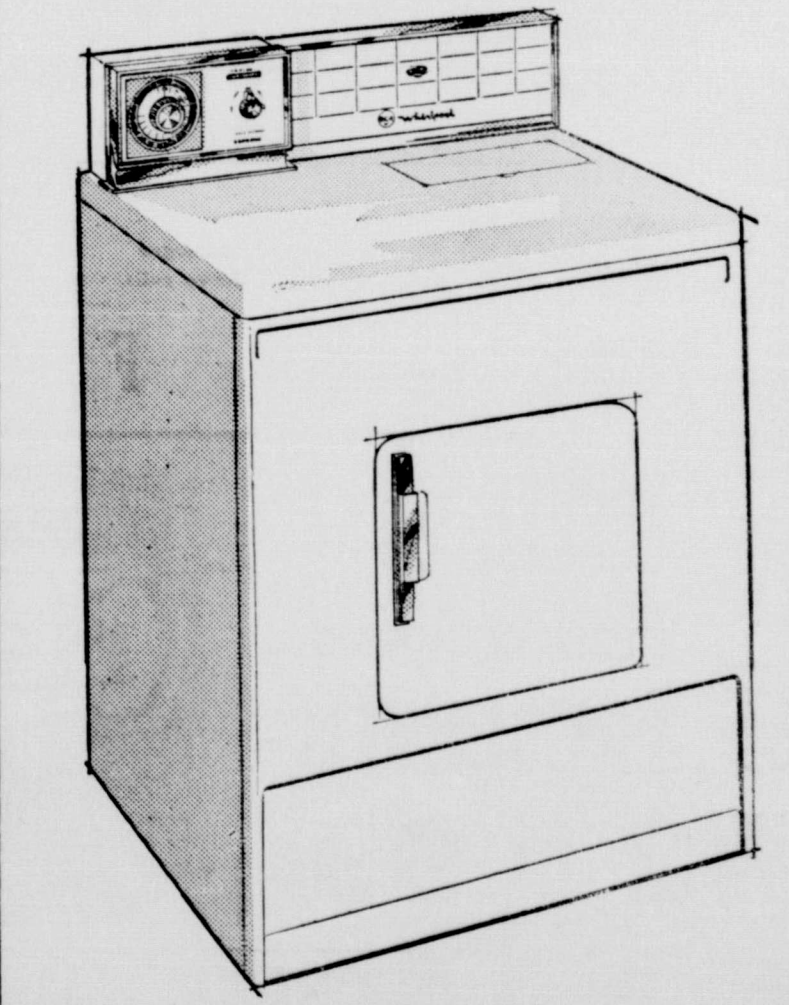

Time to Register to Vote . . .

Many elderly people in Foard County will be disappointed when they go to the polls this year to vote and find they cannot vote because they failed to register.

These are the same people who have been exempt from paying the poll tax because they had reached the age of 60. The new laws reads that every person who is 21 or older must register before January 31 to be eligible to cast a ballot in the approaching primaries and the general election.

This must be done by January 31.

Those who have not registered can do so in a few minutes at the office of the county tax assessor and collector. They will fill out the card for you which lists your name, age and address. Anyone who cannot go to the court house can call the tax assessor's office, and a representative will bring a registration blank to your home. In addition, Sheriff Dan Callaway said this week that he will be in Rayland on Tuesday, January 16; Margaret on January 17 and Thalia on January 18 to register voters in those areas.

This is a most important election year. A president and vice president will be elected as well as a new governor and other state officials. Besides the selection of officials the voters will also be called upon to ballot on a large number of constitutional amendments, in addition to city and school elections.

The issues this year will be just as important as any you have ever faced and perhaps more so. If there is someone in your family who has passed the age of 60, you should explain the new law to them and the fact that they must register in order to vote.

Remember January 31 is the deadline. Do not disenfranchise yourself or allow some member of your family to do so.

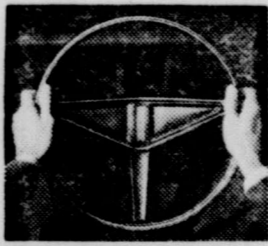

New Postal Rates Now in Effect

With the price of mailing a letter going from five to six cents last Sunday, it is just turning back the clock to the good old days—like 1792, when it also cost six cents.

But today's postal patron will get more for his six cents than his post-colonial borebearers did. Six cents entitled the 1792 letter writer to mail but one sheet of paper—without envelope—a mere 30 miles.

Sunday's rate boost also effects classes of mail unheard of in colonial days. Airmail, which didn't start until 1918, goes from 8 cents to a dime. Post cards cost five cents instead of four, and airmail post cards go from 6 to 8 cents.

To ease the transition—the third increase in 10 years—the Post Of-

fice Department has printed a four billion six-cent Franklin Roosevelt stamps. Roosevelt places George Washington as most familiar postage stamp on the nation's letters.

Rates for third class mail which its critics label "junk" —go up about 34 per cent. So class mail—newspapers, magazines—are raised 24 per cent. But of these increases will be spread over as much as two years.

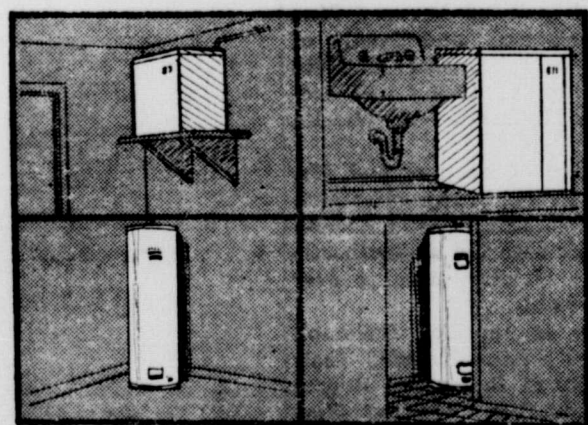

Friday, Jan. 19: light bread, turkey, dressing, giblet gravy, cranberry sauce, lady cream peas, fruit salad, whole milk.

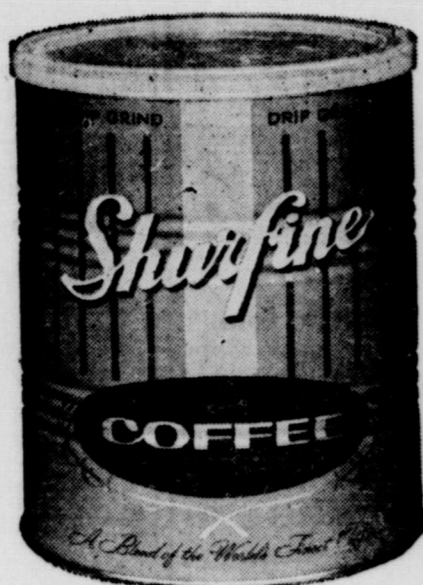
