## USDA Official to Visit Here March 22

### March 15 Is Final Date for Sign-Up for 1968 Programs

Mrs. Jean L. Reeder, office manager of the Foard County ASCS, reminded all Foard County farmers Tuesday that Friday, March 15, is the final day to sign in the 1968 cotton, wheat and feed grain programs.

"No payments or price support unless you sign to participate," Mrs. Reeder said.

John Baker, Assistant Secretary of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, will visit in Crowell on Friday, March 22.

According to a tentative schedule, Mr. Baker will be honored at a coffee at the community center here about 6 p. m. He plans to be in Crowell about an hour. He will be accompanied by Congressman Graham Purcell.

Purpose of Baker's visit is to meet the people of this area, and have a first-hand look at the work and demonstration plots of the Southwestern Mesquite and Brush Eradication Association and the Four Winds Industrial Corp.

Mr. Baker will be in Quanah Thursday and Friday.

With national leaders calling for a massive reinvestment in rural America, according to Secre-

tary of Agriculture Orville Freeman, because "the price we pay for distorted rural-urban imbalance is obviously too high even for a seemingly affluent nation like ours" and exodus in recent years of 20 million Americans from the farm to the cities, Baker's visit to the counties embracing the Four Winds Industrial Corp. is of particular significance.

Last year, as the guest of Congressman Purcell, four Quanah people, W. C. Howard, W. F. Smith, Jr., Mrs. J. A. Koch and Bill Neal visited in the office of Secretary of Agriculture Freeman. At that time, the four met Baker who in turn called in departmental heads to discuss with the group ways in which local economic self-help could be strengthened by the USDA. One of the suggestions made by Freeman and Baker and their aides was for an area to combine efforts in a multi-county organization. In the fall of last year, following the organization of the Four Winds Industrial Corp., Neal, Ross Smith of Childress and Mrs. Koch visited with Baker again as the guest of Congressman Purcell to review the Four Winds Industrial Corp. rural industrialization concept.

In announcing Baker's visit to this area, Congressman Purcell said:

"Mr. Baker is vitally interested in this area, wants to meet the people in the area and see the enthusiastic determination of the people of all levels, to work toward improving economic conditions with a strong agri-business concept."

### Five Candidates Seek Three School Board Vacancies

One additional candidate—Jeff N. Bell—filed for a place on the ballot as trustee of the Crowell Consolidated Independent School District before the deadline last Thursday afternoon to make a total of five candidates for the three vacancies coming up on the board.

Seeking re-election to the board are Floyd C. Borchardt and Tom Smith. The other three candidates are Mr. Bell, Beverly Gray and Odell Williams. R. J. Owens, the third incumbent whose term is expiring, is not seeking re-election.

In addition to the Crowell school election, there are three unopposed candidates for re-election to the county school board.

These are Walter Ramsey, Precinct 1; W. A. Dunn, Precinct No. 2; and Clyde Owens, Precinct No. 3.

The drawing for places on the ballot was held Monday afternoon, and ballots will be ready for the absentee voting which starts on March 18 and continues through 5 p. m., April 2.

The order in which the names will be on the ballot are Gray, Bell, Borchardt, Williams and Smith.

The trustee election is set for Saturday, April 6, at the school secretary's office in the court house.

### Funds Okayed for Operation Mainstream

Funds for the long-awaited Operation Mainstream program for Foard, Hardeman, Wilbarger and Cottle Counties have been released, Don Ross Malone, executive director of the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corp. of the four counties, announced last Saturday.

Administrators for the new program, under which 40 persons from the four-county area will be given special job training, started to work Monday.

Malone said that an announcement of the funds release came from the office of Congressman Graham Purcell late Friday.

The federal grant will be for \$70,920.00—half the amount sought—and Mr. Malone said that the program, rather than running for a year, will be only for a six-months term because of the fund limitation.

Trainees for the program will be selected as soon as possible, Mr. Malone said, but he added that details on how applications will be processed will be announced at a later date.

Felix W. Taylor of Crowell will serve as project director, and Bob Harrison of Vernon will be counselor for the program. Trainees will be employed by non-profit organizations in the four counties, such as city and county governments and the schools.

According to Mr. Taylor, applicants must be 22 years of age or older; be chronically unemployed; have an annual family income below the poverty line.

Applications can be made at any of the following locations: community center at the EOAC office; Texas Employment Commission office in Vernon or United Community Center in Vernon; Mrs. Christine Felder; at the Neighborhood center, Vester Steward, or Gail Neal in the court house basement in Quanah; Texas Employment Commission office, or Dunbar Neighborhood Center, Billie Jean Biddy, in Paducah.

### COUNTY RECEIVES SNOW LAST MONDAY

When the groundhog came out in Foard County and saw his shadow February 2, and predicted six more weeks of winter, he must have known what he was talking about.

A northern moving through this area Sunday brought a light to heavy rain practically all day. The rain turned to sleet and snow during Sunday night and snow fell here almost all day Monday, accumulating to about 3 or 4 inches. The temperature remained above the freezing mark and the snow next to the ground melted, making sloppy streets and sidewalks, but preventing the roads from becoming glazed and slick.

The snow continued until Monday night, with the mercury dropping below the freezing mark and icing everything over by Tuesday morning. However, a bright sunshine cleared the streets of the ice that morning.

Total moisture Sunday and Monday was .72 inch.

The light rain which fell Tuesday night of last week here totaled .18 of an inch of moisture.

This brings the total moisture for March up to .90 inch, added to the 1.31 inches in February and 5.10 inches in January to run the total for the first 2½ months of 1968 up to 7.31 inches.

This breaks all previous totals recorded here during a like period.
