Paul Shirley, Foard County resident for 67 years, died in the Foard County Hospital about 3 p. m., Wednesday, January 24. Funeral services for the pioneer rancher and cattleman, who was 77 years old, were held from the First Methodist Church Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Officiating was R. C. McCord, Minister of the First Christian Church. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

A solo was sung by Mrs. Howard Ferguson and Mrs. Moody Bursey gave a reading with background music played by Mrs. A. R. Sanders at the piano. Mr. Shirley was born Oct. 7, 1890, in Corsicana, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Monte Ray Shirley. He moved to Crowell with his parents shortly after the turn of the century. ## Approved ACP Practices Are Listed

Mrs. Jean Reeder of the local ASCS office has released the following list of ACP practices that have been approved for 1968:

Seeding grasses on cropland to permanent vegetative cover, seeding grasses (range land), control of brush and prickly pear, constructing dams and ponds, control of bindweed, constructing permanent waterways, constructing terraces, constructing diversion terraces, shaping or land grading to permit drainage, reorganizing irrigation system, subsoiling, seeding winter legumes, deep plowing, application of cotton burrs. The total of all federal cost-shares to any person must not exceed \$1,500. Mrs. Reeder said, "If you have a need for any of the afore-mentioned practices, you will need to file an application and get it approved before you start the practice."

"Hustle" is the name of the game and that is just what the C. H. S. Wildcats did, as they ripped the Knox City Greyhounds 74-36 in district 11A cage action Tuesday night. Bob Bird canned 6 points and grabbed 3 rebounds; coupled with Lynn Rader and Joe Ray Burkett's outstanding defensive performances, Crowell led at the end of the first quarter 18 to 6. Rader opened the second period with a driving lay-up to increase the Wildcat lead to 20-6. At this point, the Greyhounds switched from their zone defense to a full court press, but Crowell just kept coming. With a little more than 2 minutes remaining in the first half, Coach Ben Tyler called on his reserves, Mike Matus, Gary Eddy, Gary Cates and Jerry Swan, who came into the game and helped the Wildcats to a 39-15 halftime lead. Shortly after the third quarter got underway, it became obvious that Crowell had a runaway and Coach Tyler again emptied his bench of reserves and they finished the game in fine style. In fact, reserve Mike Matus stole the show as he poured in 17 points and pulled in 13 rebounds—both game highs.

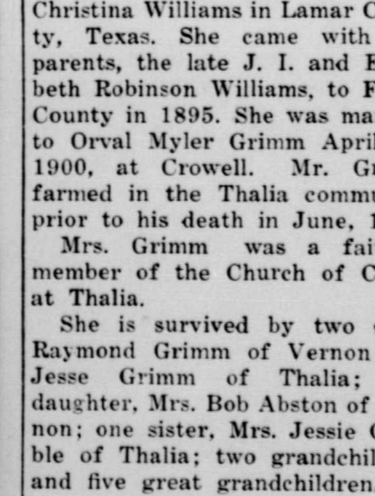

The deadline for filing with Ray Shirley, County Democratic chairman, for a place on the first primary of the Democratic Party, is next Monday, February 5.

Only contested race in the county thus far is for Commissioner of Precinct 3 where incumbent C. N. Barker is opposed by Billy Ray Dunn.

In the race for district attorney, 46th District, Charles McClure, Vernon attorney, announced his candidacy for the post Monday. He will oppose the incumbent, Curtis Renfro.

Already the governor's column is jammed with impressive Democrats who include former State Rep. Dolph Briscoe, Jr., former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, Secretary of State John Hill, former U. S. Deputy Ambassador to Vietnam Eugene M. Locke, radio executive Gordon McLendon, insurance executive Pat O'Daniel and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith.

Briscoe is from Uvalde, Carr and Smith are from Lubbock, Hill is from Houston, Locke, McLendon and O'Daniel are from Dallas.

While the spotlight will be on the Democratic governor's race in the May 4 primary, there will be action in the lieutenant governor's contest also where House Speaker Ben Barnes faces opposition from State Rep. Don Gladden of Fort Worth.

Court races have brought forth the following candidates:

For Supreme Court (Place 1): District Judge Sears McGee of Houston and Associate Justice Matt Davis of the Texarkana Court of Civil Appeals. (Place 2): District Judge Tom Reavley of Austin and Chief Justice James G. Denton of the Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals.

For Court of Criminal Appeals: Judge W. A. Morrison, incumbent, and State Attorney Leon Douglas of Austin.

### Income Tax News

Foard County agricultural producers who receive agricultural payments in behalf of other persons, or that share payments with other persons must notify the Internal Revenue Service by attaching form 4347 to their income tax reports, reminds County Agent Joe Burkett. Agricultural program payments to joint payees are reported by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service to the IRS by the identifying number of the person receiving the payment.

