Early Season Spray Program for 1968 Cotton Announced This Week

Plans for the Greenbelt Cotton Improvement Association's early season cotton insect control program have been announced by Ed Lehman, Jr., president, and Otto Lehman, Jr., chairman of the association's spray committee.

Mr. Lehman said the association has made arrangements for a cooperative program designed to control insect control in the area as effective and as economical as possible, improving the relative income situation of both individual farmer and the

farmer desiring to participate in the program may do so, according to Mr. Lehman.

The cost to the farmer will be \$1.10 per acre for each application. The

cost includes 47 cents for the chemical, five cents handling charge to be received by the applicator, 50 cents for the application of the insecticide, and eight cents association dues.

The following applicators have agreed to spray at the contracted price and according to the policies adopted by the association for this year's program:

American Dusting Co., Miller Flying Service, Naylor Flying Service and Shivers Flying Service.

The county agent's office will provide assistance as to the time and need for early season applications of insecticide for cotton insect control.

Mr. Lehman said that for farmers to participate, they should: (1) contact their local gin manager, (2) fill out spray application form, (3) specify applicator to do their spraying, (4) leave payment by check at the local gin.

Mr. Lehman said the check will remain at the gin until performance is completed. The association director representing the local gin community will deliver the check to the applicator.

"Every effort has been made this year by the association to make participation in the early season insect control program economical and effective as well as convenient and desirable to local applicators," Mr. Lehman said.

Cotton Farmers Nix Allotment Sale Out of County

A referendum was conducted by mail from the A. S. C. office May 13-17 with the results tabulated in the local ASCS office last week. The referendum concerned whether or not Foard County cotton farmers would be permitted to sell cotton allotments outside of the county.

Mrs. Jean Reeder, manager of the ASCS, said the results of the referendum showed 164 votes were cast against the out-of-county sale and 52 voted for, and therefore, sale of cotton allotments will not be permitted outside the county.

First Load of 1968 Wheat Cut on Tuesday Afternoon

The first load of wheat from Foard County's 1968 crop was delivered to the Farmers Elevator in Crowell about 4:30 p. m. Tuesday by A. V. McCombs.

The wheat was grown on Mr. McCombs' land south of Crowell and this first load contained 156 bushels.

Test weight of the initial load was 60 pounds and it had a moisture content of 14.25.

J. G. Adcock took the first load of '68 wheat to the Truscott Farmers Elevator Monday. The load contained 112 bushels and had a 15.10 moisture content. Lester Hickman, manager, said the Truscott elevator received about 2500 bushels Tuesday afternoon.

Parks and Wildlife Department Sets Public Hearing

Game Warden J. W. Harris of Quanah was in Crowell last Friday morning and announced that the Parks and Wildlife Department will hold a public hearing in Crowell on June 13. The meeting is set for 2 p. m. in the court house.

As a result of information gathered and presented at this public hearing, hunting dates for 1968 will be recommended for approval by the Parks and Wildlife Department.

A small crowd attended the meeting last year—the first year a meeting had been held here since the county was placed under regulatory authority—and a larger crowd is expected to be on hand this year.

As a result of the meeting last year, Foard County had an 82-day quail season, longest since seasons for hunting were established.

Plans Being Made for New LVN School Here

An application has been submitted by the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation for a new Licensed Vocational Nursing School, which would have an enrollment of 30 students with two registered nurses and one licensed vocational nurse on the staff.

The school is tentatively set to begin about July 1, according to Don Ross Malone, executive director of the sponsoring organization.

Claude C. McLaughlin, 79, pioneer resident of Crowell died at 4 a. m. Saturday in a Wichita Falls hospital. Mr. McLaughlin had undergone surgery Friday, and was thought to be making satisfactory recovery.

Funeral services were conducted at 2:30 p. m. Monday in the First Baptist Church with the pastor, Rev. John Gillispie, officiating.

Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home directing.

Claude Cope McLaughlin was born Dec. 29, 1888, at Sulphur Springs to the late Mr. and Mrs. S. P. McLaughlin. Claude's mother died when he was 5 years old and he was reared by his paternal grandparents. He moved to Crowell at age 15 and lived with his father who was a teacher in the Crowell Schools. He was manager of the first telephone company to be started in Crowell. Later, he worked at Seymour and Knox City for the same company. He was employed by the Bell Telephone Co. in Edmond, Okla.

