## Initial Order of History of Foard County Sold Out

### Another Order of Books Expected from Bindery This Week

"What a hit." That is the way the publisher of the Quanaq Tribune-Chief described the launching of the Foard County history, "They Loved the Land," by Bailey Phelps.

Mrs. Virgil Johnson, chairman of the Foard County Historical Survey Committee, has issued the following statement in regard to the recent publication:

"We want to express our deep gratitude to Foard County residents, former residents, and area residents for receiving the book in such a marvelous way. We realize how little we could have done without your full cooperation. Many who were not members of the committee contributed to the success of the book, and for this, we want to express our gratitude.

"On April 24, 1969, The Foard County News issued the formal announcement that plans had been approved to publish the history of Foard County in book form. Three days later, we received two checks for the book and they continued until pre-publication orders exceeded 400. Old photos and family histories followed. You were very patient with your valuable photos and a miracle within itself is that of some 500, only one was lost and we will be able to duplicate it. We regret that we were unable to use more than half of the photos due to lack of space. We regret, too, that not all pioneers are included within the pages of the book; we tried to give ample notice, but regardless of everything, it seems that no book can contain all that it should. Perhaps there will be a supplement later. If you like the idea, let us know.

"Less than one week after the January 17 autographing and release, every available copy of the first 550 was sold and orders are now being accepted for the second shipment which we hope to receive from the bindery by the end of this week.

"If you paid for a book and for some reason it has not been delivered, please let us know. If all of your photos have not been returned, let us know about that.

"We would suggest that you check the pages in your book to see that they are properly numbered. It has been called to our attention that in only a few instances, there is an error. Please let us know if your book is one of these.

"Miss Margaret Curtis submitted the history of Bethel Baptist Church and a whole line was inadvertently omitted. On page 56, line seven, should read: Sam Anderson was the first Sunday School Superintendent and J. W. Curtis was the first Church Clerk.

"On page 285, the center man in the picture of Foard County officials is John S. Ray, county and district clerk.

### NOTICE

Since the purchase of these books is made possible only by public donations, it is essential that all persons who use the privilege of checking books out, return them on their due date. The librarian has sent out over-due notices, and she and the library committee request that the books be returned.

## B. J. Halencak Kills Dove Banded in North Dakota

A mourning dove killed in Foard County last fall by B. J. Halencak traveled here from North Dakota in two months or less, according to a letter received by Mr. Halencak this week. The bird was banded near Upham, N. D. on July 28, 1969, and was killed by Halencak on September 28, 1969.

A certificate of appreciation was mailed to Halencak, and it stated:

"This certificate is awarded in appreciation of the report of bird band number 1183-39579. Records maintained at the bird band laboratory, Migratory Bird Population Station, Laurel, Md., 20810, USA, indicate that this band was placed on a mourning dove near Upham, N. D., on July 28, 1969. It was banded by personnel of J. Clark Salyer National Wildlife Refuge, Upham, N. D. The bird was less than one year old when banded. The bird banding laboratory will notify the bander that you indicated the band number was obtained on Pease River, north of Crowell, on Sept. 28, 1969.

"For the interest and cooperation shown by reporting the band number and data noted above, the federal, state and provincial conservation agencies and the professional and amateur ornithologists who participate in the North American bird banding program extend their sincere appreciation."

## Break in Weather Brings Warmer Temperatures

After about 30 days of severe winter weather, Foard County had a beautiful week end with shirt-sleeve weather continuing through this week.

The big snow which fell here December 28, where it drifted on US 70 east of town, was still evident in a few scattered spots in the bar ditch Sunday. It has been a long time since a snow remained on the ground for four weeks.

## School Making All-Out Effort to Enumerate Pupils

The board of the Crowell Independent School District is making an all-out effort to obtain a complete count of all school-age children, those who will be six years of age by Sept. 1, 1970, through all grades to those who will be eighteen years of age or under as of Sept. 1, 1970.

J. H. Gillespie, school secretary, urges all parents or guardians who have been sent census blanks to fill in the forms and return them.

The greatest difficulty is experienced in locating six-year-old students, the ones who will be enrolling in school for the first time next fall. Parents of six-year-olds with no older children in school are asked to contact Gordon Erwin, grade school principal.

## District Attorney To Prosecute Trespassers

Wolf and rabbit hunters who trespass on ranchers' and farmers' lands without permission, or cause damage, will be prosecuted hereafter to the full extent permitted by the law, Bill Neal, District Attorney, stated Thursday.

"Numerous farmers and ranchers have called me during the past few weeks complaining of nighttime hunters," Neal said.

In many instances considerable damage has resulted to the landowner, the DA stated.

"I am requesting the officers in Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger Counties to take additional measures to apprehend these trespassers or any hunter who causes damage," he said.

