
Due to the extremely dry conditions at the present time, Foard County residents are cautioned by the fire department to use extreme caution in burning trash and weeds.

FRIDAY IS DEADLINE FOR DIVERTED ACRES

Friday, May 15, is the final date to dispose of small grains such as wheat, barley, oats or rye on diverted acreage, reminds Mrs. Jean Reeder, office manager of the Foard County ASCS. However, oats or rye may be left standing on diverted acres provided a written request is filed with the county committee prior to May 15, Mrs. Reeder said.

Complete figures on wheat acreage and the number of acres disposed of on diverted acreage should be available shortly after the deadline Friday.

Bank Deposits at Crowell State Bank Over \$4 Million

Deposits in the Crowell State Bank at the close of business on April 30, showed over a quarter of a million dollar gain over the same time last year. Deposits on April 30, 1970, were \$4,035,385.53, while on April 30, 1969, deposits were \$3,754,377.83—an increase of \$281,007.70.

Deposits are down over \$200,000 since the last bank call which was on December 31, 1969.

Loans made by the bank are up from \$2,095,249.97 at the end of 1969 to \$2,854,082.87 on April 30.

A comparison of bank statements shows that savings deposits have grown from \$663,532.31 on April 18, 1968, to \$1,382,242.04 on April 30 this year.

Deposits are up \$1,072,406.14 over April 18, 1968, when they totaled \$2,962,979.39.

Sixty-one members of the Farm-
ers Co-Operative Elevator Associ-
ation attended the annual mem-
bership meeting held last Satur-
day afternoon at the community
center. President Kenneth Halbert
presided over the meeting during
which Roy Steele, Cecil Carroll
and Halbert were elected to new
three-year terms on the board.
Hold-over directors are A. V. Mc-
Combs, Dwight Campbell, C. T.
Hord and Glyndon Johnson.

Halbert urged all farmers to
accurately report their wheat yield
on their farm questionnaires they
will receive soon. He said that a
19.3 average was reported for this
county in 1969, which he said was
actually less than the average
made in the county.

Bob Booth, Producers Grain
Corporation representative from
Amarillo, in his talk, said that
"there is too much wheat and too
much grain sorghum." In a recent
tour he made in Europe, Booth
cited the many artificial barriers
set up by the European Common
Market to slow the importing of
American wheat. He said that
France, which sells most of the
wheat in Europe, had a good wheat
year.

On the high protein wheat mar-
ket, the Russians, Canadians and
Australians all beat out the Ameri-
can grain. He stated that the lar-
gest buyer of wheat in the world
last year bought 85 per cent of
all wheat exported by Russia. The
principal factor was that Russian
wheat cost less. PGC is trying to
make it attractive for foreign
buyers to buy their grain from
Gulf Coast ports.

Predicting on the current year
Booth said there is a shortage of
hopper cars for moving of the
grain. This is further complicat-
ed by a government order to ship
corn from the Midwest to the Gulf
Coast which will tie up many hop-
per cars, just as wheat harvest is
getting underway.



Held for 14- to 16-Year-Old Boys

TRACTOR TRAINING SCHOOL HELD HERE

A special program for training of youth for exemption from the hazardous agricultural occupation law was held Tuesday and Wednesday, May 5 and 6, in the Vocational Agriculture building at the Crowell High School, according to information furnished the News by Marvin Myers, Vocational Agriculture teacher, and County Agent Joe Burkett.

Forty-five youths received a total of 14 hours training each in tractor safety, maintenance, and operation.

This special training program was provided for and in accordance with the U. S. Department of Labor Agricultural and Child Labor requirements under the Fair Labor Standards Act as amended January 7, 1970.

Henry O'Neal, agricultural engineer with the A&M Extension Service, was in charge of the school. Bud McLain, Herman Collier, Myers and Burkett served as instructors along with O'Neal.

Others finishing but who will not be awarded their certificates until they are 14 years old are Steve Graves, Brad Booker and Daniel Lee Johnson. Three other local youths, already 16 or over, took the course as a refresher, but it was not necessary to award a certificate to them, due to their age.

Myers and Burkett have expressed their appreciation to Bud McLain and McLain Farm Equipment for furnishing tractors and other needs for the school; also to Felix Taylor and the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation for their cooperation and help; to Henry Black and the Crowell Schools for their cooperation and help; and Miss Helen Fincher, H. D. Agent, for her help. Without the help and cooperation of all these, this program would not have been possible, Burkett and Myers said.

Any farmer desiring to hire one of these boys must request and keep in their files the employer's copy of the boy's exemption certificate.

Per Capita Support for School Districts Is Increased

The State Board of Education on May 4 increased the per capita support for local school districts from \$114.40 to \$117.65 for each student. The lower rate had been based on estimates made in July, 1969.

Action came after the board received a revised estimate from State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert showing \$280 million available for distribution to districts for the 1969-70 school year ending August 31.

The new rate is based on average daily attendance of 2,387,519 students in 1968-69. The 1969-70 school year is the first in which per capita support has reflected average daily attendance. Previously, a scholastic census was used.

Calvert's revised estimate of income from the Available School Fund showed an opening cash balance of \$14 million added to receipts of \$295 million. The Omnibus Tax Fund brought in almost \$133 million. Other major sources of income were the motor fuel tax, \$78 million; ad valorem tax, \$45 million; and interest and securities, \$34 million. Unexpended balances, store and exemption licenses, and other revenue completed the balance.

The total of \$280 million available for apportionment came after a \$10 million deduction of prior year payments, transfer of \$17 million to the textbook fund, and a cost of \$300,000 for handling bond transactions.

Foard-Hardeman Outreach Center to Be Opened in Quanah

The Foard-Hardeman County outreach service center, to be located in a residence at the corner of Sixth and King streets in Quanah, will open in June.

The residence will be converted into office space and community meeting rooms to serve the activities planned for the center.

Plans call for a full-time director and clerical worker and a part-time psychiatrist, psychologist, psychiatric social worker and a chaplain from the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center in Vernon.

Capitol Precautions

Tighter security measures may be ordered for the historic state capitol—always wide open to visitors—in the wake of a violent anti-war demonstration there last week.

Three 82-year-old etched glass door panels were smashed when a mob of 200 obscenity-shouting youths stormed through the rotunda. A tear gas grenade was tossed into the north corridor as police chased the demonstrators back through the building and on to the University of Texas campus.

Twice within the next two days, the capitol was evacuated due to telephone bomb threats. Riot-equipped Department of Public Safety officers took up stations inside or patrolled the grounds as demonstrations continued on the UT campus.

Gov. Preston Smith said damage and disrespect may force tougher security, though the capitol has been the scene of many undisturbed peaceful demonstrations in the past.

Interest Reduction of Land Bank Loans

C. L. Glazener, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Vernon, received word last week that The Federal Land Bank of Houston has reduced the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 8 1/2 per cent.

The variable rate loan plan, which was introduced by the Houston bank last July, lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. In large measure, therefore, the rate in any specific year will reflect the changes in the price which the bank must pay for the money it makes available for farm mortgage loans.

"Recent improvements in the money market have made this reduction possible," Mr. Glazener stated.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term real estate loans on farm and ranch lands throughout Texas. On January 1 of this year, the bank had slightly over one-half billion dollars in volume of loans outstanding. The local association makes and services loans in Wilbarger, Foard and Hardeman counties.