He was married in the First Baptist Church here at Crowell to Miss Grace Self June 24, 1915.

Mr. McLaughlin served in the army during World War I and was stationed in Austin at Camp Mabry. He was a long-time member of the American Legion and had been a member of the Crowell Masonic Lodge since 1920. He was an electrical contractor here for many years until he retired.

The First Baptist Church had been his church home for most of his life.

Mr. McLaughlin is survived by his wife; one sister, Mrs. Mildred Englett of Huntington Beach, Calif., three nephews and four nieces.

Richard Vecera Escapes Injury in Plane Crash

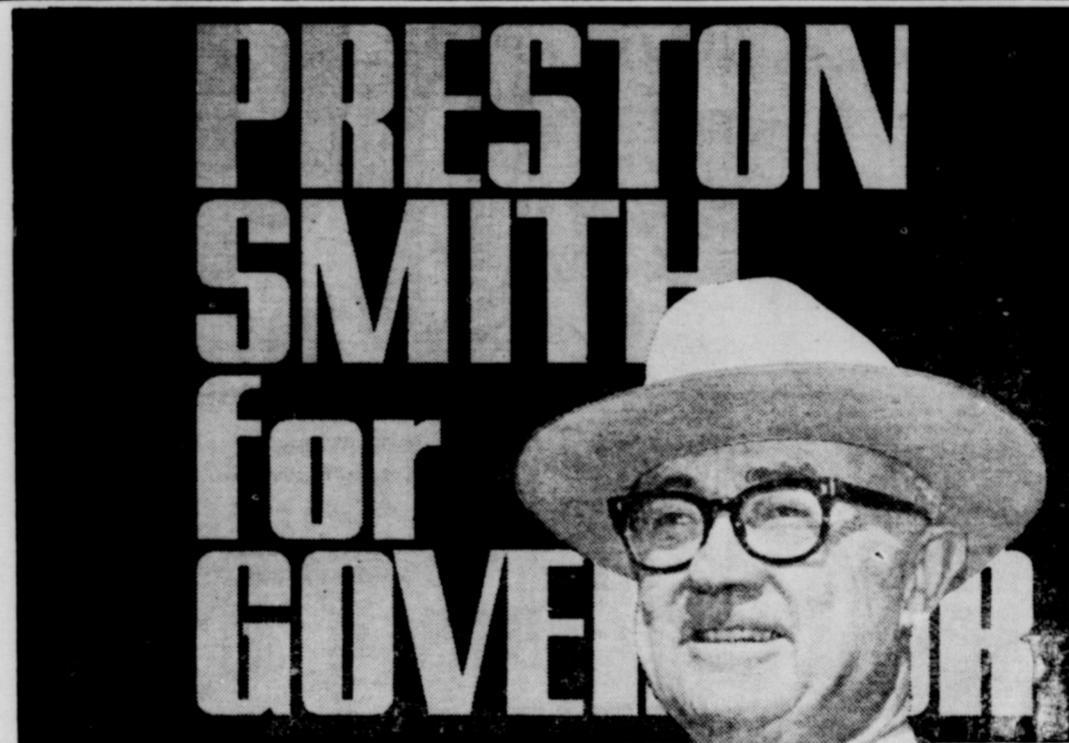

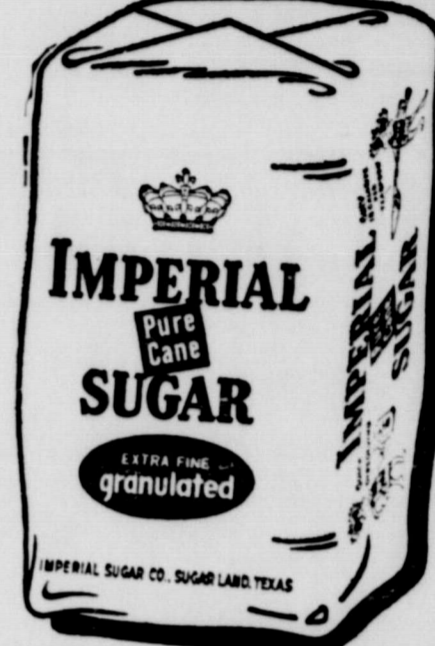

State Capital Highlights

Austin, Tex.—Your Capitol is bursting with life on the eve of the most significant political and governmental events—the June 1 runoff election, the June 4 beginning of a special session of the Legislature, and the June 11 conventions of State Democratic and Republican parties.

