HUMPHREY - MUSKIE, DEMOCRATIC TICKET WIN IN FOARD COUNTY

NEW LVN SCHOOL FOR CROWELL GETS OKAY

Presidential candidate Hubert Humphrey received 594 of the 980 votes cast in the general election in Foard County Tuesday; Richard Nixon polled 216 and George Wallace received 168.

Congressman Graham Purcell received 727 votes in this county to 194 votes cast for his Republican opponent, Frank Crowley.

In the governor's race, Preston Smith received 727 votes to the Republican candidate Paul Eggers' 297 and in the race for Lt.-Gov., Ben Barnes tallied 776 to DeChui's 128. Crawford Martin received 756 for attorney general with his Republican opponent Wynn receiving 127. In the race for comptroller, Robert S. Calvert polled 754 to Bennett's 136 and for state treasurer, Jesse James received 764 to Sanchez's 130. In the race for land commissioner, Jerry Sadler received 759 to Neptune's 125. John White received 754 votes to Schuhart's 128 for Agri. Com. and in the R. R. Com. race, Jim Langdon received 752 to Segrest's 129.

LOCAL BANK DEPOSITS INCREASE

Deposits in the Crowell State Bank showed a \$638,000 increase over one year ago, according to a statement of condition in this issue of the News. Deposits at the close of business on October 4, 1967, totaled \$3,809,978.07. Deposits at this time are about \$758,000 above one year ago.

Deposits in the local bank have about doubled in the past year, rising from \$533,925.10 a year ago, to \$1,029,883.81 at the end of October.

Deposits are about \$200,000 below that reported at the close of business on June 29.

84-DAY QUAIL SEASON TO BEGIN SATURDAY

The quail hunting season in Foard County will begin its longest term since game laws came to Texas, on Saturday, November 9. The season this year will be for 84 days and will run through January 31. The long season was set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department following a public hearing held in the county early in the summer.

Bag limit of quail will be 12 per day and 36 in possession with all indications pointing to a big crop of birds.

Shooting hours will be from one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset each day.

Foard County is now in its second year under the regulatory responsibility of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission. The county is a member of the Panhandle Regulatory District.

November will also see the opening of two other game seasons in Foard County. Turkey and deer season will both open on November 30 and continue through December 15. Limit on deer will be one deer, antlerless deer may be taken by permit only. Bag limit on turkey is 1 per season, either sex.

J. T. King Died Saturday After Long Illness

Last Rites Held at First Baptist Church Monday Afternoon

J. T. King, 89, resident of Foard County for 61 years, died in the Foard County Hospital on Saturday, November 2, following a long illness.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Monday, November 4, at the First Baptist Church with the pastor, Rev. John Gillispie, officiating, assisted by Rev. Warren Everson, pastor of the Bethel Church.

Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Pall bearers were Pat McDaniel, Cecil Driver, Walter Thomson, Martin Jones, Joe Smith and Andrew Calvin.

James Tom King was born on February 5, 1879, in Missouri, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Louis King. He was married to Florence Miller August 28, 1900, at Sherman, and the couple moved to Foard County in 1907 where he was engaged in farming until his retirement a few years ago. They moved to Crowell from their farm just west of Crowell in 1961.

Mr. King was converted and joined the First Baptist Church in Crowell.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. May Bailey of Dallas; three sons, E. C. King of Crowell, Clyde King of Amarillo and Herbert King of Waco; three grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

As the sizeable, enthusiastic crowd poured into the district court room on Tuesday night, Oct. 29, it was evident that the people of Foard County were proud of the Red Cross Blood Bank program and did not intend to further jeopardize its operation in the county. The fact that there had not been any drive for funds within the county for the past two years had placed the blood program in serious jeopardy; but with Mrs. Cornelia McDaniel, the newly-elected chairman of the Foard County Chapter of the American Red Cross, in charge, in a very short time plans were formulated for the annual drive for funds to commence tomorrow, Friday, Nov. 8, and to continue for one week. The drive, ordinarily held in March, is being conducted in November of this year and it is hoped that sufficient funds can be collected at this time to preclude the necessity of any further drive in the county until March, 1970; but, if this is to be accomplished, then generous contributions must be made by all donors.

Mrs. Lewis Winter, Red Cross National field volunteer from Tarrant County, met with the local group and answered many questions and offered suggestions as to the conduct of the campaign in the county, and afterward read a most interesting report of the rehabilitation program carried out by Red Cross immediately after the tornado struck in the town of Crowell in April of 1942.

It was revealed that more than \$55,000.00 was expended by the National Chapter of the American Red Cross in providing housing, household goods, clothing, medicine, groceries, etc., after the devastating storm. In addition, Mrs. Winter showed a most interesting and enlightening film depicting the Red Cross in action in Vietnam.

Mrs. McDaniel and the other officers of the local organization are in the midst of organizing local workers who will make a house-to-house campaign for funds, and request that anyone desiring to help in the campaign call Mrs. McDaniel at 684-2401 (her office) or 684-3181 (her home).