Burkett says that with new electronic data processing procedures the ASCS reports will be matched with the individual tax report and the IRS expects the reports to match unless the form 4347 has shown the division of payments.

The form 4347 can be obtained from the local post office, the ASCS office, or the district director of the IRS.

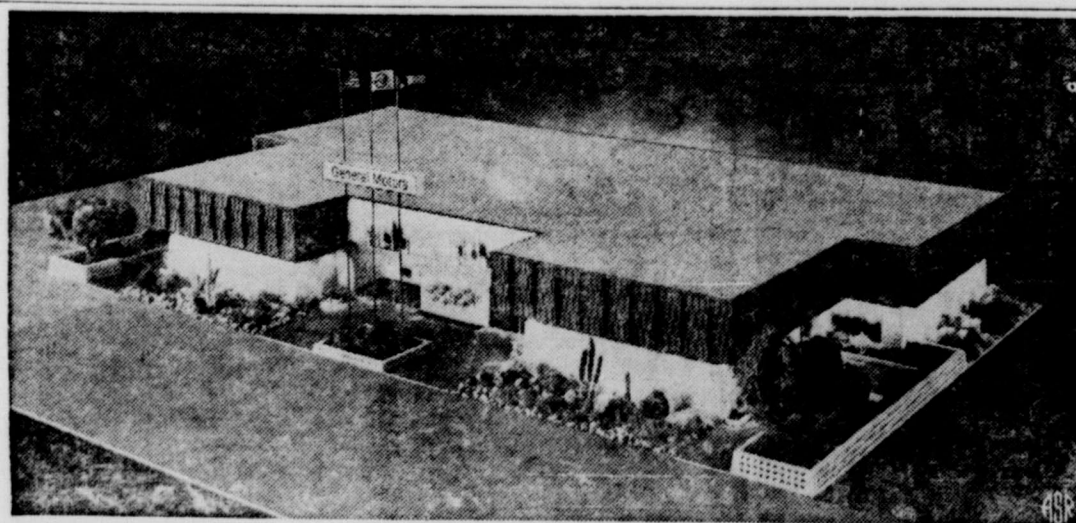

General Motors unveiled to HemisFair officials a model of the building which will house scientific and educational exhibits, plus latest automotive safety devices, at the San Antonio HemisFair '68. The modern design retains the architectural flavor found in the Southwest. It will be constructed of quartz stucco and plywood with painted battens above the stucco, mounted on steel framework. Tinted glass will frame the entrance and exits and the entire

building will be air conditioned. The grounds surrounding the exhibit building will have three planting areas with architectural block parapet illuminated with ground lighting. At the entrance will fly the American flag, the HemisFair flag and the Texas State flag. The structure will have more than 8,000 square feet of exhibit and office space and is scheduled to be completed prior to the opening of HemisFair on April 6.

### From the News...

## THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Thursday, February 3, 1938, issue of The Foard County News:

The boosting station for the Humble Pipe Line Co., 16 miles west of Truscott, has been reopened and six men who are employees of that company, have returned to Truscott. The station has been closed down for several weeks.

The first Social Security check to be given in Foard County was received Saturday by Mrs. P. P. Cooper. She received a check for \$9.32 as her payment for the time the Social Security Act became effective on Jan. 1, 1937, until the time she reached the age of 65 on Oct. 17, 1937.

A "little red hen," Brown Leghorn, belonging to Martin Gray, gravel truck driver for J. C. Jones of Thalia on road construction work north of Crowell, took a free ride on the "rods" of Mr. Gray's truck early Friday morning. Mr. Gray left his home in Thalia before daylight and arrived at the gravel pit on Pease River about day break. When he alighted from the truck, he was followed by the little red hen which had been riding some place on the running gear of the truck underneath the bed, a distance of about twenty miles. The road from Crowell to the gravel pit is rough. The hen was discovered by workers in the gravel pit and was caught and returned home unharmed.

A total of approximately 1,333 poll taxes were paid in the office of the tax assessor-collector before the deadline Monday night. There were 2,016 poll taxes assessed in this county this year.

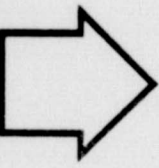



 Drownings in 1967 increased 34.3 per cent over drownings in 1966, according to unofficial tabulations of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.  
 In 1966 there were 236 drownings compared with 317 in 1967. The 1967 figure was well over the 300 predicted earlier for the year.  
 Many of the recent drownings involved persons running off the road into water in their cars. Investigation of the facts in each case by department personnel revealed that most of the drownings were caused by a breach of common sense or a violation of the Water Safety Act.  
 Several infants and toddlers drowned when they were left unattended near water. One 17-month-old boy drowned while taking a bath with his three-year-old brother.  
 Several drownings occurred after the victims fell from their motorboats. A Coast Guard approved life jacket, if it were worn, could have saved their lives.

