## Water Proposal for Foard City Area to Be Presented

There is a possibility under a federal plan for the people of Foard City and the surrounding area to secure water for household and livestock use if sufficient subscribers are secured, according to Fred Parkey of the Red River Water Authority. The regulations require a total of 3 subscribers per mile, but the Foard County plan would be submitted with a package proposal which would lower the required number for this area. The rates, as announced by Mr. Parkey, would be as follows:

**\$7.50 for the first 3,000 gallons; 90c per thousand for the next 3,000 gallons; 80c per thousand for the next 3,000 gallons; and 70c per thousand for the next 3,000 gallons.**

An open hearing will be held in the high school auditorium at 1:30 p. m. on Friday, Nov. 14, at which time Mr. Parkey will explain the details of the program.

## Demos Set 915 as Voter Registration Quota for County

The "Operation: Everybody" voter quota for Foard County has been set by the Texas Democratic Party at 915, according to County Chairman Ray Shirley.

"That figure represents 65 percent of our estimated voting population," Mr. Shirley said. "The state goal is to have 4,250,000 Texans registered between now and the end of the registration period on January 31."

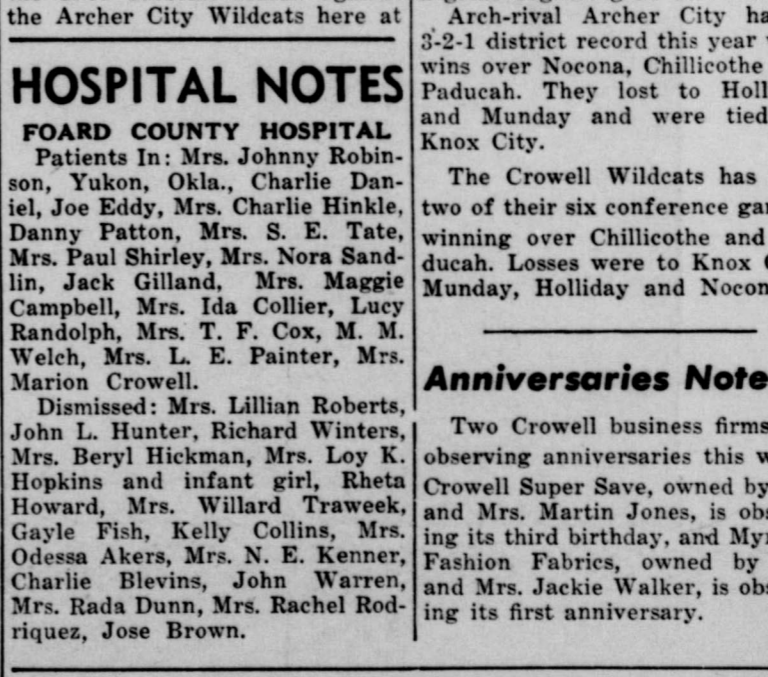
