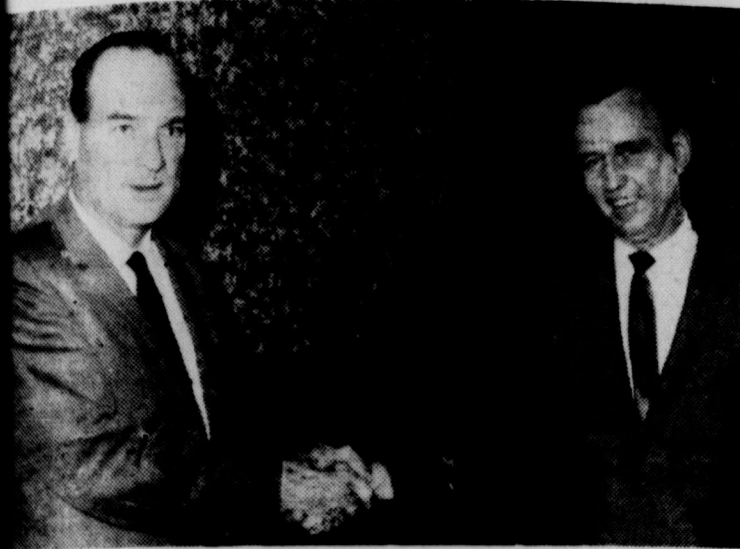

Robert T. Brown of Thalia Died Saturday in Vernon

Last Rites Held Monday for Father of Mrs. Carpenter

Robert Thompson Brown of Thalia, 69-year-old retired assistant pressroom superintendent for the Dayton, Ohio, Daily News, died early Saturday morning in a Vernon hospital after an illness of several months.

Funeral services were conducted at 2:30 p. m. Monday at the Sullivan Funeral Home Chapel in Vernon with Rev. Charles Booker, pastor of the Thalia Baptist Church, officiating. The Thalia Masonic Lodge members served as pall bearers and conducted Masonic graveside rites.

Mr. Brown was born January 31, 1899, at Circleville, Ohio. He married Miss Mary Lehman in Washington, D. C., Nov. 8, 1939. He was a veteran of World War I, and served in France with the field artillery.

Mr. Brown and his wife moved to Thalia in July, 1967, after he retired from 51 years in daily newspaper pressroom work. He was a member of the Association of Printing Pressmen of America.

Surviving are his wife; one son, Michael of Thalia; two daughters, Mrs. Cecil Carpenter of Thalia and Mrs. James Owens of Tom's River, N. J.; a sister, Mrs. Eleanor Wolford of Dayton; five grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Wheat Growers Meeting in Crowell Thursday Night

Total of 22 Changes Reported in Foard Businesses in Year

This week, A. J. Hemphill, district manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., announced statement requests were mailed to 46 businesses in Foard County. He said figures were obtained from a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1968.

Mr. Hemphill noted that each March, business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked by Dun & Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to nearly three million business concerns—the corner grocery store, worth a few thousand dollars, as well as to businesses worth millions.

The Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book lists those manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit, but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses, such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers.

During the past year, Hemphill added, 22 changes were made in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book listings of Foard County businesses, including 6 names added, 5 names deleted, and 11 changes in the ratings of continuing businesses. The changes occurring in Foard County are about even with the rest of the country where a change of business significance is counted about every five seconds.

When the owner or officer of a business enterprise, or his accountant, fills in and mails his financial statement to Dun & Bradstreet, it becomes a part of the credit report on his business and a factor in determining the credit rating of his business.

Back of each listing of a business in the Reference Book is a Dun & Bradstreet credit report. The report includes the following: a record of how the business is paying its bills; a history of the business (who owns it, who runs it, and how long it has been operating); a description of what the business does and how it does it; a financial section which usually includes the latest financial statement.

While credit reports are primarily used by business men who want to evaluate the credit risk of a business before shipping or selling, insurance underwriters, bankers, and other professionals also use reports.

93-Barrels-a-Day Producer Reported on M. Carroll Land

Dwight M. Ross Drilling Co. has re-entered and deepened a previously drilled Foard County failure and completed it as a North Texas Conglomerate oil discovery five miles north of Crowell.