Hunters are urged to obtain permission before going on to any property in this area. It is also against the law to shoot on, from or across a public road.

## Bloodmobile to Be in Crowell on February 18th

Foard County residents were reminded this week that the Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in Crowell on Wednesday, February 18, to take donations of blood from area residents.

The Bloodmobile comes to Foard County twice each year, and local hospital officials are hoping for a big turnout of donors.

## Monday, Feb. 2, Last Day to File for First Primary

Voter registration in Foard County climbed this week past the 1,000 mark with the last day to register being Saturday, Jan. 31.

Sheriff Dan Callaway said Monday that the tax assessor-collector's office will not be open next Saturday, but anyone wishing to register who has not already done so should call him at 684-3221, or Deputy Joe Don Brown, 684-2451.

Application blanks for voter registration will be available through Saturday at the City and Connie's Cafes and Shirley-Youree Drug.

The voter registration total for the year has already exceeded the 1968 year—a presidential election year—when the registration total was 1,032 about a week before the January 31 deadline.

The county is far ahead of the goal of 915 as set by the State Democratic Executive Committee in the "Operation: Everybody!" project to get Texans to register to vote.

Gold, silver and bronze plaques will be awarded to the counties which exceed their quotas by the highest margins.

**Monday Is Last Day to File**  
Next Monday, February 2, is the deadline for candidates to file with the Democratic Executive Committee chairman, Ray Shirley, in order to be listed on the Democratic primary ballot.

Terms of the county judge, county attorney, county treasurer, county and district clerk, commissioners of Precincts 2 and 4 and Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, all expire this year.

## NEW LVN SCHOOL TO BEGIN IN CROWELL

Congressman Graham Purcell has announced a grant from the U. S. Department of Labor, administered and approved by the Texas Employment Commission and the Texas Education Agency, for a training program for licensed vocational nurses.

The grant is awarded under the Manpower Development and Training Act and the sponsoring agency is the Crowell Independent School District.

Total amount of the grant is \$74,637.00, which includes \$45,400.00 in training allowances and \$25,237.00 for institution costs.

Effective starting date of the project was January 12, 1970, and ending date is January 8, 1971.

The program will train 24 licensed vocational nurses, with Mrs. Edith Roark as instructor, and Mrs. Allene Williams her assistant.

Classes will begin at 8 a. m., Monday, February 8, at the community center in Crowell. The first five weeks of training will be classroom instruction, to be followed by classroom work and also work in hospitals.

Students will be coming here from Quanaq, Chillicothe, Paducah and Knox City. Foard County residents enrolled are Mrs. Mary Quintero, Mrs. Lydia Oneal, Mrs. Ann Whitley and Miss Jeanette Bolibruch.

This will be the third LVN school held here under the federal program.

## STATE Capital NEWS

Austin, Tex.—As the January 31 deadline for voters to register draws near, Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr., the state's election officer, issued a "last call" to those who are 21 or over.

Registration is at the county tax assessor-collector's office, but in many counties, deputies have been set up at convenient locations. Persons over 60 who live in towns of less than 10,000 or in rural areas must re-register every year.

Under the old law, persons past 60 in small towns and rural areas did not have to register, but it now is required every year. If they fail to register by January 31, they will not be able to vote in this year's important elections.

Dies also pointed out that young people who will become 21 during 1970 can register before their 21st birthday. Tax office will mark on their registration certificate the date on which they will become 21 and therefore eligible to vote.

Both political parties and a number of civic groups are putting on registration drives, seeking a goal of more than 4 million registered voters this year.

**OIL IMPORT WORRIES**—Concern over possible federal elimination of oil import quotas caused state political and industry leaders to hoist new storm warnings.

New taxes and serious economic losses are in store for Texas if the Nixon administration scraps the import quota for the tariff system, say informed officials.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes called on the Legislative Budget Board staff to determine how much the removal of import barriers would reduce state revenue should oil prices tumble from \$3 to \$2.25 a barrel. Import problem, together with long range appropriation commitments, could create a "very, very grave" tax problem for the Legislature next year, Barnes said.

Gov. Preston Smith expressed a similar view in a press conference, terming the potential tax loss from tampering with import quotas "severe."

Democratic Senate candidate Lloyd M. Bentsen, Jr. predicted that state tax revenues, 40 percent of which are derived from the petroleum industry, would "drastically decline" if the tariff system is imposed. He noted that many school districts also draw the bulk of their local revenues for public school support from the oil and gas industry.

Alvin Hope, San Antonio independent oil man, told the Texas Railroad Commission that proposals to reduce crude oil through a sliding scale tariff collected by the U. S. Treasury would be the "death knoll of the domestic industry as we know it."

