Frank Meason Observes 85th Birthday Jan. 10

A Foard County pioneer who has lived here for eighty-two years, observed his 85th birthday Wednesday, January 10.

He is Frank J. Meason who arrived in what is now Foard County on his third birthday when his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Meason, moved here in 1886. He was born near Plano on January 10, 1883.

Although his parents moved to East Texas from Foard County in 1904, Mr. Meason stayed here. The Meason family lived in the Good Creek community for a number of years before moving into Crowell.

He purchased his present home in 1913, the same year he joined the Masonic Lodge. Mr. Meason has been a butcher for fifty-five years, and still works part-time in the D&T meat market. An avid reader, he has taken the Fort Worth Star-Telegram continuously since 1907.

He has three brothers, and two sisters living, four children, seven grandchildren and eleven great grandchildren. His wife died in 1935, and two of his sons and one grandson have succumbed. He is still very active, working every day and enjoying his reading.

One Accident Reported in County in December

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highways in Foard County during the month of December, according to Sgt. Floyd Etheridge, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

This crash resulted in an estimated property damage of \$180. The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the calendar year of 1967 shows a total of 19 crashes resulting in no deaths, eight persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$11,060.00.

When the final fatal traffic accident reports are tabulated for 1967 it is estimated that the death count for Texas is expected to be 3,340 or about two per cent less than the all time high of 3,406 traffic deaths in 1966. If this proves true, then, it will be the first reduction in traffic deaths since 1960. This decrease should be a challenge for every driver to put forth his best defensive know-how and efforts to reduce accidents in 1968.

The sergeant cautions all motorists to keep windshield, windows, outside rear view mirrors, and all lights clear of ice, snow, sleet, dirt and mud. The driver's vision is obstructed in one out of five fatal accidents.

The cotton price paid to farmers rose during the latter part of the year, affording some farmers to realize more cash from their crop than those who had the earlier cotton.

Taxpayers who do not file on a calendar year basis have the same number of days and months from the end of their tax year to file their reports as do taxpayers reporting on a calendar year basis, says Burckett. Tax Reporting Time Is Near for Farmers

Tax reporting time for some farmers is just around the corner, reminds County Agent Joe Burckett.
Farm and ranch operators who have not filed a declaration of estimated tax during 1967 must either have filed an estimate by Jan. 15 or file a final report by Feb. 15.
Farm taxpayers electing to file a declaration of estimated tax by January 15 will have until April 15 to file a final report. Taxpayers whose income is subject to tax withholdings, or who filed a decla-

