Borchardt, Gray and Bell Elected to Terms on Crowell School Board

Three new members were elected to the board of trustees of the Consolidated Independent School District, in the election Saturday in the court house. Floyd C. Borchardt was re-elected, and Beverly Gray and John N. Bell were elected to first

terms on the board. Other announced candidates were Odell Williams and Tom Smith. Mr. Smith was seeking re-election, while Williams was a first-time candidate. A total of 305 votes were cast in the election with the following results:

In the county school trustee election, the following results were posted: County trustee, Precinct No. 1, Walter Ramsey was re-elected with 28 votes and Joe Eavenson received 2 votes in that precinct. W. A. Dunn was re-elected from Precinct No. 2 with 173 votes. In Precinct No. 3, Clyde Owens was re-elected with 28 votes and Kenneth Halbert received 1 vote in that precinct.

Deposits in Local Bank Show Gain Over Year Ago

During the past year, deposits in the Crowell State Bank have increased over a third of a million dollars, according to comparative statements of condition filed with the bank on March 31, 1967, and March 31, 1968. Deposits totaled \$3,083,178.32 on the last day of March this year, an increase of \$860,434.41 more than \$2,222,743.91 reported on deposits at the same date last year. Deposits are up \$371,298.91 over two years when on April 1, 1966, deposits were \$2,711,111.11. Over half a million dollars increase is noted between the present statement and that of March 1965, when deposits were \$2,441,993. This is an increase of \$640,336.39.

Cotton Production Meeting to Be Held in Crowell Thursday, April 18

There will be a cotton production and insect control meeting in Crowell on Thursday, April 18, at 1:00 p. m. The meeting will be held in the county agent's office in the court house in Crowell, according to Joe Burkett, county agent. A team of cotton specialists from the Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University will be present to discuss all phases of cotton production, including varieties, fertilization, insect control, mechanization, weed and grass control. Cost-cutting and the newest practices on efficient production will be presented along with results of experiment station projects and experiences of numerous grower-demonstrators using various practices to cut costs of production. This is an important meeting, and Burkett urges all interested cotton farmers to attend.

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Deadline Almost Here for Obtaining '68 Safety Sticker

All Vehicles Must Have New Sticker on By April 15th. The Texas Department of Public Safety reminded motorists today that only four more days remain for obtaining the 1968 inspection sticker. "Lines are already beginning to form," a DPS spokesman said, "and they will get longer as the final date approaches. Many drivers may find it difficult to obtain necessary repairs if they continue putting off the inspection until the last minute." The DPS pointed out that only about 3,500,000 vehicles have been inspected for the 1968 sticker through March 31, and that estimates indicate more than six million vehicles will be registered during 1968.

