**THIRTY YEARS AGO**

One hundred and eighty government checks in payment for the 1939 cotton subsidy to Foard County farmers were received Wednesday morning by the Crowell AAA office. The sum of the checks was \$10,033.96.

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**Purcell Introduces Proposed Farm Bill in Congress**

U. S. Rep. Graham Purcell was joined by several other members of Congress last week as he introduced a farm bill to permanently extend and improve the 1965 Food and Agriculture Act. He paid high tribute to the 22 general farm and commodity organizations that developed it.

"One of the most impressive characteristics of this piece of legislation is that it builds on what we have," Purcell said. "All of us are aware, I am sure, that nearly all of our institutions are under attack. Some people would destroy them. This affords most of us... It is better to modify them, build on them, make them better."

Improvements in the 1965 farm act suggested in Purcell's bill are "based on experience," he said. "They are designed," he said, "to strengthen the 1965 act in places where it is not working as well as it should. It seeks to correct inequities. It seeks to strengthen the farm economy in sectors where there is hardship and suffering."

Purcell said the first step in improving the nation's farm legislation is making it permanent. He praised present legislation, which ends in 1970, because it deals with the problems of agriculture on a "commodity-by-commodity" basis, and he said this is the only way to do it.

Among the items in Purcell's bill is a provision for the establishment of "consumer protection reserves" of wheat, feed grains, soybeans, and cotton. These reserves are necessary, he said, to remove the threat of shortages that could arise out of crop failures. Only then, Purcell told his colleagues, can effective planning of production for market requirements be carried out.

The Purcell bill contains several recommendations to solve problems of wheat and feed grains. The bill provides for an export certificate to increase income on wheat sold in foreign markets, comparable to the domestic certificates for wheat used in the U. S. The bill calls for increases in the price support loan rate and direct payments for corn, and comparable increases in other feed grains, to bring income up to 90 per cent of parity.

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Purcell praised cotton legislation already in force and said he will only seek to extend it, if same is true for wool. Permanent programs for tobacco, rice, peanuts are covered in other laws.  
Purcell said, "We cannot ignore our farm program. We not... A sound agricultural economy is essential to a healthy national economy... Escalating prices of the items farmers buy to stay in business have given more attention to help for agriculture are decided. Farmers simply can't continue to stay even by cutting their cost of production through improved technology. Moving more into cities is not helping to solve the problems on the farm, the cities."

Farm liabilities more than doubled from 1960 to 1968, Purcell said—from \$24.8 billion to \$52 billion. Prices paid by farmers for commodities and services, including interest, taxes and such, increased 54 per cent since period 1947-49. But in that period, farm prices increased 2.9 per cent, Purcell pointed out.

Farming is the most effective segment of the economy, he said. Farm output per manhour has increased more than three times since 1947-49 when one farm worker produced enough to feed and clothe 14.5 people, compared to 45 today. "The management, perseverance and skill of farmers is recognized through the world," said Purcell.

"... My prediction is that farm families and their economic welfare will not be overlooked in this session of the Congress. Members from city, urban, and rural areas representing both parties will come to appreciate and understand the need for the legislation being placed before the House."

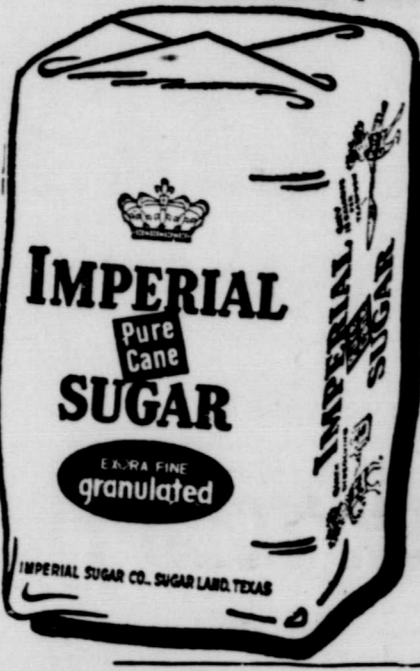

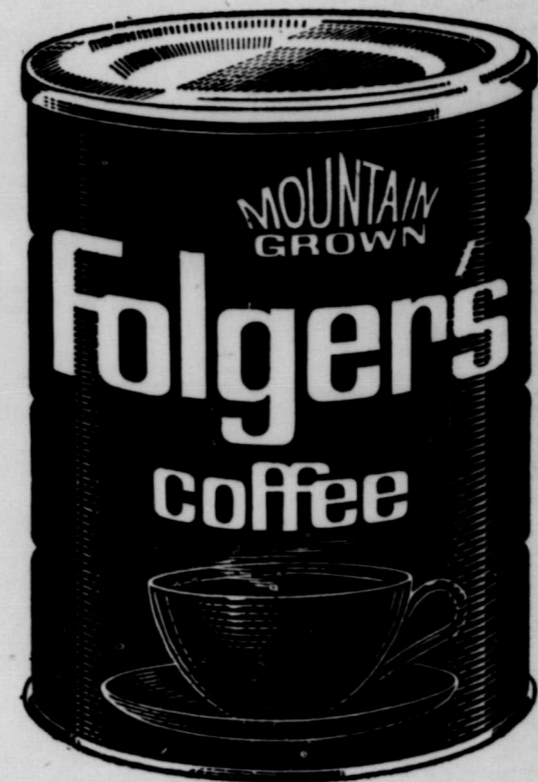

With the Bible**

An Old Fashioned Doctrine

How many there are whose  
hearts would be thrilled if they  
understood the old fashioned Bi-  
ble doctrine of sanctification!

