**Housewives with Part-Time Jobs Can Cause Tax Trouble**  
It's customary for a lot of housewives to take a part-time job shortly after they have bunched the kids off to school in September. This contributes to the family budget and gets mama back into the excitement of the business world and away from housewifing chores for at least a little while. Surprisingly enough, mothers who work part time create more than their share of tax problems.  
First, the employer figures that the housewife won't earn enough to be required to pay any tax, and he doesn't withhold. But, unfortunately the housewife—due to community property law in Texas—has already earned enough to owe taxes—due to her half of the husband's income, and the law requires withholding regardless of the amount.  
The second problem comes from the housewife claiming her own exemption on her W-4 form without having her husband drop her as an exemption on his W-4. This usually results in the family owing a tax at the end of the year. It is better on a part-time or temporary job of this type for her to claim "0" as her exemptions and let the husband's withholding continue unchanged.  
And, finally, some housewives happily sign the joint return with their husband on his earnings, and file a separate return and claim a refund on their temporary or part-time earnings. The computer has a program all ready to send the housewife and her husband a notice of audit. You can't file separate returns in Texas without splitting the income and the withholding and deduction for both spouses.

**Social Security Beneficiaries Should Keep Tab of Earnings**  
Social security beneficiaries should keep a close check on their earnings, according to Mrs. Helen Rigdon, social security branch manager for the Vernon office. When earnings exceed \$1680, part or all benefits may not be due. The amount not due will depend on the exact annual earnings.  
If you receive social security benefits and expect to earn over \$1680 in 1969, you should report this to your social security office as early as possible. You might be overpaid unless an adjustment is made.  
After the year has ended, file a second report with social security giving the exact amount of your earnings based on your W-2 forms or income tax return. This report is due by April 15, 1970. Adjustments in the amount that was withheld from your benefits during the year will be made if actual earnings differ from your estimate.  
Those over age 72 in all months of the year are allowed to earn any amount without having any benefits withheld and no reports or estimates are required from them.  
Rental income, interest, dividends and income from investments are not counted in either your estimate or annual report.

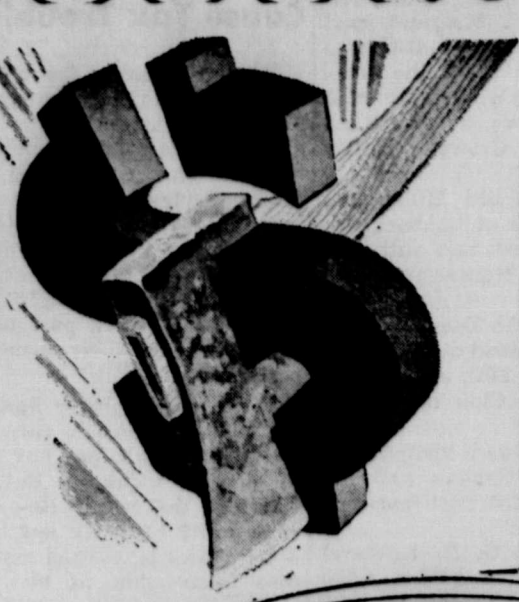

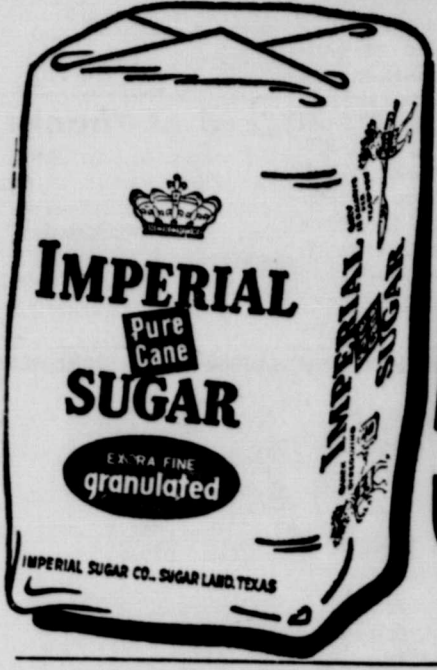

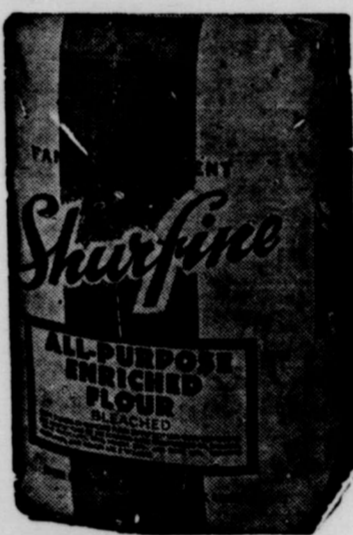