It is the No. 1 Milburn Carroll which flowed 93 barrels of 39 gravity oil per day through 16/64-inch choke from perforations at 6115-26 feet.

Casing pressure was 250 pounds and tubing pressure was 150 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 757-1. Pay was fractured.

The 4 1/2-inch production string was landed at 6211 feet after hole was bottomed in the Ellenburger at 6799 feet.

Discovery is in section 470, block A, H&TC survey. Hole was originally drilled by Service Drilling Co. and plugged in June, 1953, at 5236 feet.

THIRTY YEARS AGO

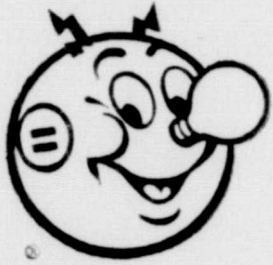

Younger People May Qualify for Disability Aid

Severely disabled young people will now find it easier to qualify for social security disability benefits, Edwin Draughon, manager of the Vernon office, said Monday.

A recent change in the law reduces the work requirement from a minimum of 5 years to 1 1/2 years.

"This new minimum," Mr. Draughon stated, "applies only to those who become disabled before they are 24 years old. If disability begins between the ages of 24 and 31, they must have worked the equivalent of half the time between age 21 and the date the disability began.

"For example, a teen-ager who becomes disabled from illness or accident, could qualify for monthly disability payments if he had earned \$50 or more in a job covered by social security in each of 6 calendar quarters during the 3 years just before he became disabled. In addition to spending money, the teen-age worker is now building up disability insurance protection.

"Although benefits under this change cannot be payable for months before February, 1968," Mr. Draughon pointed out, "the disability condition may have begun earlier."

Further information and assistance in filing applications may be obtained at the Vernon Social Security office, 1728 Fannin Street, Vernon, phone L2-9346, or by meeting with the representative when she comes to the community building in Crowell.

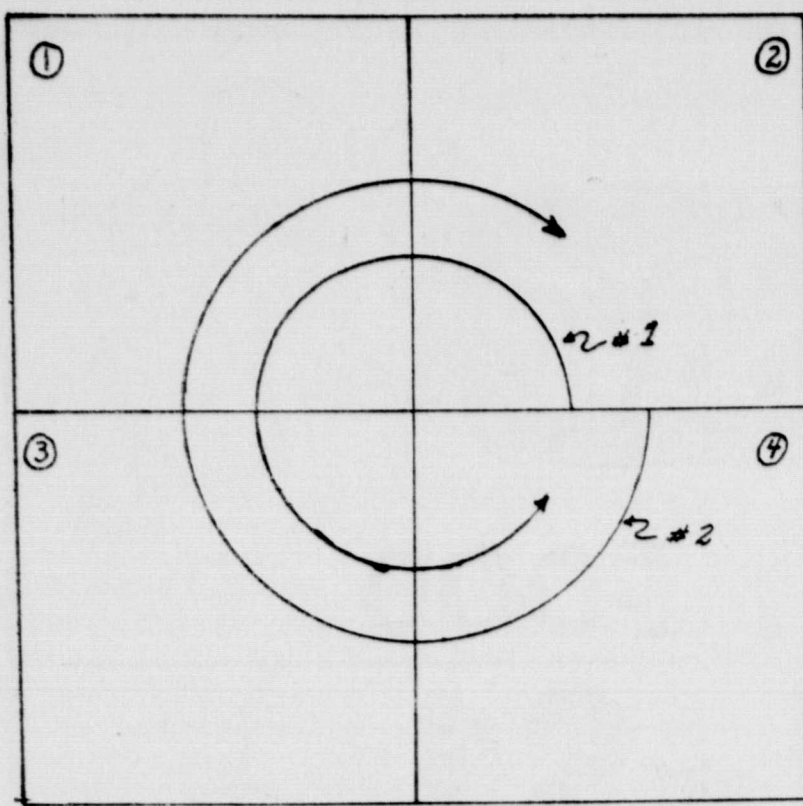

The four-pasture rotation-deferred grazing system has averaged 482 pound calves per cow, the continuous use system at the same stocking rate has averaged 438 pound calves per cow. This represents a gain of \$11.00 per cow per year at 25¢ per pound for the four-pasture rotation-deferred grazing system.
