HAIL STORM HITS CROWELL

Losses totaling in the thousands of dollars resulted from a hail storm which struck in Crowell about 11:30 Wednesday night of last week. The golf-ball size hail and even larger severely damaged nearly every roof in town and broke hundreds of windows in the business and residential sections. It was reported that over 300 window glasses were broken in the Crowell School buildings. Many windows on the north side of the court house were broken.

Windows in most of the town's churches were heavily damaged. Rev. Walter Driver, pastor of the Methodist Church, reported Sunday that 197 pieces of stained glass in the Methodist Church were broken with a replacement cost set at \$3,180.00.

The hail was accompanied by a light rain of .27 inch. It was fortunate that a heavy rain did not accompany the hail, as much more water damage would have resulted with the damaged roofs and broken windows.

Borchardt-Goodwin Chevrolet had 26 news cars and pickups on their lot and they were all damaged extensively, in addition to damage to a number of used vehicles parked on the lot. Glenn Goodwin pointed out spots in the sheet iron roof of the building where hail had penetrated the metal and left jagged holes in the roof. Storm doors and windows were broken at homes all over town and a large number of automobiles and pickups parked outside of garages and carports were damaged, with many windshields being broken, and hail dents all over the vehicles.

Foard County Lumber Company had people lined up at their business Thursday waiting to buy glass, and Travis Veera, owner, had at least two truck loads of glass delivered to Crowell Thursday and Friday. Local insurance agencies called in adjusters, and they have been busy surveying damage and settling claims.

This was the biggest hail falling in Crowell since the tornado and storm which struck the town in April, 1942.

Business Brisk at Swimming Pool

Business has been brisk at the Crowell swimming pool this summer. Manager Gordon Erwin reported that over 160 patronized the pool the first Sunday it was open, and over 140 went in swimming this past Sunday. Mr. Erwin said this was the best season for the swimming pool in the past several years.

He was born in Crowell October 12, 1910, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Fox, Sr. He and the former Miss Katherine Wheeler of Thalia were married Feb. 22, 1931. He was a member of the First Baptist Church, Thalia Lodge No. 666, AF&M, Maskat Shrine Temple in Wichita Falls, and the Scottish Rite in Dallas.

He had been a member of the Baptist Church for forty years.

