FOUR-COUNTY EOAC RECEIVES OKAY ON FUNDS FOR YEAR'S OPERATIONS

Governor Preston Smith announced his approval last Friday of a community action grant to the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation of Cottle, Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger Counties for \$160,968.00 in new funds.

Felix Taylor is executive director of the EOAC which has its main offices at the community center in Crowell.

Funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, this grant also involves \$2,000 in carry-over funds making a total of \$162,968.00 for the agency's operation for its program year which began Monday, December 1.

Program accounts included in the grant and the amount of new funds assigned to each are as follows: program administration, \$38,779; neighborhood service systems, \$55,279; housing services, \$9,133; emergency food and medical services, \$37,994; and senior opportunities and services, \$19,783.

The neighborhood service systems program will be used to upgrade residents' leadership in their community and to provide better resources for employment opportunities for the low-income persons in the four-county area. Approximately 70 per cent of the 3,400 families eligible will be served at centers in the four counties through such programs as senior citizens programs, counseling for young, club activities and classes in cooking, sewing, quilting, leathercraft, typing, physical fitness, adult education, citizenship and remodeling.

According to the announcement from the governor's office, the elderly in this four-county area have been lonely and isolated for so long, that they are welcoming solutions to their dilemma. Many are ill and confined and the senior opportunities and services program will aid these persons as well as those able to go to the center in the housing authority building in Vernon, the neighborhood centers and another senior center housed in a donated church building. Outreach workers are being used to contact these persons. The centers will offer arts and craft classes, club activities, courses sponsored in various fields such as refresher courses conducted by the Department of Public Safety and classes in nutritional education given in cooperation with other agencies, etc. A registered nurse is used in this program to assist the elderly who are ill, and volunteers will be used to help provide needed transportation to doctors, centers, and other places the isolated elderly need to go. Library services will also be provided in the centers for them.

The emergency food and medical services program will be used to assist approximately 17 per cent of the 2,748 families eligible for this emergency service. Outreach workers will be used to contact those in need, and then families will receive both emergency foods and needed medical services until either they can receive help from other sources or find suitable employment and become able to help themselves.

The housing services program is designed to assist 120 families during the coming program year to improve their housing. The program will make tool loans, and give advice and training to the families wanting to improve their homes. This program has proved especially popular in the area, as the people do want to improve their housing and need this little extra help to make it an accomplished fact. The neighborhood and senior centers will be used for consultation and classes in the housing program.

School Board Re-Hires Secretary at Monday Meeting

Members of the Crowell School Board, in their regular meeting last Monday night, held a long discussion period concerning the ever-increasing deficit facing the school brought about by increased costs of operation and decreases in property evaluations in the district, which are caused principally by the decreasing oil production.

In other business, the board re-elected J. H. Gillespie as school secretary for the year beginning January 1, 1970, and ending December 31, 1970.

Gillespie reported that of the \$158,801.00 in assessed taxes in the district this year, he has collected about \$122,000.00. This is about 74 per cent collections.

Jeff Bell reported that total contributions for the entrance to Dick Todd Field have risen to a total of \$1,146.50. Mr. Bell said it is hoped that the goal of \$1,500 can be reached by Christmas.

Final Pages of History of Foard County Go to Press Last Week

Ed Eakin, editor of the Quannah Tribune-Chief, which is publishing the history of Foard County, had the following remarks concerning the book in last week's edition of the Quannah paper:

"The final pages on the History of Foard County go to press this week end and hopefully, the finished products will be delivered by Christmas.

"The fact that a Quannah preacher, Bailey Phelps, could author the book and a Quannah publisher, the Tribune-Chief, handle publication, is a silent testimony to the fact that after more than half a century the folks south of the Pease River have finally either forgotten or forgiven Quannah for stealing their courthouse.

"The notorious theft took place when old Margaret was county seat and the brass railroad town of Quannah brought in voters via the rails to pack the ballot boxes in favor of moving the courthouse here.

"But Crowell and Margaret residents got even later when they had the county sliced in two at the Pease River and set up house keeping for the new Foard County at Crowell.

"With the help of the Foard County Historical Survey Committee and the untiring leadership of Mrs. Virgil Johnson, Pastor Phelps has spun a fascinating history of Foard County and the people who carved a new way of life from this wilderness region.

"Just for the records, you may still reserve one of the books at the pre-publication price of \$10. The hard-back book will have some 236 pages with more than 150 photographs of early day scenes and people."

Holiday Food for Thought

The war against poverty and deprivation begins at home but it must not end there. We live at a time when the ability to transform the world is only limited by faintness of heart or narrowness of vision.—From the report of the Commission on International Development.

Capital NEWS

Tex.—A 1968 constitutional amendment did not affect the amount of fees that the paid county tax assessors for assessing and collecting county taxes, but it did affect the amount that may be paid to the state. So ruled Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin recently.