W. Lilly.

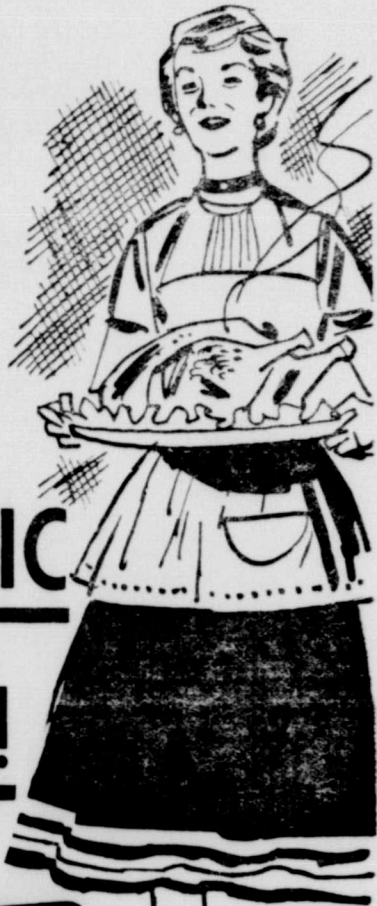

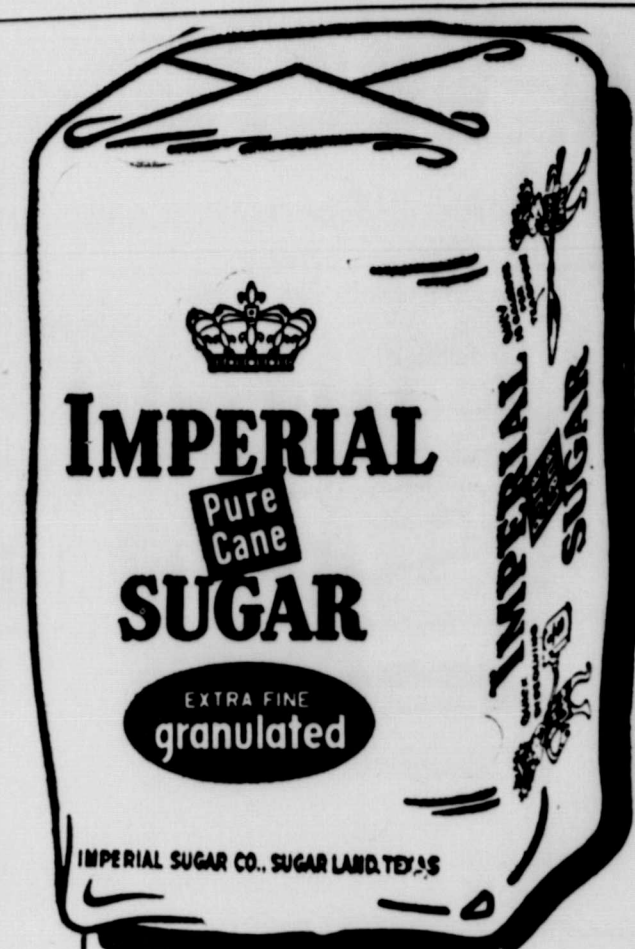

The Easter Seal provided treatment and services for 17,322 physically handicapped children and adults in Texas last year, Mr. Kincaid said, and this program needs to be expanded. Many people are going without services that would increase the productiveness of their lives and make them happier. With increased growth of the Easter Seal Society, more and more of these people will be reached, he added.

The Society is carrying on a continuing program to seek out the disabled who are doing without services and see that they receive the services they need. As Easter Seal representative, Mr. Kincaid is the person to contact for services from the Easter Seal Society.

The Texas Easter Seal Society helps support 21 treatment facilities in Texas where crippled children and adults are treated regardless of their ability to pay. Physical, occupational and speech therapy are offered to help the handicapped overcome their disabilities. A complete referral program to ensure equal rehabilitation services to every person in Texas is included in Easter Seal Society services, he added.

Mr. Kincaid asked that anyone in need of services contact him at the Crowell State Bank. He added that the Easter Seal Appeal will close Sunday, April 14, and full support should be given the Easter Seal Society by every citizen of Foard County.

Capt. Don Keith Lyons Serving in Korea

(Editor's note: The following article is re-printed from a United States Army publication in Seoul, Korea, and appeared in a recent edition of the Clay County Leader. The author describes the work of the 106th Medical Detachment of which Captain Don Keith Lyons, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Lyons of Henrietta, is a member. Captain Lyons was graduated from Henrietta High School in 1961, and was awarded a veterinary medical degree in 1965 at Texas A&M University. Captain Lyons and his parents are former Foard County residents and he is the grandson of Frank Meason of Crowell. A picture accompanying the article in the publication shows Dr. Chang Che Ui, a KN veterinarian with the 106th, inspecting a five-acre farm just outside Seoul with Captain Lyons. The farm grows celery, lettuce and other vegetables in the winter by use of home-made greenhouses. Shown with the two is Lee Tak Nam, Seoul farmer.)

