Grady Halbert Recipient of High Rotary Club Honor

Grady Halbert, member of the Crowell Rotary Club, was honored at a meeting Wednesday last week at which he was named a "Paul Harris Fellow." The award is named for the founder of Rotary and presents a gift of at least \$1,000 area Rotarians given to the Rotary Foundation in honor of Mr. Halbert. Halbert has been a supporter of the Rotary Foundation for many years, and has made supplies, and unless talks his section urging their support wn. Mr. Halbert is one of 300 men the world who have been named Paul Harris Fellows. He received a plaque and medal from T. Freeman of Wichita Falls, governor of Rotary District 579. Three past district governors are here and spoke briefly of their associations during the years with Mr. Halbert. They were Sid Gaines of Wichita Falls, Ira Kersnick of Fort Worth and Roscoe Blankenship of Abilene. Mmes. Freeman, Gaines and Blankenship accompanied their husbands to the meeting and also attending the elderly. Representing Mrs. Warren Taylor, widow of a past district governor, several local Rotarians also attended the meeting. Mr. Halbert is a past president of the Crowell club, a past district governor and an honorary fellow of the Rotary Foundation.

Two Guilty Pleas Entered in District Court Monday: Three Cases Postponed

Two guilty pleas were heard in district court Monday of this week. Dale Bradford of Paducah pled guilty to a charge of forgery and passing and Judge Tom Davis handed down a 3-year probation sentence. The forged instrument was a \$30.00 check passed at D&T Foodway on Nov. 17, 1969, District Attorney Bill Neal said.

Randy Ellis of Guthrie pled guilty to a forgery charge, and on the recommendation of the district attorney, the charge was reduced from a felony to a misdemeanor, and Ellis was fined in county court after making restitution of the amount involved.

The charge stemmed from the same check as in Bradford's case. Three cases which were have to be brought before a petit jury were continued until a later date. One was for sale of marijuana, with the other two being theft by false pretext charges against two men.

District Attorney Neal said Monday that he had requested an early setting of a trial date by Judge Davis so that these three cases can be tried as soon as possible.

The 50 prospective jurors called Monday were dismissed, and a new panel will be called when the trials come up.

Granddaughter of Truscott Couple Wins Job Interview Contest

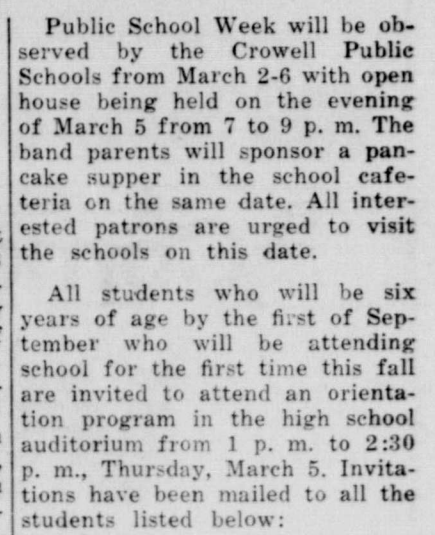

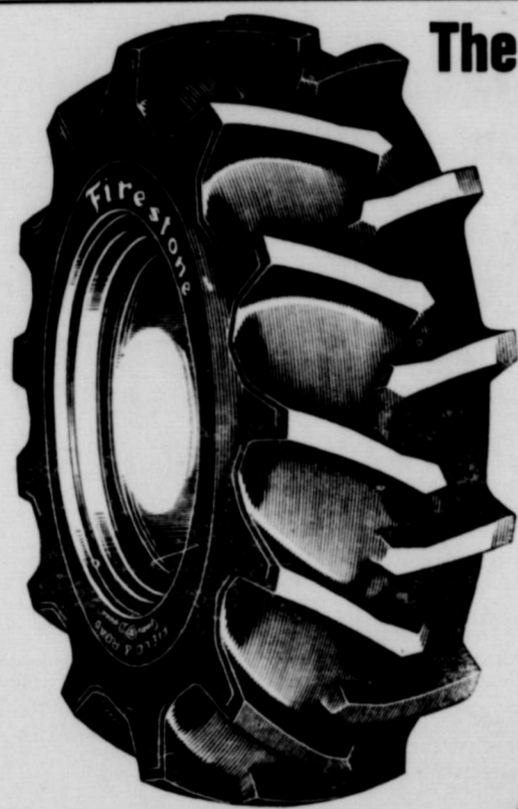

Duane Johnson owns a 1,030 acre ranch twelve miles west of Crowell. A visit to the Johnson ranch and a chat with Duane is enough to convince anyone that soil and water conservation pays. One can sense the pride Duane takes in his ranching operation.