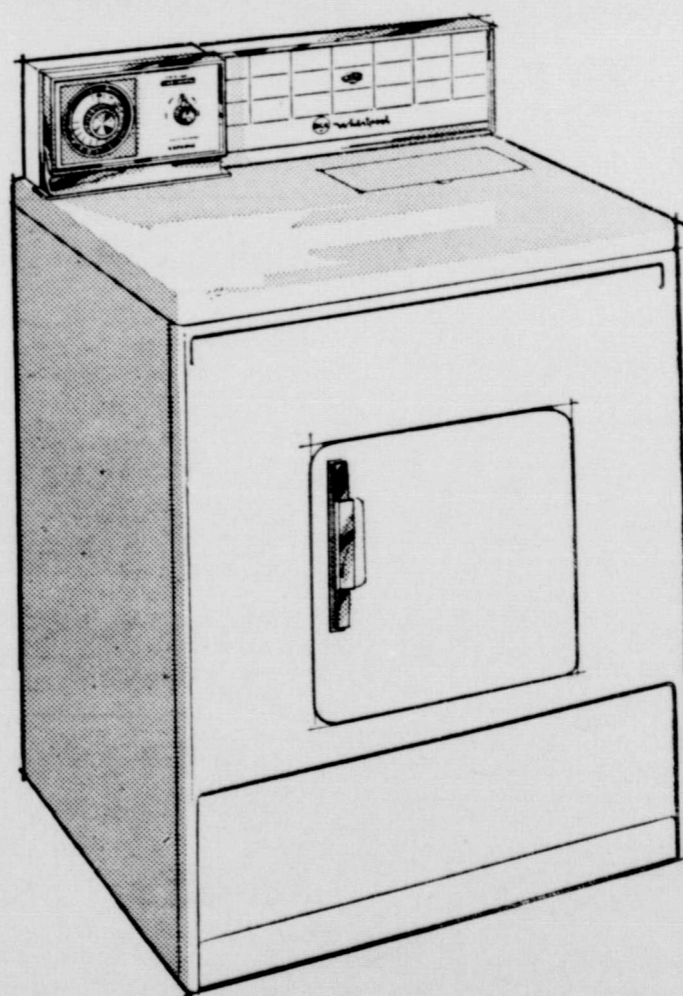
More Meat Inspectors

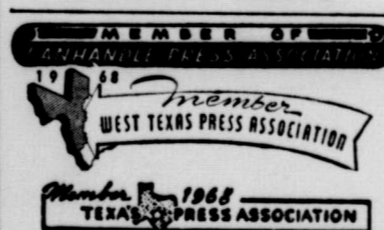

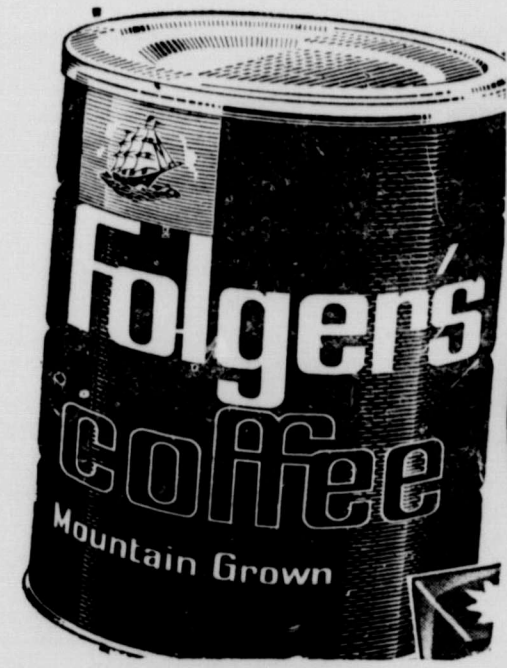

1968 Contest Plans Are Announced

An all-expense-paid Rural Electric Youth Tour to the nation's capital city will be awarded to winners of the 1968 essay-writing contest, according to J. M. Maddox, manager of Southwest Rural Electric Association.

All high school juniors in the area served by the cooperative are eligible to enter the contest, Maddox said. Winners will join winners of similar contests sponsored by other electric cooperatives across Oklahoma on the 1968 Rural Electric Youth Tour. All expenses of the eleven-day trip, beginning June 6 will be paid by Southwest Rural Electric, he said.

Contest entrants will be required to submit a 750-word essay on the subject: "Power for the Good Life . . . Out Where There's Room to Grow." Resource materials that may be helpful to contestants are available from the cooperative office in Tipton. Two winners will be selected, one from Texas and one from Oklahoma.

Essays will be judged on the basis of (1) knowledge of subject, 50 per cent, (2) originality, 20 per cent, (3) composition, 10 per cent, (4) neatness, 10 per cent, (5) grammar, 10 per cent. Knowledge of the subject shall be determined by the content of

the essay and an interview which will be carried on between the judges and each contestant.

This is the fifth year that Southwest Rural Electric has sponsored an essay writing contest. Winners last year were Jan Carroll of Crowell and Gary Isern of Navajo.

As participants in the Southwest Rural Electric Youth Tour, local contest winners will travel by bus to Washington, D. C., where they will spend five days visiting places of historical interest and seeing the nation's "government in action."

On Wednesday, June 12, the group will meet approximately 1,000 young people from 30 states for a program coordinated by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association and the Rural Electrification Administration. The program will feature presentations by officials of these organizations and other Washington personalities and possibly a member of the President's family.

A fun-filled "shindig" will climax the day's events.

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Equal Payment Plan
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Farmers to Receive Payments Report

Farmers will benefit from a new reporting service which has been inaugurated by ASCS, R. J. Owens, chairman of the Foard ASC County Committee, announce this week. A report of payments made to each farmer under ASC, cotton, feed grain, wheat, and other direct payment programs during 1967 will be mailed to the farmer during the latter part of January. This report is expected to be helpful in preparing individual income tax returns. The same information must also be furnished to the Internal Revenue Service in accordance with a requirement of law.

It is estimated that over three million farmers will receive this report, he said. This information is being gathered from county offices and summarized by computers located at New Orleans and Kansas City. The reports are being printed by the computers and mailed direct to farmers. A job of this size could not be completed without an automated system, added Mr. Owens.

Since this is the first year for a service of this magnitude, there are bound to be a few problems. He suggested that farmers carefully read the explanation on the report and check the accuracy of the total reported by comparing it with farm records. If an error is discovered, the nearest ASCS county office should be contacted to have the mistake corrected. County offices have been instructed to give farmers whatever assistance they need regardless of where the farm is located.

Matador Hunters Bag 800 Quail in Season

Approximately 800 quail were killed by 250 hunters on the Matador Wildlife Management Area, 11 miles northwest of Paducah in Cottle County, during the six, two-day public hunts, according to Biologist Bob Sinclair of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The hunts were held between Nov. 11 and Dec. 17, with two days hunting allowed per hunter. The average kill was 3.12 birds.
