Crowell Swimming Pool Now Open

Filtering System Replaced This Year

The Crowell Municipal Swimming pool opened for the summer season early this week with Gordon Erwin again serving as manager. Mr. Erwin has been manager of the local pool ever since its construction back in the mid-50's.

Mr. Erwin will be assisted by Miss Rita Coffey as a lifeguard. She is a senior Red Cross lifesaver.

Season tickets are available at \$10.00 each for both adults and children. Daily rates are 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for children.

For the first time since the pool was constructed, the filtering material of the system has been completely replaced. The filtering system is about 9 feet deep. The pool was painted last week and filling of the pool with water got underway last Thursday morning.

Melvin Dishman, City water department employee, said it takes almost 24 hours to fill the pool and when the filtering system and pool are filled and ready to go, about 250,000 gallons will have been used to fill them.

County Receives Moisture During Past Week

Most Expected from Lockett District

Prospects for an increase in the enrollment of students in the Crowell School System have been brighter during the past few weeks by possible transfer of students from neighboring districts.

Supt. Larry Jones said last week that possibly as many as 43 students of the old Lockett District will be transferring to the Crowell system. The Lockett district is now a part of the Vernon district.

In addition to these, Mr. Jones said the school is anticipating that at least seven students will be transferring to Crowell from the Gilliland district.

Foard County will be out of people in another twenty years if the decline in population during the past ten years continues at its present rate, according to preliminary figures released last week by the Bureau of the Census.

Foard County has lost a third of the population as reported in the 1960 census.

The preliminary figure for the county's population for 1970 is 2,072 which is down 1,053 from the 3,125 reported in 1960.

Neighboring counties also showed similar losses, but the drop in this county is more apparent because of the smaller population. Vernon was reported as down by 937 and Hardeman County reported a loss of 1,626, down to 6,649 from the 1960 count of 8,275.

Richard R. Newton of Wichita Falls, who was in charge of the 1970 census count in this area, said last week that the Census Bureau will commence in the fall to publish official population figures for all areas in the United States—states, counties, cities, towns and villages.

The district manager expressed his own and the Census Bureau's thanks to the residents of this area, to officials, and the newspaper for their cooperation in the taking of Census '70 here.

April sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares amounting to \$756.00 in Foard County were reported this week by the Treasury Department. January-April sales totaled \$4,277.00—6 per cent of the 1970 goal of \$70,000.00.

Texas sales during the month were \$15,725,617—and year-to-date purchases totaled \$62,584,024—34.7 per cent of the 1970 goal of \$179.9 million.

Cotton Fertilizer Demonstration Established Northeast of Margaret

A cotton fertilizer demonstration has been established in Foard County by County Agent Joe Burkett, in cooperation with Dr. Jim Mulkey, Superintendent of the Chillicothe Experiment Station.

It is located on J. E. Ingle's farm northeast of Margaret. Eleven different rates and combinations of nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium fertilizers were used in the demonstration. Each of these rates and combinations were repeated four times in the demonstration.

The fertilizer was put down pre-plant May 18. The demonstration was seeded to Lankart 57 on May 20.

Later in the year, these plots will be marked, showing the different rates and combinations of fertilizer used, so the cotton farmers and others interested can observe them. When the cotton is harvested, the yield will be figured for each rate and combination of fertilizer and the results made

Drownings Claim 78 So Far This Year

Boating accidents and wandering children have accounted for many of the 78 drownings in Texas since January 1, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

"People keep making the same old mistakes and paying for them with their lives," said George Cook, director of water safety services for the Department.

"They ignore wind warnings on the lakes and on the Gulf. They either don't have life preservers, or they don't wear them. They pay no attention to load specifications for their boats, and the result is tragedy," according to Cook.

Apartment swimming pools, private pools and irrigation ditches have claimed the lives of several small children recently. "Wherever there is a body of water, parents should keep a tight rein on their children," said Cook.

"Children are naturally attracted to water, and all too often they topple in."

