Pre-School Program, "Operation Catch-Up" Set for May 26-June 20

A four-week pre-school program, "Operation Catch-Up," sponsored by the Crowell School District and the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation of Foard, Cottle, Hardeman and

Wilbarger Counties, will begin in the Crowell Neighborhood Center Monday, May 26, and end Friday, June 20.

Mrs. Eva Sloan, first grade teacher in the Crowell Public Schools, will be the instructor. She will be assisted by Mrs. Wilma Jean Coleman and Mrs. Norma Gatewood.

Classes will begin daily at 8:30 and dismiss at 11:30.

The program is designed for economically deprived children, but others may be accepted. The class will be limited to 20 students. Application may be filed in the office of the superintendent or with Mrs. Sloan.

Mrs. William E. Wells, 78, long-time resident of Crowell, died in an Amarillo hospital Friday after a long illness. Mrs. Wells had been living in the home of her sister, Mrs. F. C. Brooks, and husband in Amarillo for some time.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p. m. Sunday at Womack Funeral Home with Rev. Walter Driver, pastor of the First Methodist Church, officiating. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery.

Public Hearing on Game Regulations Set for June 5th

The Parks and Wildlife Commission has set Thursday, June 5, as the date for a public hearing here for the purpose of gathering information concerning proposed hunting, fishing and trapping regulations for Foard County.

According to the commission, season lengths and bag limits are determined by information gathered at these hearings.

The meeting will begin at 2 p. m. in the district court room.

Foard County has been in the Panhandle Regulatory District for two years. Earlier this year, Rep. W. S. Healy introduced a bill in the state legislature to remove Foard County from the authority at the request of county officials. Considerable dissatisfaction by a number of Foard County landowners has been manifest because of the over-80-day quail seasons set the past two years.

Accidental Gunshot Monday Morning Claims Life of Van Wisdom of Thalia

Van Nicholas Wisdom, 20-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jake Wisdom of Thalia, was killed Monday morning by the accidental blast of a 12 gauge shotgun.

According to Deputy Sheriff Joe Don Brown, Van had gone to the Wisdom farm a few miles southeast of Thalia about 10:30 Monday morning in an attempt to kill skunks which had been kill-

ing chickens at the farm. Time of the accident was estimated to be about 11 a. m., and Deputy Brown said it appeared that the gun discharged as Van was getting it out of the pickup.

Funeral services were held at 4:30 p. m. Wednesday from the Thalia Baptist Church conducted by the pastor, Rev. Charles Booker. Interment was in Wilbarger Memorial Park with Womack Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Van was born September 2, 1948, in a Vernon hospital. He attended Thalia and Crowell Schools and was graduated from Crowell High School in 1967. He lettered in football and track and was active in the Future Farmers of America chapter.

He is survived by his parents; three sisters, Cindy, Polly and Molly; and one brother, Rockne, all of the home; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. George Streit of Lockett and Mrs. A. B. Wisdom of Thalia. He was preceded in death by one brother.

Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

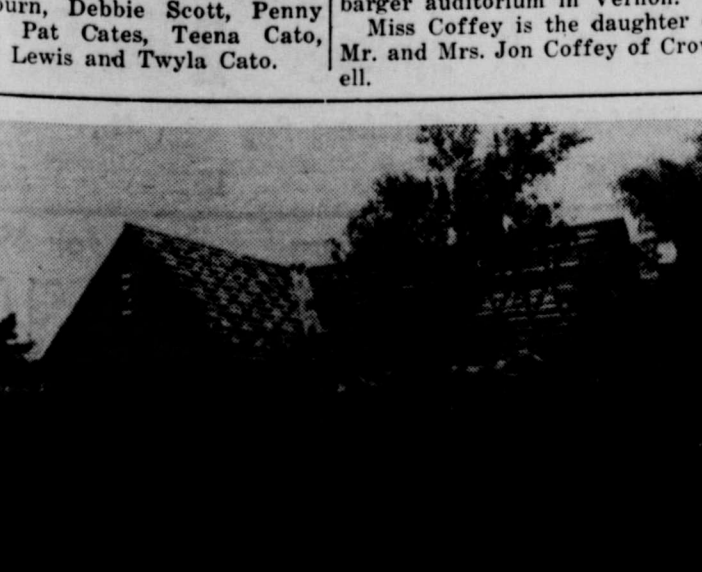

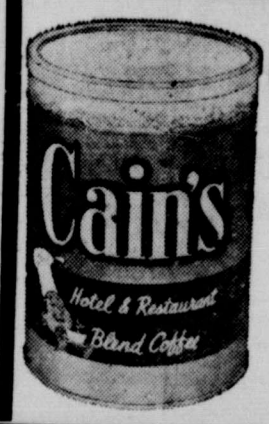

**Monthly Social
Security Payments
Total \$38,000**

**Total of 514 Foard
County Residents
Receive Payments**

\$38,000 in monthly social secur-
ity benefits was being paid to 514
residents of Foard County at the
end of December, 1968, according
to Edwin Draughon, manager of
the Vernon social security office.
"Throughout the country, monthly
benefits payable at the end of
1968 amounted to nearly
\$2.1 billion, some \$350 million
higher than at the end of 1967,"
Mr. Draughon continued. "Approx-
imately three-quarters of the
increased monthly amount result-
ed from higher benefit rates author-
ized by the 1967 amendments to
the Social Security Act. The
remainder of the increase was
simply due to a greater number
of beneficiaries."

By the end of May 1969, social
security will be paying monthly
benefits to more than 25 million
people—1 out of every 8 Ameri-
cans. Although retired workers
comprise the largest group of be-
neficiaries, almost one-fourth of
all people receiving benefits are
under 60. There are currently more
than 3.8 million children and .5
million young widowed mothers
receiving payments.

**In Foard County, 79 people
under 60 are receiving benefits.
That figure breaks down into 38
under 18, nine 18-21 and 32,
22-59.**

Many students would have been
unable to continue their educa-
tions were it not for the 1965
amendment to the social security
act which extended survivors and
dependents insurance benefits to
students until their 22nd birth-
days, Draughon said. In 1968, that
provision resulted in continuing
benefits for 470,000 students.

Monthly payments to the fam-
ily of a worker who dies leaving
a widow and two or more children
range from \$82.50 to \$434.40 per
month, depending on the worker's
average earnings under social se-
curity. Payments to the young
family of a worker who dies at
an early age could total as much
as \$85,000 to \$100,000.

Mr. Draughon also pointed out
that by the end of 1968, approx-
imately 90 per cent of Americans
65 and over were either receiving
cash benefits or would have been
eligible for such benefits if they
or their spouses had not been
working.

In terms of Medicare, almost
all people in the country 65 or
over are eligible for hospital in-
surance benefits. Likewise, 95 per
cent of all older persons in the
country have elected supplementary
medical insurance plan which pays
a major part of physicians' fees.

nity Center in Vernon will be
funded. No information is avail-
able about the status of the Senior
Citizens Program.

Operation Mainstream is oper-

four enrollees.

Expenditures for this OEO of-
