Two from Crowell Qualify for Regional Track Meet at Denton

Munday won the District 11-A track meet held in Holiday Saturday, March 29. Nocona was second, Holliday third, Paducah fourth, Crowell fifth, Chillicothe sixth, Knox City seventh, Archer City eighth, and Petrolia ninth. Kenneth Sellers and Junior Urquizo qualified to enter the regional track meet in Denton on April 19. Kenneth placed second in the 100 and 220 yard dash. His time was 10.7 in the 100 and 23.5 in the 220. Junior placed second in the 440 yard dash with a time of 54. Larry Swan placed fourth in the 880. The sprint relay consisting of George Eavenson, Junior Urquizo, Larry Swan and Kenneth Sellers placed sixth and the mile-relay consisting of Jackie Daniels, Leslie Hopkins, Larry Swan and Junior Urquizo placed fourth. Others participating for Crowell were Jim Tom Smith in the 100 and 330 intermediate hurdles; David Myers in the 880; and Jimmy Glover in the 220. Crowell loses only one boy off the track team this year. Leslie Hopkins is a senior and will be graduating.

First Baptist Church Joining in the Crusade of the Americas

The membership of the First Baptist Church has joined more than 20 million other Baptists in some 28 countries in a gigantic evangelistic effort called the "Crusade of the Americas." As a part of this evangelistic effort, the local church has placed a copy of "Good News for Modern Man" in every home in Crowell. Two CHS Students Finalists in Speech Tourney March 21-22

Two local students were tournament finalists in the Notre Dame speech tournament conducted on March 21 and 22 at Notre Dame High School in Wichita Falls. Harriet Halbert and Pat Cates entered in prose interpretation and original oratory, respectively. They were preliminary round winners in their divisions on Friday which made them eligible for the semi-final round on Saturday. As winners of the semi-final rounds, Pat and Harriet advanced to the tournament finals where both won fourth place in their categories. Twenty-seven schools and 500 students participated in the meet, representing class B, A and AA schools.

Junior High Team Wins Fourth in District Meet at Holiday

Crowell Junior High's track team placed fourth in the district meet at Holiday last week. In the field events, Rocky Bachman placed third in the discus with a throw of 93 feet; Rex Driver won third in pull-ups with 19; and Johnnie Urquizo won sixth in the high jump with a jump of 4 feet 9 inches. In the 440 yard relay, Crowell's team took fourth place with a time of 51.7. Members of the team are Jackie Houck, Tim Daniel, Rex Driver and Johnnie Urquizo. The same team also won fourth in the 880 yard relay with a time of 1:52. Johnnie Urquizo won first place in the 440 yard dash with a time of 57.0. In the 880 yard run, Philip Bell won second with a time of 2:25; and Tim Daniel won fourth with a time of 2:30. The boys were accompanied to the meet by their coach, Printiss Gidney.

Landowners Are Urged to Give to Brush Program

Landowners in Foard County and throughout Texas are urged to contribute to the Brush Control and Range Improvement Association. John Glenn Halsell, Jr. of Crowell, BCRIA chairman in Foard County, said the organization was established last November by Texas landowners to mount a more effective campaign against brush and improve rangelands through research and education. He said the goal is to obtain 1 cent per acre, each year, for five years from Texas landowners to finance the stepped-up research. Contributions, which officials of BCRIA say are income tax deductible, can be made by sending a check to Merl Kincaid, treasurer of Foard County BCRIA. Checks should be made payable to Foard County BCRIA. Contributions also can be mailed directly to the BCRIA State Chairman John Matthews, Box 176, Abilene, Texas 79664. Mr. Halsell said the BCRIA is a non-profit organization and is not associated with any university or company. A board of directors with 18 members, selected to represent different areas of the state, are directing the activities. Industrial groups and foundations are also being asked to contribute to the association, he added. Funds will support research and education projects on brush control and range improvement. Certain funds may be used to match legislative appropriations or industrial grants to launch an overall campaign against brush infestations.