Although there are 15 runoffs in Legislative races to be decided Saturday, the main bout, of course, is that between Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and Houston Attorney Don Yarborough.

Probably no more than a million voters will decide whether moderate-conservative Smith or liberal Yarborough will be the Democratic nominee for governor.

Each is reaching for the other's voter potential. Smith boasts of his 18 years' governmental experience; Yarborough, without governmental experience, urges his own "fresh approach" and "constructive programs," including lower auto insurance rates and consumer protection.

Even name identification—usually considered the wellspring of political success—won't be the deciding factor between these two. Both men have been in statewide races for nearly a decade and are well-known names on the ballot.

Incidentally, the winner may find surprisingly tough opposition in November from Republican nominee Paul Eggers of Wichita Falls.

Regardless of whether Smith, Yarborough—or Eggers—is the next governor, the battlewise Democratic legislative presiding officer, Lt. Gov.-nominee Ben Barnes in the Senate and Speaker-to-be Gus Mutscher of Brenham in the House, will be powerful figures to be reckoned with. Barnes admittedly aspires to higher office and Mutscher reportedly is interested in a long tenure in the House.

Three Accidents Reported in Connty During April

dents of the southern and southwestern states, carefully selected under Marquis standards based on more than 65 years' experience publishing biographical dictionaries in service throughout the world.

Burkett was selected for his outstanding leadership, contribution to agriculture; to youth and civic work. He has served agriculture for over 22 years.

In 1966 he was awarded the Distinguished Service award for his outstanding contribution to agriculture. Burkett was cited "for outstanding leadership in developing through the county program building committee a superior 4-H club program and adult demonstrations which have improved soil fertility, livestock in the county and rural living; thus increasing farm and ranch income and making rural life more rewarding. Foard County was one of the first in Texas to develop a long range

county program of work." He has worked with Foard County farmers and ranchers for over 22 years in the soil fertility program to encourage the use of balanced fertilizer applications for greater profits.

He has helped to develop and improve the livestock industry through effective selection and performance programs. The well-balanced field crops program has meant higher profits to farmers resulting from use of better management practices, adopted varieties, cultural methods and insect control.

Burkett is credited with establishing an active County Program Building Committee in 1956 to help develop and carry out extension programs. Four-H Club members under Burkett have won \$2,110 in college scholarships in the last six years. In addition, three members have won trips to the National 4-H Club Congress and 15 have won out-of-state, all-expense-paid trips. During the past nine years, eight Foard County 4-H'ers have won the Talent Club award.

The Foard County 4-H soil evaluation team placed in the top five in the state contest in 1960 and won a trip to the National Land Judging Contest where they placed tenth. Four-H teams and individual members coached by Burkett have won district 67 times and have been state winners 15 times in various contests and award programs.

Burkett holds a B. S. degree in agronomy from Texas A&M

University and has completed 10 hours of graduate work in an effort to better his ability in performing the duties of his work. He is a member of the Epsilon Sigma Phi, the state and national County Agricultural Agents Association and has worked in many official capacities during his 22 years of service.

He is a native of Smith County and a graduate of Tyler High School.

First Reminder—Learn to Swim

Sixty per cent of Americans who drown do so because they have fallen into the water accidentally, the Red Cross said this week.

"If they had been able to swim, they could have saved themselves," A. B. Murphy, national director of Red Cross Safety Services, declared.

A Red Cross official issued safety advice for the 100 million Americans expected to use the water for recreation this summer, on the eve of Memorial Day, official opening date of the swimming season in most parts of the country.

He said that drownings have increased in each of the last three years for which records are complete—1964-66—and that the latter year was the first since the early 1930's that water fatalities reached the 7,000 mark.

Even though that is 3,000 fewer than the 10,000-a-year average of 55 years ago, when few people participated in water sports and before the Red Cross and other organizations became active in water safety education, the figure is still too high, he added.

Hence, the first water safety precaution is learn to swim. If you can swim, learn to swim better.

Another important safety tip aimed primarily at parents, watch small children most carefully around the water, even in supervised and guarded areas, and even at shallow wading pools. Mere seconds of inattention can be fatal.
