Luther Alex Marlow was born April 4, 1895, in Kent County, Texas, and came to Foard County with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. N. Marlow in 1900. On Jan. 15, 1924, he was married to Miss Beulah Frances Manning. They moved to the Foard City community in 1936, and he had made his home there since that time. Mrs. Marlow died May 17, 1950.

Mr. Marlow was converted in middle life and joined the Methodist Church at Foard City. He was active in all of his church's activities until his health failed. He was a veteran of World War I.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Howard Ferguson of Crowell and Mrs. Delmar McBeath of Vernon; four grandchildren, Mrs. Paulette Ownbey of Fort Worth and Larry, Brenda and Marj Anette McBeath, all of Vernon; three brothers, Bill Marlow of Crowell, Oscar Marlow of Denton and Dallas Marlow of Altus, Okla.; two sisters, Mrs. Nomie Pierce and Mrs. Ola Weathers of Crowell.

The family moved to Haskell County in 1906, and then moved in 1911 to Foard County. Mr. Hlavaty died in 1923. She moved to Houston in 1926 and was married to George Kampen in 1929. Mr. Kampen died in 1945.

Mrs. Kampen was a member of the United Methodist Church of Houston and was a member for 66 years of the S. P. J. S. T., a Czech fraternal organization.

She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Roy Ayers of Margaret; two sons, W. F. Hlavaty of Houston and Clark L. Raney of Houston; six grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren. She was preceded in death by one son, Henry Hlavaty.

The fire apparently started in the southwest corner of the grocery. Mr. Wehba said Tuesday that a truck from a wholesale grocery had unloaded there late Monday afternoon.

The back part of the building suffered the most actual fire damage, but the heat from the blaze cracked the front windows in the building, and extensive water and smoke damage was reported to the fixtures and stock.

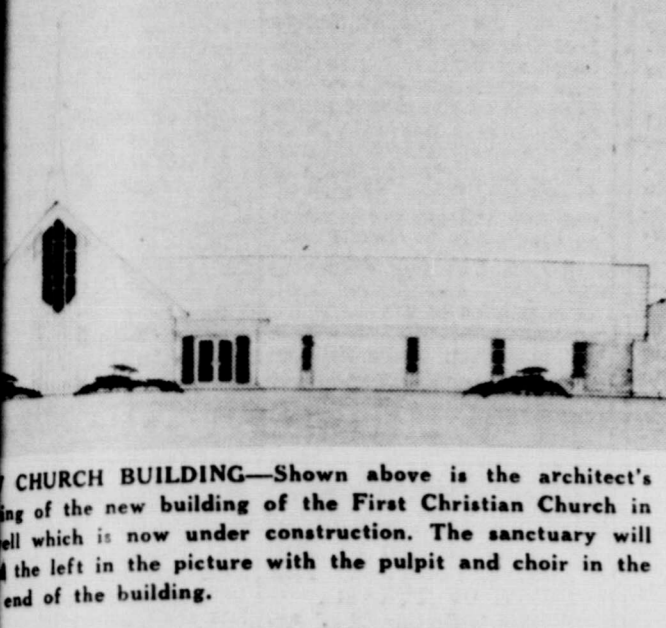

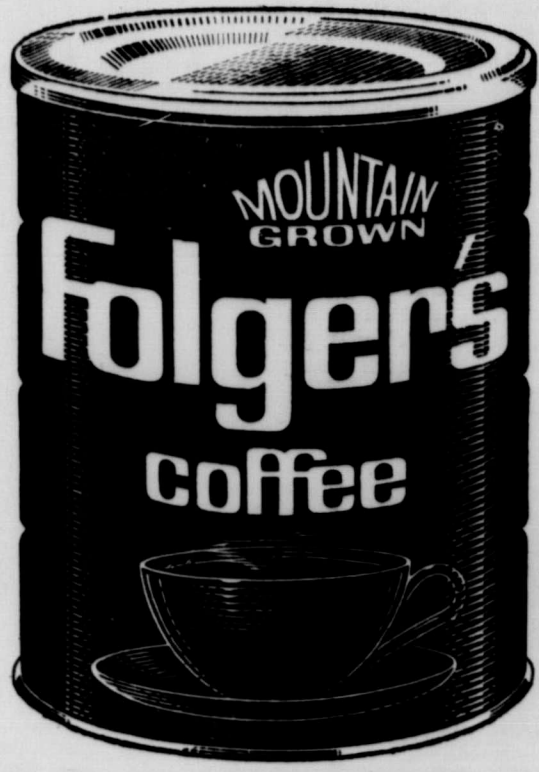

Sherman McBeath Lists Liquor Laws Concerning Minors

Sherman McBeath, District Supervisor of the Texas Liquor Control Board in Wichita Falls, was a visitor in Crowell last Friday. Mr. McBeath, a former Foard County sheriff who now has this county in his LCB district, reminded residents of several provisions of Texas liquor laws, as follows:

Possessing and Consuming Alcoholic Beverage in a Public Place by a Minor

It is unlawful for any person under the age of 21 years to possess or consume any alcoholic beverage in any public place.

The penalty is a fine of not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$100.00. Art. 666-17, 14(a), V.P.C.

Making Available Alcoholic Beverage for Minor

It is unlawful for a person, either an adult or a minor, to purchase an alcoholic beverage for a person under the age of 21, or to give an alcoholic beverage to a person under the age of 21, or to knowingly make available an alcoholic beverage to a person under the age of 21.