Another recent opinion, Mar. 10, 1968, concluded that the State Department of Public Health is authorized to spend for refurbishing the interior of a building which is leased by the state on a long-term basis and the welfare agency.

As otherwise recordable acts of heirship may be recorded in the office of a county clerk though the unprobated will is not constituting the heirship, the unprobated will will not constitute the heirship if it contains acknowledgment.

Texas Board of Corrections is obligated to collect, nor public utilities pay, for placing along public roadways crossing state-owned lands for prison system control. (TBC has authority to grant utility permits over such public roadways.)

Harris County Hospital District may legally enter into a lease contract for an x-ray equipment for a period of five years, contingent on availability of appropriated funds.

NOT BAN URGED — Travis County Society of Austin called on Governor Smith to use "all means" to ban the use of insecticide DDT in Texas.

Resolution claimed that DDT is harmful to wildlife, remains toxic in the environment for 10 years, is carried by wind and water, and has been "implicated" as a possible cancer cause.

Arizona, California and Michigan, Czechoslovakia, Sweden and Denmark have banned DDT already, the Society contended, further noting that "numerous other countries can do the job and

budget to help preserve the artifacts found in the wreck of a Spanish galleon off Padre Island.

Dr. Fred Werndorf, Southern Methodist University archaeologist who was elected chairman of the committee, proposed the expenditure for chemicals and photographic supplies for emergency work to prevent rusting of iron cannons and other iron artifacts.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, who is a member of the committee, made it clear that it is now absolutely illegal for anyone to explore for offshore artifacts without a permit from the new committee.

SPANISH LAND CLAIMS — Mrs. Celia Saiz Montez of Victoria is trying to collect a debt from the United States that she says Mexico has owed her, under a treaty between the two governments, since 1934. Debt goes back to land grant given her ancestors by the King of Spain. Under a treaty, the United States agreed to pay the claims of Americans living in Mexico and Mexico agreed to pay the claims of Mexicans living in the United States. However, the Mexican government has refused to pay Mrs. Saiz Montez because she is an American citizen and the United States has refused because it argues that her ancestors were Mexicans. She is taking the case to Federal district court.

HOG CHOLERA — Both the State and Federal Departments of Agriculture are warning ranchers to be careful of hog cholera during winter. They report that hog cholera struck 19 Texas herds during October. A total of 1,684 animals in 19 infected and 23 exposed herds were disposed of during the month at a cost of \$46,300. Departments said that "every outbreak that is located and eliminated this winter reduces the chance for spread next spring when movements of pigs will increase again."

DEMONSTRATORS — Texas' Board of Regents of State Senior Colleges endorsed the suspension of 10 Southwest Texas State University students by the school's president for participating in an unauthorized demonstration. Students were suspended by Dr. Billy M. Jones after they failed to break up a moratorium demonstration on university property. American Civil Liberties Union has said they will take the case to the courts.

Taxpayers Ask Internal Revenue

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—I occasionally entertain customers by taking them on a fishing trip. Can I deduct anything for the cost of operating my boat?

A—Unless you use the boat more than half the time for business purposes, only gasoline, oil, and other out-of-pocket expenses incurred during the trip for it may be deducted.

If the boat was used more than 50 per cent for business, a portion of your costs of operating the boat, such as depreciation, repairs and general operating expenses, may be taken as a business expense. Records showing the date of each business use, number of persons entertained and similar information must be kept to establish that the boat was used more than 50 per cent for business use.

Q—My son is working this summer for the first time and wants me to open up a bank account for him in his name. Do I use my social security number or his to identify this account? He's just 14.

A—Use your son's social security number. Interest earned on the account is income to your son and therefore should be identified by his account number.

Q—I made a payment on my taxes which is not reflected in the bill you sent me. What should I do about it?

A—Reduce your bill by the amount of the payment and pay the balance. To enable us to properly credit your account indicate on the bill the amount of your payment, the date paid and where it was sent.

When making tax payments, write your social security number and the kind of tax you are paying on your check or money order.

Q—if I don't make a contribution this year to the self-employed retirement plan my partner and I have set up for our business, will the plan lose its favorable tax status?

A—No, the fact that you make no contribution to the plan this year will not disqualify it. If you have any other questions about your plan, send a post card to your district director of Internal Revenue and ask for a copy of Publication 560, Retirement Plans for Self-Employed Individuals.

Q—My college says in a brochure it sent me that if I make a charitable donation of stock on which I show a profit, I won't have to pay any tax on that profit. Is that right?

A—Yes, a tax deduction may be taken for the full market value of the stock on the date the donation was made. And there would be no income tax on the increase in value.

Q—Does the taxpayer get paid any interest on the amount due him when the government is late issuing an income tax refund?

A—Yes, interest is added to overpayments that are not refunded within 45 days of the due date of the return or the date the return is filed, whichever is later. The interest rate is 6 per cent per year.