Not only is Duane an excellent young rancher; but he and his wife, Margie, are community leaders and active members of the First Methodist Church in Crowell. Their beautiful western style ranch home is built on a high hill that overlooks almost the entire ranch. From the house you can see the rangeland where brush has been cleared, grassed waterways, parallel terraces and farm ponds. Add to this scene good quality cattle, four or five cow ponies and a covey of quail fluttering on the hillside—and you can easily see why Duane and Margie have a love for the land.

Duane has a Great Plains Conservation Program contract on his ranch and makes good use of the Agricultural Conservation Program on the land that he leases. SCS District Conservationist John McAlister says, "It is very gratifying to see a young man earning his living from the land and yet being fully aware that the land must be cared for. There is not a rancher in Foard County who has a better understanding of the

needs of his soil, plants and animals. You can't help thinking what rural America would be like if every farmer and rancher would care for his land as Duane has. This is soil stewardship in its fullest meaning."

The Board of Directors of the Lower Pease River SWCD is proud to name Duane Johnson our Outstanding Conservation Rancher for 1969.

Listed below are Duane's accomplishments in carrying out a sound soil and water conservation plan:

- 14,794 feet of parallel terraces.
- 693 feet of standard terraces.
- 10 acres of grassed waterways.
- 262 acres of brush control.
- 262 acres of range seeding.
- 1 farm pond.
- 184 acres of conservation cropping system.
- 184 acres of stubble mulching.
- 184 acres of contour farming.
- 416 acres of range deferred grazing.
- 833 acres of proper range use.

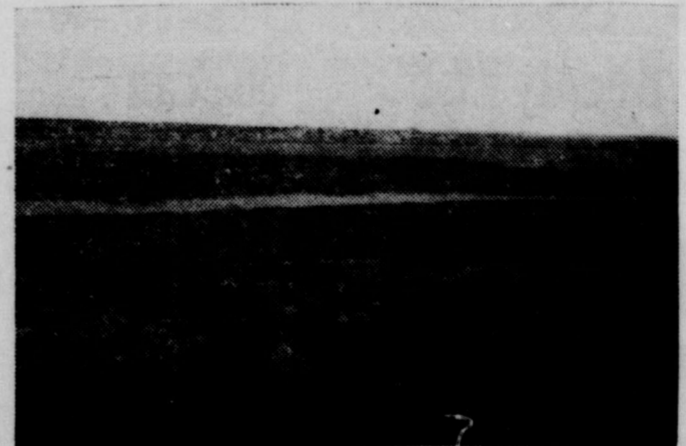

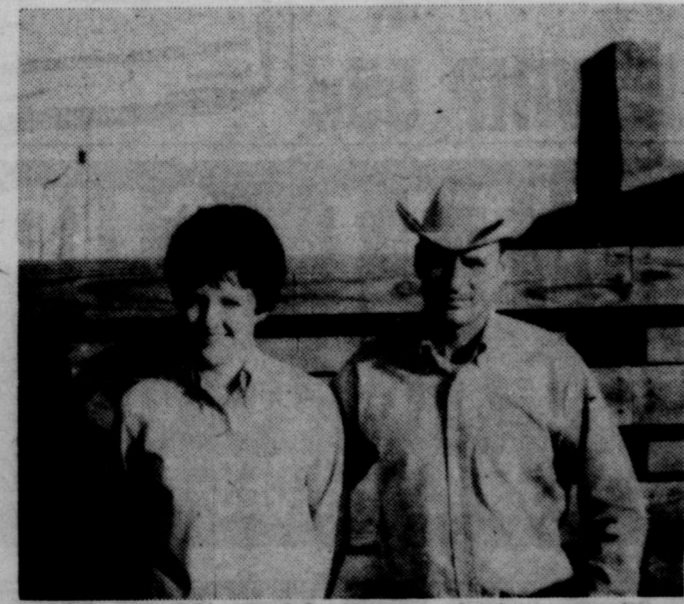

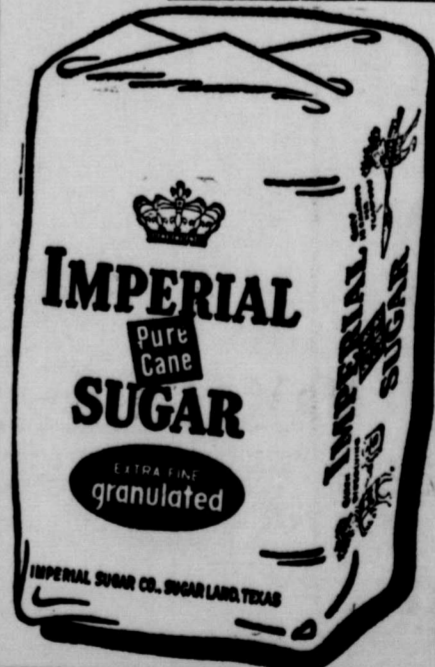