Sanctification is not a negative  
matter; don't do this and don't  
do that. It is rather the positive  
truth that God wants us for Him-  
self as a sacred possession, much  
as a bridegroom considers his  
bride his very own in a special,  
sacred way.

Bible sanctification is a two-  
fold truth, affecting both our  
standing before God and our spiri-  
tual state. In one sense every  
true believer in Christ has already  
been sanctified, or consecrated to  
God, by the operation of the Holy  
Spirit. Thus we read:

"... God hath from the begin-  
ning chosen you to salvation,  
through sanctification of the Spir-  
it..." (II Thes. 2:13). "Elect  
according to the foreknowledge  
of God the Father, through sanc-  
tification of the Spirit..." (I  
Peter 1:2).

This has nothing to do with  
our conduct. God did it. Sancti-  
fication begins with Him. Thus  
Paul could write to even the care-  
less Corinthian believers and say:  
"Ye are sanctified" (I Cor. 6:11;  
cf. Acts 20:32; 26:18). This phase  
of sanctification is based on the  
redemptive work of Christ in our  
behalf, for Heb. 10:10 says: "We  
are sanctified through the offer-  
ing of the body of Jesus Christ  
once for all."

But now God would have us  
appreciate this fact and conduct  
ourselves accordingly, consecrat-  
ing ourselves ever more complet-  
ly to Him. This is practical, pro-  
gressive sanctification. "For this  
is the will of God, even your sanc-  
tification" (I Thes. 4:3). Hence  
Paul's benediction: "The very God

# Wildcats Drop Non-Conference Game to Quanah

The Crowell Wildcat football team lost its first game of the season last Friday night at Quanah against the 2-A Indians by a 45-0 score.

As Marion Crowell says in his football letter from home this week, "Actually there was so little difference between the two teams. Ordinarily we just can't move against our big Indian friends. We moved nicely against 'em in this one. Take the first half, for instance. We made five first downs for 128 yards. Our kids looked like a ball team. No fumbles. No penalties. . . and it could have been 7-7 just so easy."

George Eavenson, early in the game, made the most sensational run of the night from the Crowell 5 out to midfield. An incomplete pass down on the Quanah 15 stopped this Wildcat drive. Quanah's first TD came when they took the opening kickoff on their own 35. They drove the ball upfield to the Crowell 32. Then James Page, Quanah's all-state quarterback candidate, tried a pass only to be smothered by Wildcats for a 10-yard loss. But on the next play, Page's pass was completed to end Donnie Elliott, who went in for the score. The kick for extra point was good with

9:25 left in the first quarter. Crowell took the kickoff on the Wildcat 28. Ken Sellers broke around his own right end for 17 yards, to be followed shortly by a 20-yard scamper by quarterback Cates. A few minutes later, it was fourth-and-two and George Eavenson ran for 12. But the Wildcat drive stopped on the Indian 6-yard line. Twice in the first half, the Wildcats knocked an Indian loose from the ball, with a Wildcat recovery. But, each time, the ball was ruled "dead" before the fumble.

Page scored again for the Indians before half time, after hitting with several passes. Crowell made only four first downs in the last half, and lost lots of yards when Cates would go down trying to pass. Gary Eddy did a consistent job with his punting, and played a fine game as middle guard on defense. George Eavenson played terrific ball on defense, while increasing his average on carrying the ball (He ran 85 yards in 14 carries.) Ken Sellers knocked away five passes playing short defense, and caught three little short passes in the flat on offense. He also completed a halfback pass to Cates on one occasion.

Other Wildcats seeing action in this game were Mike Weathered, Buz Rasberry, Mike Matus, Danny Naylor, Barry Branch, David Myers, Jimmy Glover, Terry Farrar and Johnny Urquiza. Every Wildcat was a hero in

this one, in spite of the loss. They never quit, never let up.

One of the crowd pleasers for the Wildcats occurred when Eavenson took a kickoff, blasted right up the middle and broke into the clear. He was overhauled on the Indian 25. This was when the Indians' most spectacular play occurred. A Cates pass intended for Sellers was intercepted by Page who ran 100 yards for the TD. With the score 39-0 and 10 seconds left in the contest, Quanah was on the Wildcat 10, when a pass play covered the distance. The Indians were stopped on their try for 2 points.