SEUL—The 106th Medical Detachment (Veterinary Food Inspection Service), more often referred to as the "106th Vet Detachment," has the assigned duties of inspecting food items for wholesomeness and quality, and providing a veterinary medical service for sentry dogs stationed in Korea.

Why do veterinarians inspect our food? It started a little more than fifty years ago when the Veterinary Corps was organized and given this responsibility. Their training includes animal care, preventive medicine and food inspection.

Officers and enlisted specialists in the 106th are prepared to perform these functions for the United Nations Command, United States Forces, Korea, through extensive specialized training and experience.

All food items consumed by the United States personnel, military and civilian, are under the continuous surveillance of veterinary inspection personnel. This surveillance begins when the food items are received or purchased in Korea and continues until they are issued to the troops, the ultimate consumer.

Locally, this inspection begins prior to purchase of foods offered by Korean producers. The local food establishments and farms must pass a sanitary inspection to assure that the foods produced will be wholesome.

Farms all the way from the DMZ to Cheju-do are inspected bi-annually for soil content, drainage, marked boundaries and sanitation standards.

The 106th Vet Detachment also has an important role in the care and treatment of sentry dogs. The

veterinary medical care provided for these necessary and expensive items of military equipment somewhat parallels similar medical care afforded to the enlisted personnel who handle them.

To accomplish its mission, the detachment, commanded by Lt. Col. Thomas A. S. Hays, is comprised of eight officers, forty-one enlisted specialists, and eight KATUSA's.

Complete coverage of the many duties of the detachment is provided by a headquarters and six tailored and balanced teams.

The major teams are located at Uijongbu, Ascom City, Yongsan, Taegu and Pusan. Each of these major teams has a Veterinary Corps captain, six to eight food inspection and animal specialists, and KATUSA personnel as required. An enlisted specialist is stationed at Taegu to supervise the receipt and issuance of foods in that area.

Personnel of the detachment are dispersed as widely as any other detachment in the Republic. Their activities vary from the inspection of sentry dog sites on the DMZ to the inspection of vegetable farms on Cheju-do.

They have teams located near the ports of Incheon and Pusan that inspect goods arriving from the United States and other countries, and they have veterinarians and food inspector specialists inspecting bakeries, egg farms and fruit farms throughout Korea.

The detachment takes pride in its contributions to sustained health and effectiveness of UN-UNSF troops through food inspections and the continued security of military installations through its active role in the sentry dog program.



Local Men Go to Austin in Effort to Record County Actual Crop Production

Kenneth Halbert, president of the Foard County Farmers Union, and Warren Haynie, former president, met with Cary D. Palmer, statistician in charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin on April 1 in a further effort to record actual production of the local county's crops.

The state ASCS committee bases the individual farmer's projected yield on the data collected by the reporting service which is under the United States Department of Agriculture.

The local representatives' appointment was arranged by an executive director of the state Farmers Union and encouraged by the office of State Commissioner of Agriculture John White.

The local men presented individually signed affidavits of the number of bushels of wheat in farm storage and the amount delivered to the elevators.

The local organization has tried to secure actual statistics of the wheat produced in Foard County for the past five years (1962-1966).

According to this collected information, 4,627,404 bushels for an average of about 16.5 bushels was harvested while the reporting service has 4,079,200 bushels for an average of 14.5 recorded for the county. Local farmers report some 160,000 bushels stored annually on the farm.

The difference in the two figures plays an important part in the economy of Foard County, especially should a new farm program be enacted.

The reporting service is pres-

ently processing forms and many farmers are to receive slips to be filled out. They are encouraged to cooperate in order that the agency will receive a true picture of the county's agricultural output.

Members of the local Farmers Union have previously met with state officials at Austin and College Station.

Foard County's Population Shows Drastic Drop

Startling figures on Foard County's population were released in a new report from the Population Research Center of the University of Texas in Austin.

According to the report, the county has lost population at the rate of 2.5 per cent per year since 1960. The 1960 population of the county was 3,125 and the Center says the 1967 estimated population is 2,624.