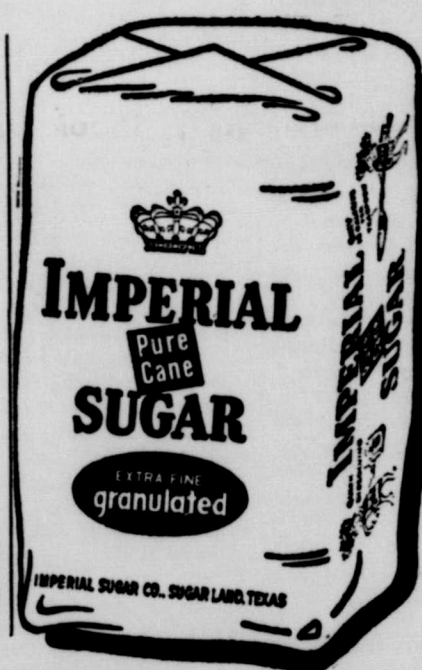

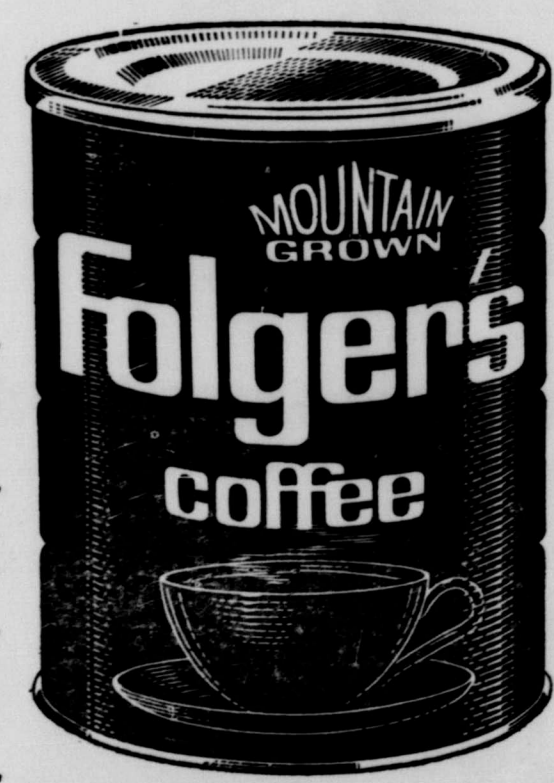

**Over 16 Million
People Visit Texas
by Car Last Year**

The Texas Highway Depart-
ment's authoritative survey of the
record-breaking Texas visitor in-
dustry for 1968 was released last
week.

The report showed out-of-state
visitors arriving by automobile
outnumbered Texans by half dur-
ing the year. The 16.6 million
automobile visitors poured \$1 bil-
lion in to the state's economy.

The survey is prepared annual-
ly by the Highway Department
based on information gathered
from questionnaires completed by
visitors who were assisted by the
department's tourist information
centers. In addition, regularly
scheduled visual traffic counts are
conducted by Highway Depart-
ment personnel.

A highlight of the survey is the
9.1 per cent increase in out-of-
state visitors by automobile and a
25.8 per cent increase in spend-
ing while in Texas.

The survey also includes esti-
mates gathered by the Texas Tour-
ist Council, representing the pri-
vate sector of the travel industry
in Texas. The council estimated
that another 5.9 million visitors
arrived by commercial carriers—
planes, trains or buses—spending
an additional \$467.5 million in the
state.

Really Shook Us

"The other day we received a
release from a Washington agency
that really shook us. It related
the circumstances of a 24-year-
old unwed woman from Delaware
with five children who moved to
Pennsylvania. She applied for re-
lief and was told by the Pennsylv-
ania Welfare Department that
she must be a resident of that
state for a full year before she
qualified for relief. This displeased
her and she took the matter to
court. A three judge court order-
ed the state to immediately put
her on the relief rolls. When the
state sought to appeal the decision,
the Supreme Court denied the ap-
peal."—Wellington, Ohio, Enter-
prise.

Golf Is Big Business

Golf course construction and
maintenance costs amount to
about \$15 million annually in Tex-
as. Nationally, says Dr. George
McBee of Texas A&M's Soil and
Crop Sciences Department, the in-
vestment in golfing facilities is
now estimated at \$2.12 billion.

brought increased emphasis on
turf grass management at A&M,
says McBee.

**Savings Bonds Sales
Here Total \$987.00
During February**

During the month of February,
the sale of United States Savings
Bonds and Freedom Shares totaled
\$987.00 in Foard County. The
January-February sales totaled
\$2,466.00 and this is 4 per cent
of the 1969 goal of \$70,000.00.

Sales in Texas during February
totaled \$14,369,901. Year-to-date
sales totaled \$33,071,780 which is
an increase of 3.9 per cent over
sales during 1968.

Nation-wide, total February
sales of E and H bonds and Free-
dom Shares were \$442 million,
slightly above February 1968
sales. The first two months' sales
totaled \$866 million, 6.0 per cent
below a year earlier.

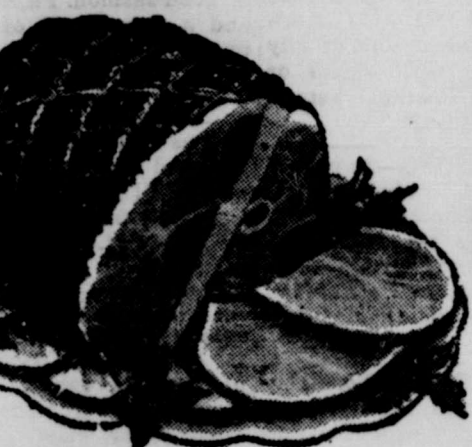

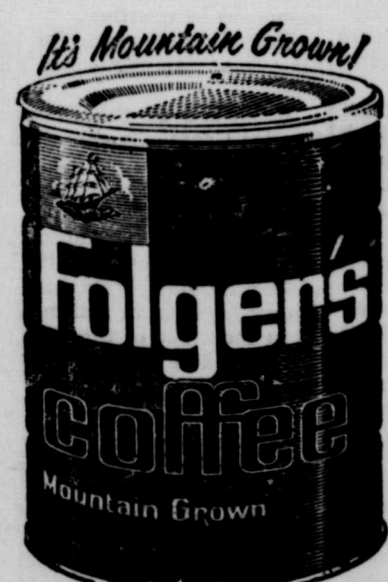

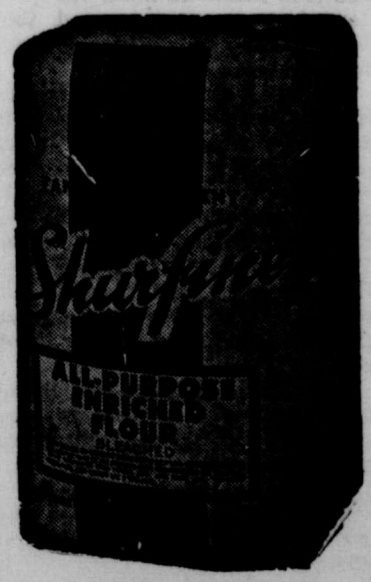
