









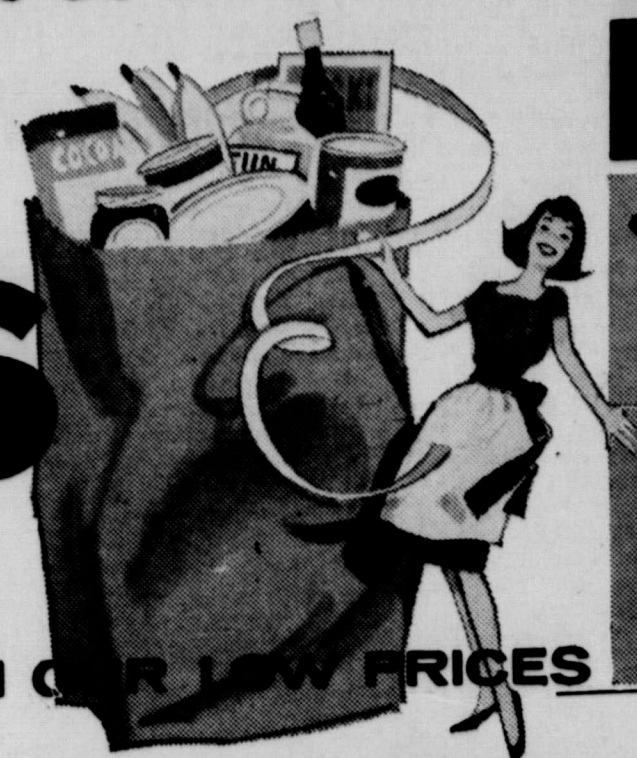

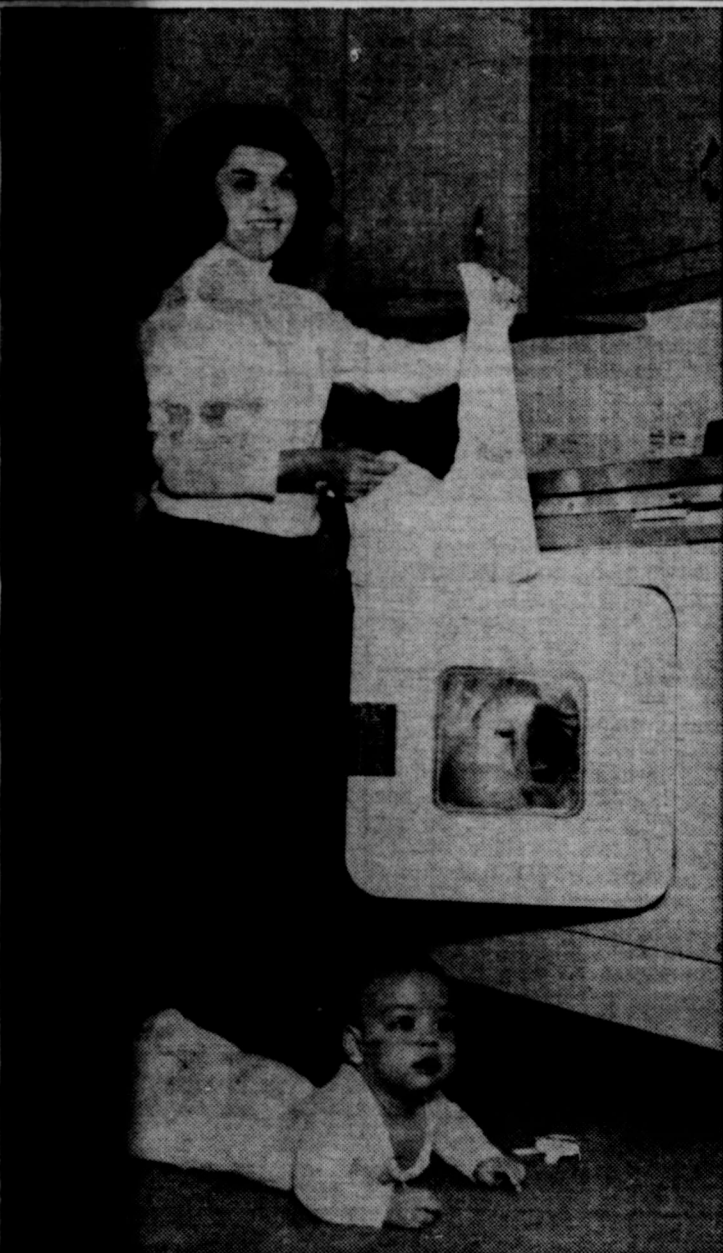

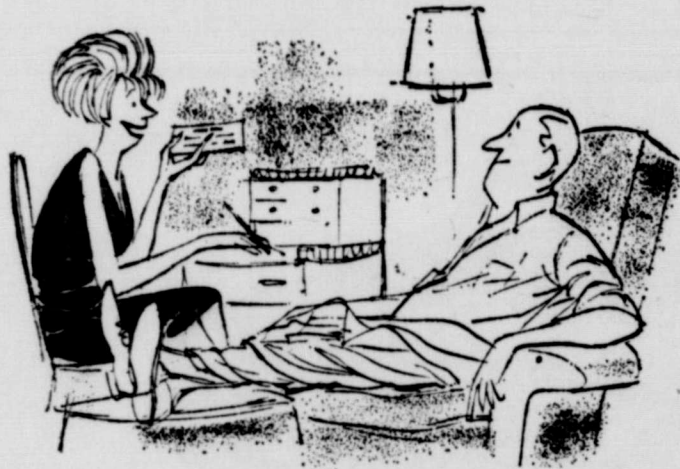
## Truscott H. D. Club

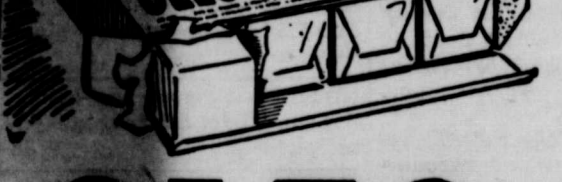

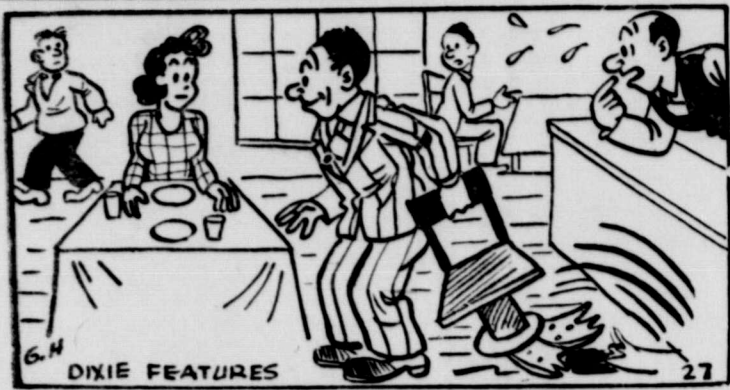

ers lassoed the hearts of America in the 1920's and 1930's.

The Oklahoma cowboy was, in Damon Runyon's words, "America's most complete human document." Rogers was a showman. The core of his act was his soliloquy which concerned human nature in general and politics in particular. It was barbed and good-natured.

The remarks registered best when he artfully appeared to be tossing them off while primarily concerned with unknotting a rope and making it spin.

He also made a place as a newspaper or syndicated paragrapher, and like many other amateurs, was a "doctor who looked at literature."

Rogers enjoyed and appreciated his newspaper. All he knew, he said, what what he read in the paper.

Some more of his thoughts on his newspaper bear passing on:

"Take away my ham, take away my eggs, even my chili, but leave my newspaper. Even if it has such purely local news as 'Jim Jones came home last night unexpectedly and bloodshed ensued' or 'Jesse Bushyhead, our local M. D., is having one of the best years in his career, practically speaking—but they just won't pay him when they get well,' and 'Election ain't far off, and everybody is up for office that can sign an applica-

tion blank."

"Now all that doesn't seem much news to you. But it is news, especially when you know the people and they are your own folks. So, no matter how punk you think your local newspaper is, let them take it away from you for a while and see how you feel. The old newspaper, I think, is about our biggest blessing. So let's read and be merry, for tomorrow the paper may not have enough ads to come out."

