## More on Farm Situation

From 1960-67, the number of farms in the U.S. declined 23 per cent. But, while those with less than \$2,500 annual sales declined by 27 per cent; those in the \$2,500 to \$4,999 sales category declined 42 per cent and those in the \$5,000 to \$9,999 declined 32 per cent during the period. Those with farm sales of \$10,000 to \$20,000 decreased only 1 per cent. And those with farm sales of \$20,000 to \$40,000 increased by 40 per cent; and those with sales over \$40,000 and more ose by 62 per cent.

The USDA report said farms n the largest three categories acounted for only 31.5 per cent of all farms in 1967; they accounted for 85.1 per cent of cash receipts from farming, more than 75 per cent of the realized net income from farming.