## Early Detection Will Help Defeat Cancer

What is cancer? All of us are well aware that cancer is a serious health problem, one of the major killers. But how many of us really know what cancer is?

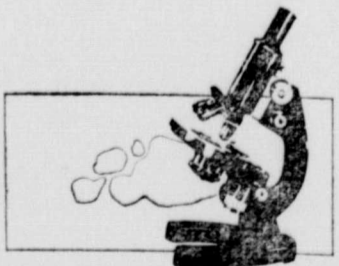
A pamphlet of the American Medical Association explains that during the process of cell division—the basis of normal body growth and repair—cells become differentiated into the specific kinds needed for each organ or body function.

Each kind of cell divides into its own kind, equipped to do the job it was designed to do. Under certain conditions not yet completely understood, some cells do not differentiate in this way. They multiply in irregular and disorderly fashion and compete with normal cells for nutrition and space. These cell masses are called tumors.

Tumors that remain localized are benign tumors and may not be troublesome unless they mechanically interfere with some body function. Tumors that grow rapidly and destroy tissue are known as malignant tumors. These are called cancers.

Cancers may affect any part of the human body. They also attack animals and even plants.

In man (and most animals) the unrestrained growth of cancer cells will infiltrate vital organs and destroy them if not checked.



Cancers spread by infiltrating adjacent tissue, by traveling through the circulatory system and lymphatic system, or by any combination of these.

The cause of cancer in man is not known. If treated promptly and properly, some cancers are highly curable. One-third of all cancers in the United States are being cured today. Cancers are most readily curable before they have spread from their original locations. To be cured, they must be found early.

More than 300,000 persons will die of cancer in this country this year. About one-third of these might have been saved through earlier detection and treatment.

## Piercing Your Ears Can Be Dangerous

Do-it-yourself ear piercing, a practice that has recently become fashionable again, is risky, says Today's Health, the family magazine of the American Medical Association.

Piercing performed by an unskilled person increases the chances of infection and the development of scar tissue. The physician will carefully measure and mark the ears before piercing, because both ears may not be exactly alike. After piercing the ears with a sterile needle, he will insert temporary earrings or metallic wires, which are usually worn for three or four weeks until the wounds heal. This is a critical period and your physician's instructions should be followed carefully to prevent infection or closure of the opening.

The small, self-piercing ear loops which are being promoted across the country are not considered safe, says Today's Health.

These devices have sharp points which are supposed to pierce the ears within a few days as they are worn. Infections requiring medical treatment have developed from the use of these self-piercers. Furthermore, it is difficult to be certain that the piercers are evenly placed on the ear lobes.

The physician will not pierce ears having any type of rash or



infection or if small cysts are present in the ear lobe. Persons subject to keloids (scar overgrowth) or who have this tendency in their family, or those who are allergic to nickel or other metals should not have their ears pierced.

A recent article in the Journal of the American Medical Association reported on two public school nurses who were "aghast at the number of girls with irritated, swollen and oozing ear lobes. In a class of 80 sophomores, ten had their ears pierced in the previous three months, and six of them reported inflammation and itching."

Ear piercing is not a very difficult procedure, but it can be risky in the hands of a non-physician.

While it is still difficult to detect some types of cancer, 60 per cent of all cancers in women and 40 per cent of all cancers in men develop in areas of the body that can be easily examined.

- You should make a practice of seeing your doctor every year for a thorough health checkup no matter how well you may feel. Learn these life saving warning signals that may mean cancer:
1. Unusual bleeding or discharge.
  2. A lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere.
  3. A sore that does not heal.
  4. Change in bowel or bladder habits.
  5. Hoarseness or cough.
  6. Indigestion or difficulty in swallowing.
  7. Change in a wart or mole.

See your doctor if any of the above signals last longer than two weeks. In the case of any unusual bleeding, go at once.

## Total Cattle Numbers Are Down for Third Straight Year

According to John G. McHaney, extension economist, the decline in the nation's total cattle numbers has been in dairy cattle. Beef cattle numbers increased slightly in 1966 and when the 1967 figures are in, they will probably show a small increase, he said. Beef cattle numbers on Jan. 1, 1958, stood at 24.2 million head and on Jan. 1, 1967 at 34.6 million, an increase of 43 per cent in nine years, points out the economist.
