Red, White and **Blue Taxpayers**

The Internal Revenue Service doesn't think that small taxpayers are any more patriotic than the the big taxpayers. However, the new red, white and blue tax forms will generally go to the smaller taxpayers that do not itemize deductions, prepare schedules or report business or farm income. The forms are printed in blue ink with the red ink emphasizing points that caused the most taxpayers' errors last year. Even though the other tax forms will be printed in plain old black and white (instead of colors) IRS still hopes that these taxpayers will be careful and avoid errors. The red, white and blue forms will not be available at IRS offices. Unless you receive yours in the mail, you will just have to use the old black and white form.





A number of widows and surviving children of deceased workers in this area could be missing out on social security money due them, according to Edwin Draughon, manager of the social security office in Vernon. Many changes have been made in recent years concerning benefits for widows and children. Some who would be eligible do not know about the new rules, Mr. Draughon said.

A widow who is completely disabled and over age 50 can now receive reduced widow's benefits if she becomes disabled within seven years of her husband's death or the time she last had a child entitled to benefits in her care. Also, widows who remarry after age 60 may retain a part of the widow's benefit. Neither of these things were true under the old law, Mr.



I can factually report that this accomplishment has been accepted, approved and applauded by the overwhelming majority of the American people." Morton said.

Should the pending regulations go into effect, he said, "For most of the states this will have the effect of bringing about a complete stoppage of the highway program . . .

He said the regulations will take the highway program out of the hands of the states and the state highway departments and put it under the direct supervision of "a

mammoth federal bureaucracy." The veteran highway engineer and administrator charged that "at the present time, millions of highway dollars are being dissipated by a Washington bureaucracy funds that are urgently needed for well thought-out construction

projects. "Complexities are being created that cannot be untangled at the local, state or federal level. Meaningless reports are being required-reports that never will be read—and each day the shuffling of more paper requires added help. All of these dubious requirements are being presented to the public under the guise of

creative federalism." Morton said it is "high time that we raise strong objections to this senseless takeover. To me, a highway program should be one that is aided by the use of federal funds rather than one completely dominated by government bureaucracy.

"The dissolving of the time-honored partnership between the Bureau of Public Roads and the States will destroy the continuity of well thought-out highway pro-