The penalty is a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00. Art. 666-17, 14(b), V.P.C.

Consuming Alcoholic Beverage—Prohibited Hours

It is unlawful for any person to consume any alcoholic beverage in any public place on week days between the hours of 12:15 a. m. and 7 a. m., or on Sundays between the hours of 1:15 a. m. and 1 p. m.

The penalty is a fine not exceeding \$50.00. Art. 666-4 (c), V. P. C.

The consumption must occur in a public place before a violation exists. Mr. McBeath said that the term "public place" as used in these statutes is not defined, but it is defined in court decisions to be:

1. A place where the public is assembled, or
2. A place where the public commonly resorts at the time in question, or
3. A place that is visible to the public passing by.

Mr. McBeath added, in listing the fore-mentioned laws, that parents of minors receiving tickets for violation of liquor laws, will receive a personal letter from the district supervisor telling the parents of the violations committed by their children.

Social Security News

People who sign up for social security only to gain Medicare coverage are often amazed to learn that they will also be drawing some checks for the year, according to Edwin Draughon, manager of the Vernon Social Security office.

For instance, a person entitled to a monthly benefit of \$122.90 who expects to earn \$3000 in 1968 would draw a check for \$17.40 for June 1968 and full checks for the rest of the year.

"This is possible because of the liberalized retirement test under the present social security law," Mr. Draughon said.

"A social security beneficiary can earn \$1680 per year and draw his checks every month. If his earnings are \$2880 or less, an amount equal to one-half the earnings between \$1680 and \$2880 is subtracted from total benefits payable for the year. If earnings are over \$2880, an additional one dollar for every dollar over \$2880 is subtracted from benefits payable.

"There has been no change in the provision that a person can draw a check for each month that he is age 72, regardless of his total earnings for the year."

Texas Lamb Crop Up

Though the Texas lamb crop for 1968 is just slightly higher than in 1967, 2,399,000 head compared with 2,392,000, it is still 11 per cent below the 5-year (1962-66) average, says the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Nationally, the 1968 lamb crop is 4 per cent less than in 1967. Texas wool production for 1968 is now estimated at 5 per cent below last year.

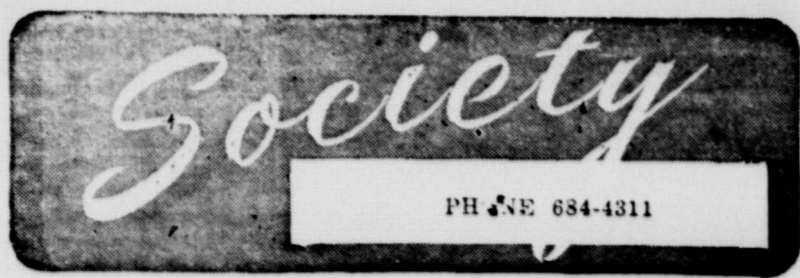

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR16)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows: "Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a predetermined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to out-of-state shipments covered hereby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by the proper taxing authorities. This amendment shall not act as a validation of any present statute or law, but only those passed specifically pursuant hereto; provided, however, that enabling legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. "AGAINST the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR24)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows: "Section 2-a. The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law. "(b) Legislation which may be enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Section is not void because of its anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows: "Section 1-e. "1. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning. "2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35c); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30c); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25c); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20c); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15c); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10c); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5c); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free textbooks for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State. "3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2c) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied. "4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes together with penalties and interest thereon, less lawful costs of collection, shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements at institutions of higher learning, as authorized by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution. "5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two per cent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing." Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public moneys to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient, and to their widows in indigent circumstances under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; provided that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity." Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning." 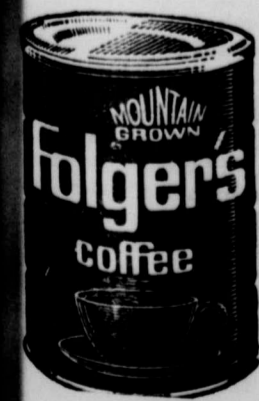

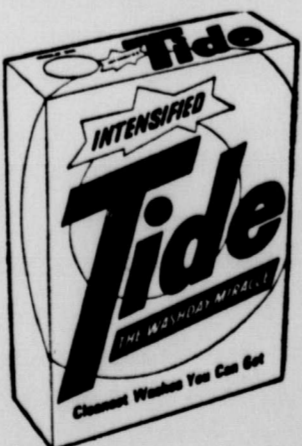

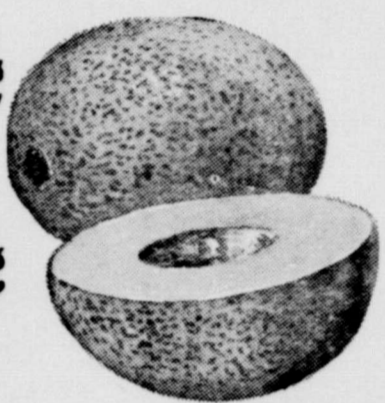

Challenge of Drilling Wildcats for Oil, Gas

"The challenge of wildcat oil and gas drilling was highlighted in recently released reports that show 89 per cent of 5,260 wells drilled in 1967 were dry holes," says the Ashland Oil News. "These were in areas where neither oil nor gas had previously been found. The average depth was 5,325 feet—more than a mile. Experience has shown that only two or three of every 100 wildcat wells are commercially profitable."
