

## Cotton Destroyed Prior to Harvest

"If your cotton is not worth harvesting, you may request measurement service at the rate of \$5.50 per hour for this office to measure the acreage harvested," Mrs. Jean L. Reeder, office manager of the Foard County ASCS, said Tuesday.

"If you want to prove your yield in future years, you must harvest some cotton each year of the 3-year base period," Mrs. Reeder added.

## Classification of Triticale Explained

Triticale is considered a feed grain but is not covered by the present feed grain program; therefore will not earn price support payments nor will it be counted against the feed grain base.

## Cotton Marketing Quota Referendum Set for Dec. 1-5

Eligible cotton producers will vote on whether to accept the new marketing quota in a referendum to be held by mail on December 1 through 5, the Foard County A. S. C. S. office, announced this week.

For the 1970 crop, the farm domestic acreage allotment has been set at 65 per cent of the acreage allotment, the minimum authorized by law. Farmers who sign up to participate in the program and who plant at least their domestic allotment, but not in excess of the permitted acreage for the farm, will be eligible for price support loans and price support payments based on the farm's domestic allotment.

Other details of the 1970 cotton program will be announced and cotton producers will receive notice of the farm allotment prior to the referendum date, Mrs. Jean Reeder, office manager for ASCS, said Tuesday.

Twenty-three members of the Licensed Vocational Nurses Association held here during the past week received their diplomas in graduation exercises held at the High School auditorium Thursday night.

This is the second LVN school to be conducted here sponsored by the Crowell Schools and funded by the U. S. Department of Labor.

## Sweet Sorghum Not Eligible on Diverted Acres

Sweet sorghum will not be authorized in diverted acres beginning with the 1970 crop, Mrs. Jean Reeder, manager of the Foard County ASCS office, said Tuesday. "This has been a common practice to plant sweet sorghum on diverted acres and graze after October 1; however, starting with the 1970 crop, only a grass or grass-cross will be eligible to be planted on diverted acres. The reason for the change was that substantial benefits were obtained by grazing sweet sorghum and this competed with feed grain in the production of beef," Mrs. Reeder explained.

## Petition Seeks Change of Rayland Area Land from Vernon to Crowell District

A petition signed by 26 residents of a 4.7 square mile area of Foard County, part of the old Lockett School District consolidated with Vernon School District recently, was presented to the Wilbarger County School Board Wednesday of last week.

The petition requests separation of the area from the Vernon School District and annexation to the Crowell School District. It was presented by T. F. Lambert, Jr., Robert Streit and Louis Kiesch-

nick. The area includes the community of Rayland and has a school tax valuation of \$68,270.00, according to Wilbarger County Judge Henry Scott, the ex-officio Wilbarger County Superintendent.

Mr. Lambert said a similar petition was also presented to the Foard County School Board. He said he and other members of the group have been assisted by Mike Bird, president of the Crowell School Board, in seeking the action.

Elbert White, president of the Wilbarger School Board, told members of the delegation the Wilbarger trustees would take the matter under advisement.

He said that since the present school year would not be affected by the proposal, considerable time remains for a decision. Only action of the two county boards is required. No election is necessary.

## Final Date for Cotton Allotment Transfers Is December 31, 1969

The final date for transferring cotton allotment acreage is Dec. 31, 1969, according to information released Tuesday by Mrs. Jean L. Reeder, office manager of the Foard County ASCS.

Mrs. Reeder added, "For 1970, cotton allotments may be transferred to farms whether or not the farm has a cotton allotment. This is a change from the 1969 cotton transfer provisions. Any farmer interested in growing cotton may lease or buy cotton allotment acreage for the 1970 crop."







**Livestock Reports Needed from Farmers and Ranchers**

During the last half of November, some 40,000 Texas ranchers and farmers will receive a livestock survey questionnaire from Cary Palmer, State Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This is a joint endeavor of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service, USDA, to provide a program of county estimates for Texas.

In Texas, there are 254 counties, and each farmer and rancher in each county is an important part of the state's agriculture. Their reports are needed to provide accurate estimates for Texas cattle, hogs and chickens. Another survey on sheep and goats will be made in late December.  
John McAllister, head of the local Soil Conservation Service office urges each farmer and/or rancher to fill out his questionnaire carefully and return it promptly in the self-addressed envelope to the agricultural statistician. This will do much to provide the accurate data needed for the county data bulletins for 1968 are now available by writing the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Box 70, Austin, or by writing John C. White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, P. O. Drawer BB, Capitol Station, Austin.