"A breakfast without a newspaper is a horse without a saddle. You are just riding bareback if you get no news for breakfast. Don't underestimate your paper. I don't care how small it is, and how little news you think it might have in it at that particular issue. Lord, kiss it, for the news that it does bring you."

Now, we are going to let Will Rogers cut loose on a number of other topics:

"There ain't nothing that breaks up homes, country and nations like somebody publishing their memoirs."

"Our investigations have always contributed more to our amusement than they have to knowledge."

"It's great to be great, but it's greater to be human."

"Half our life is spent trying to find something to do with the time we have rushed through life trying to save."

"We know lots of things we didn't use to know but we don't know any way to prevent 'em happening."

"A difference of opinion is what makes horse racing and missionaries."

"I never met a man I didn't like."

## Bid Opening on Lake Kemp Project Set for April 2

Re-bidding on the \$5 to \$10 million rehabilitation of Lake Kemp dam and spillway will be opened in Tulsa, Okla., April 2, signifying a start in June on construction of the long-delayed project.

Col. Vernon W. Pinkey, chief engineer of the Tulsa district, said last week that 77 firms, including contractors, sub-contractors and equipment vendors, were mailed lists of official notices of advertisement of bids on the Lake Kemp project, initially published March 5.

Some 12 to 15 contractors are expected to bid. Work, which includes reconstruction of the embankment, outlet works and spillway, is expected to be completed in 1,100 calendar days, or by the summer of 1973.

Delayed a year by a presidential freeze on public works, the program originally was to cost \$7,050,000. After bids were taken a year ago and before the contract was awarded the freeze was announced.

Amis Construction Co. of Oklahoma City was original low bidder, with \$6,130,000. Some \$300,000 over estimates, it was considered within the allowable variation.

Some \$1 million has been budgeted for start of the project, with another \$1.2 million earmarked but not yet approved for continuation.

Reconstruction of the basic facilities of the almost-50-year-old lake, once widely publicized as the eighth largest artificial body of water in the world, will almost double the big reservoir's flood control capacity, it is reported.

There are now some 425,000 acre feet of water in Lake Kemp, originally constructed to control 546,000 acre feet of water.

Rehabilitation plans call for increasing the flood control capacity to just over one million acre feet, while at the same time increasing its 23,000 acres of surface by at least 25 per cent, or expanding surface water coverage by more than 6,000 acres.

Clearance of these anticipated 6,000 acres of additional flood plain to accommodate more surface water resulting from bolstering of the dam and spillway has been the subject of a series of negotiations with land and improvement owners in the Lake Kemp area.

## Two Minutes With the Bible

St. Paul and the Resurrection

The Apostle Paul, in discussing the resurrection of the dead, came to the simple and valid conclusion: "If there be no resurrection of the dead, then is Christ not risen" (I Cor. 15:13).

But the Apostle does not stop here. Hear him as he presses a further argument home:

"And if Christ be not risen, then is our preaching vain, and your faith is also vain" (vers. 14).

And this leads to yet another conclusion: "If Christ be not raised, your faith is vain; ye are yet in your sins." Then they also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished" (vers. 17, 18).

These are frank words about stern realities. If there is no such thing as bodily resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised from the dead, and if this is the case, we have no living Savior.

But granting all this, can we believe in what is palpably impossible? Ah, but is resurrection palpably impossible? Paul answers this question quite simply in this same discussion in First Corinthians 15:

"But some man will say, How are the dead raised up? And with what body do they come?" (ver. 35).

This is not an interested question, but a challenge meant to prove that resurrection is impossible, and the apostle answers it as such:

"Thou fool, that which thou sowest is not quickened except it die" (ver. 36).

What a devastating reply! We may point out all the reasons why resurrection is "impossible," but after all is said and done, we are still surrounded by overwhelming evidence that it is a fact. Every blade of grass, every ear of corn, every beautiful flower bears witness to the fact of resurrection.

Yes, Christ is alive from the dead, and "able to save them unto the uttermost that come unto God by Him . . ." (Heb. 7:25).
