Drive Against Fire Ants Urgent As Extent Of Damage Increases

Farm leaders from 12 Southern states unanimously supported a special campaign seeking to eradicate the imported fire ant at a recent conference in Montgomery, Alabama. Some 50 Mississippi officials and lawmakers accompanied State Commissioner Jim Buck Ross to meet with their counterparts from other Dixie states. A major objective of this campaign is adequate funding, seeking to increase the present \$25,000 budget to a total of \$41 million for fire ant eradication to curb heavy damage to farm animals, soil, wildlife and potential threats to human safety. Agricultural leaders agree that prospects are favored for stamping out this dangerous and costly pest, if all states concerned with the problem can unite coordinated action. Fire ants are a grave and serious problem in both rural and urban areas of the South. They now infest about 120 million acres in nine states. Federal and state quarantines have not halted the spread but recent large scale eradication tests have eliminated big infestations without harming wildlife or leaving residues. The Montgomery conference endorsed the Southern Plant Board's position that federal funds provide two-thirds of fire ant eradication expenses. Under the projected cost-sharing formula, Mississippi would contribute about \$1 million annually over a 10-year period. A lesser amount would be required for a two-year mop-up operation. Fire ant eradication involves the distribution of mirex poison bait. It is a slow-acting chemical impregnated into corn cob grits. Ants carry the tiny granules into their mounds where they are consumed, killing the entire colony. State Commissioner of Agriculture Jim Buck Ross has called for coordinated efforts by fellow commissioners in other affected states as well as legislators and entomologists in the Dixie area. It is a timely and imperative objective, one which needs and must have sustained support of officials, farm leaders and residents of all states where the fire ant menace is acute.

Kindest Cut of All

"A tax cut is the kindest cut of all," stated Robert C. Tyson, finance committee chairman of U. S. Steel. He then continued: "I believe that . . . the most important long-range tax reform for the general well-being of both the public and private sectors (of the economy) is tax reduction . . . no one is ever normally impelled to earn or produce anything by the knowledge that the fruits of his labor will be taxed away from him." Mr. Tyson further stated, "a man may . . . produce in spite of, but never because of, taxes."

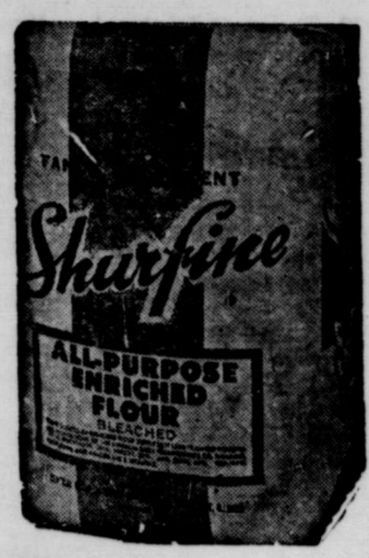