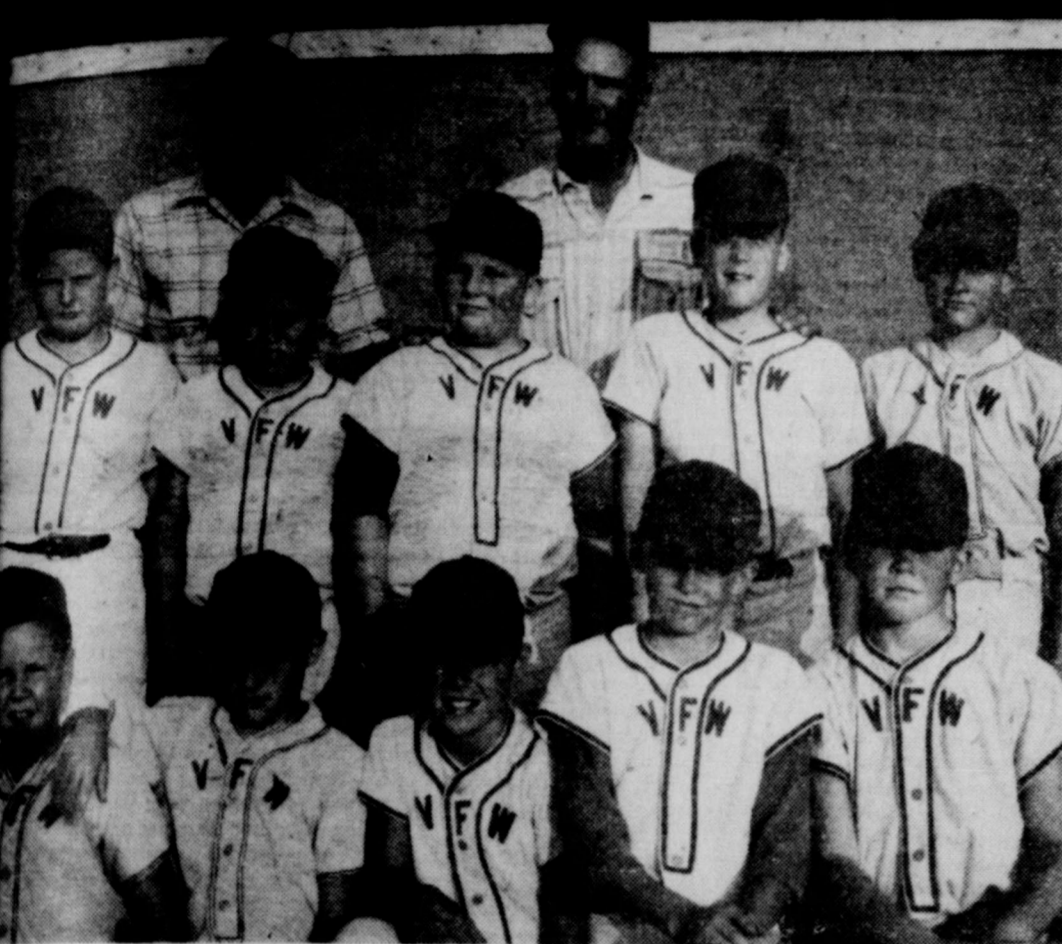

Austin—Biggest organized plan in Texas history—to fight crime—is in the approval stage, with early approval anticipated. Plan was submitted last month to the U. S. Department of Justice by Governor Preston Smith's Criminal Justice Council.

With approval will go \$1.1 million in action grants to state and local units of government for brand new approaches to the war on crime.

An initial planning grant of \$830,350 started the action, and \$235,000 more was freed for the purchase of riot control equipment. If this program is successful and continued, \$11 million more in federal aid will go to Texas in federal fiscal year 1970. Plans of cities and regions were cleared through the Criminal Justice Office for inclusion in a wide approach. Experts in prevention, apprehension, sentencing, corrections, and paroles participated in drafting of the overall program.

Work proceeds under Omnibus Crime Control and Streets acts of 1968.

Urban Coalition and America Inc. groups recently criticized the program. Private organizations doubted the ability to spend money effectively and complained that the U. S. Justice department did not give enough guidance on planning, so, it was contended that citizens were not sufficiently involved.

Texas Council insists that best job possible was done the close time framework available for initial planning. The Council contends that be held up until there is opportunity to measure action.

This effort is the first attempt to pull together courts, law enforcement and correctional institutions, in a mass move against crime. Only time and experience can measure results.

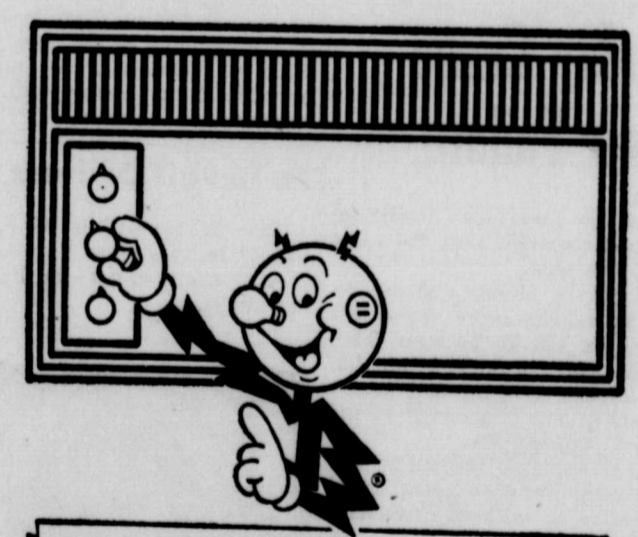

Tax Man Sam Sez It's Better to Pay

It may be just the time of year, but those taxpayers receiving a notice from the computer that they owe some tax, due to one reason or the other, usually think that the day was a lot longer than it really was. If you owe the tax it's better to send back the notice with a nice check attached and leave this problem behind you even though you may have to borrow the money. Taxpayers who procrastinate on paying Internal Revenue for taxes due usually end up with a levy on their bank account or their pay check.

Internal Revenue simply follows the law, step by step. They don't want to be mean but you'd better believe the law is very firm. However, if you don't owe any tax it's another matter. It doesn't pay to lose any time in writing a nice friendly letter to the director of the Service Center pointing out that they are mistaken with the reasons why. This will usually result in Internal Revenue correcting the error or your getting a letter that points out your mistake that you missed. By acting promptly, you will not run into trouble, but if you owe, it pays to pay.

To permit adequate time for required handling of covers, collectors should send pre-stamped, self-addressed envelopes to the appropriate coordinator prior to July 4, 1969. In accordance with U. S. Post Office Department regulations, only U. S. postage may be used on covers submitted. Stamps (postage) of other countries or

Quite a Difference

It has been noted that Uncle Sam pays Aid to Dependent Children recipients \$800 per year, spends about \$2,300 annually to maintain a federal prison inmate, and provides \$11,000 to train a Job Corps youngster—but allows only \$600 income tax deduction for a taxpayer's dependent.