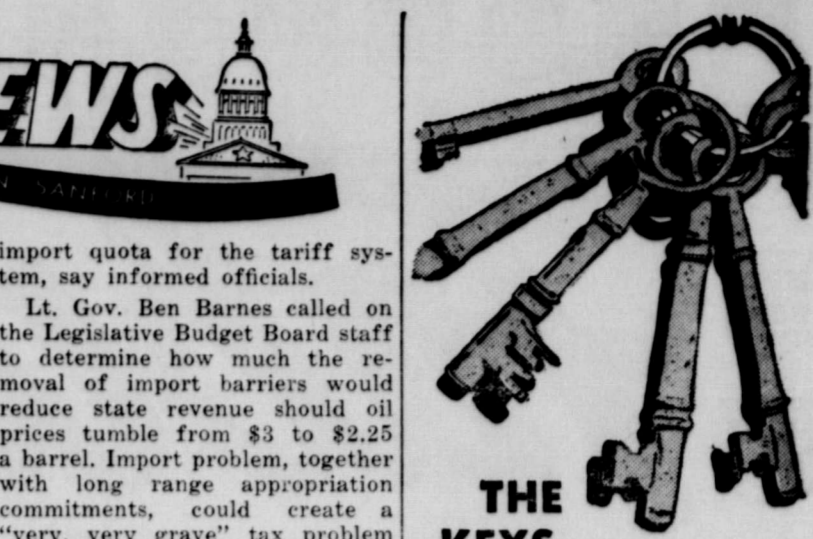
**CAMPUS MADE**—Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, had some jarring news for students.

Board voted tough new regulations to curb the "alarmingly-high" delinquency rate on repayments of the \$285 million Hinson-Hazlewood student loan program. Put into effect was a requirement that applications (except in extreme hardship cases) have co-signers. Colleges may also lose their eligibility to continue their students participation in the program if they don't help police delinquencies.

A careful system of interviews, followups, parental signatures and required letters of recommendation also will be invoked.

Chairman Manuel DeBusk of Dallas, the new board chairman, said he thinks tuitions should be tied to a fixed percentage cost of the overall education program—which would mean a sharp increase.

DeBusk also recommended a separate board of regents for each undergraduate college and university. UT Board Chairman Frank C. Erwin Jr. replied that all boards have grave enough responsibilities to keep them busy "without any unnecessary and wasteful rivalry."

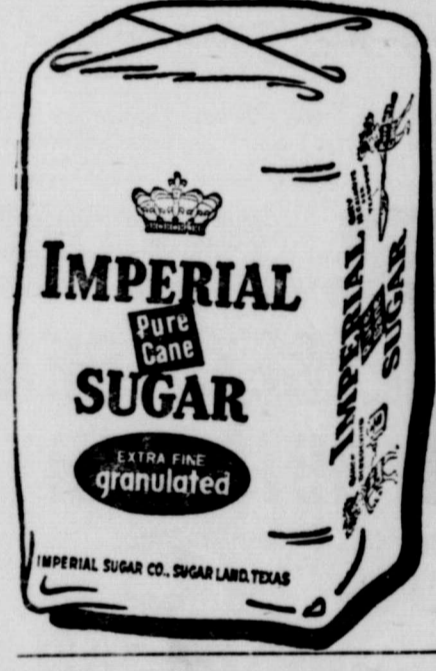

Medical Service Aids Physicians In Diagnosing Rare Birth Defects

"Every week physicians around the country write to us for help in diagnosing rare and unfamiliar birth defects," says Dr. Murray Feingold, co-director of the Syndrome Identification and Consultation Service at Boston Floating Hospital for Infants and Children.

Dr. Feingold and Dr. Sydney S. Gellis, co-directors of the Service, are distinguished pediatricians and editors of a monthly feature on pediatric abnormalities which appears in the "American Journal of Diseases of Children."

Dr. Feingold, assistant professor of pediatrics, Tufts University, also is chief of ambulatory services and director of the March of Dimes Birth Defects Center at the hospital. Dr. Gellis, professor and chairman of the pediatrics department at Tufts, is hospital pediatrician-in-chief.

First of Its Kind

The Syndrome Identification and Consultation Service, first of its kind, is available to physicians without charge. During its first year of operation, requests have been handled from all parts of the United States and abroad.

Some syndromes are so rare that many physicians may not have encountered the condition previously," he notes. "The Identification Service makes available the experience of a group of specialists who have an extensive interest in these disorders. For the first time we have the opportunity to gather and disseminate this kind of information."

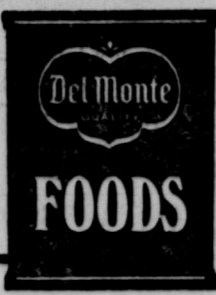