Foard County to Be Involved in 3-Year Study of Economy

Foard County is one of 30 areas of the state to be involved in an intensive three-year study of the structure of the economy.

Research assistants from Hardin-Simmons University's Bureau of Economics and Business Research will begin conducting interviews with selected firms at communities in Foard County between now and next fall.

"The study is an input-output analysis," said Dr. Jim Vinson, head of the H-SU bureau. "It is a technical analysis of the interrelationships between industries. It is a statewide accounting system which will illustrate the sources of supplies of Texas industries as well as the total market."

H-SU is one of eight institutions of higher learning in the state to assist in the project. Other schools include the University of Texas, Texas Tech, Texas A&M, the University of Houston, the University of Texas at El Paso, University of Texas at Arlington and Pan American University.

Governor Preston Smith, in letters to business leaders telling of the study, said, "The project will

identify and measure markets for products, the source of supply for production inputs, and gross product industry by industry, for the entire state and each of its nine sub-regions.

Smith said that the data, when obtained, "will aid state government in its functions of planning for transportation, education, industrialization, health services, water supplies and in many other activities state government is required to take."

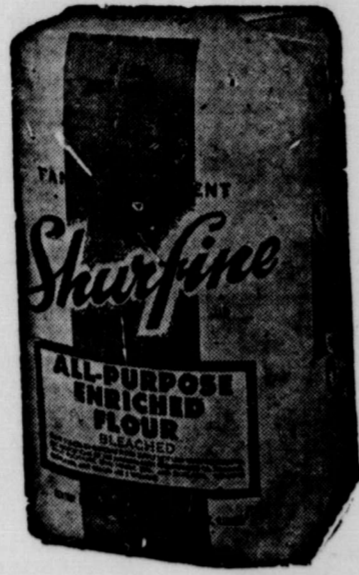

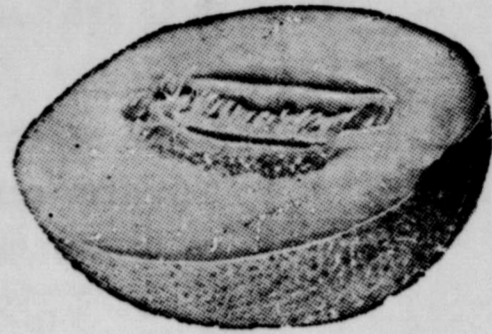

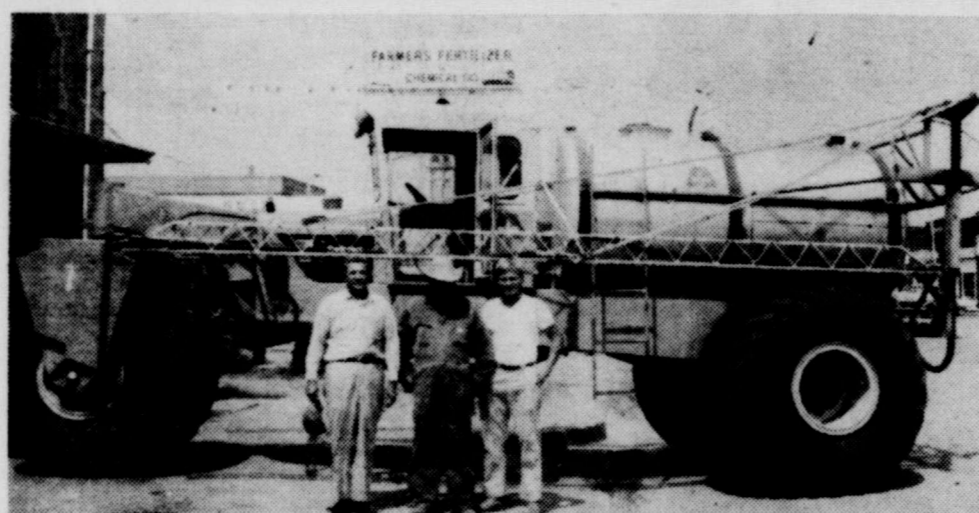
Scoring the Snakes three runs were John Klepper, Paul Whitley and Dan Klepper. Dennis Setliff crossed the plate for the Tigers' score.

Deadline Given Under 1967 Water Rights Act

The Texas Water Rights Commission announced last week final notice of the recording line under the Water Rights Act of 1967.

Everyone who is entitled to a public stream water right or a permit from the state to record his water for domestic use or a permit from the state to record his water for domestic use or a permit from the state to record his water for domestic use must do so as soon as possible.

Valid claims will be recognized to the extent of maximum use without waste during the year between 1963 and 1968.

Where the user was in the process of constructing a system of facilities to use a larger amount of water on the effective date of the act than he had actually used from 1968 to 1970 may be recognized.