Cook cited two recent instances in which small children toddled off from their families during picnics and drowned in nearby waters.

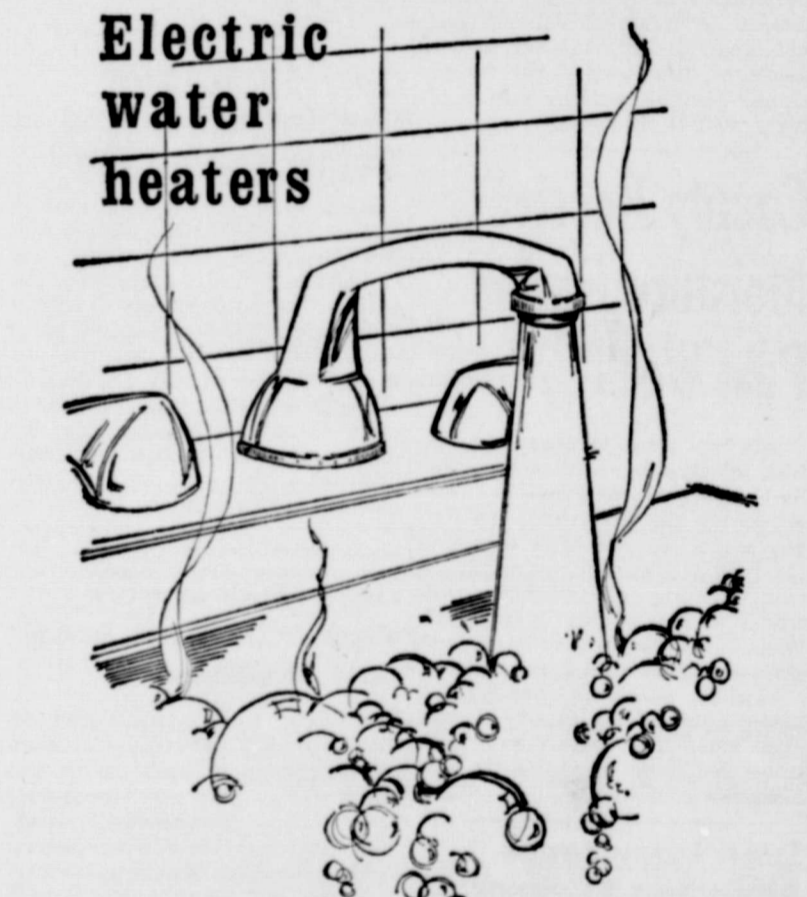

Farmer-Consumer Relations

CONSUMER'S BEST FRIEND IS THE FARMER

The consumer's best friend is the farmer. He has supplied them with an abundance of high quality food and in great variety and at bargain prices, says W. E. Black, economist in marketing and policy for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

During the last decade, food prices rose less than three-fourths as much as other consumer goods due primarily to farmer efficiency, explains the economist. The American farmer is producing over 20 per cent more on 6 per cent fewer acres than he did 10 years ago. One farm worker now supplies food and fiber for 45 persons or twice the rate of a decade ago.

Consumer income increases exceeded food expenditure rises, leaving families extra money to buy other things, Black says. The average family in 1969 spent less than \$1 out of each \$6 to feed the family. No other country approaches this record. Rising incomes enabled consumers to buy more food services even though services increased the food bill.

Prices for food away from home have increased much more than food served at home. In the last decade prices of restaurant meals climbed 50 per cent, he notes. Rising incomes also let us indulge our tastes for preferred foods, and our good friend, the farmer, has shifted his production

Friday, May 29

In the 8 o'clock game, Farmers

tee was told by its staff chief, Dr. June Hyer, that bills before Congress would increase state spending for medical care of needy by \$252 million to \$293 million during the next 2 1/2 years.

Welfare Commissioner Burton Hackney said assistance programs can be maintained at present levels until July 1, 1971, only if the Legislature boosts welfare appropriations to a ceiling of \$80 million in January. Hackney also saw a chance of getting \$8 million in emergency funds through rejiggering procedures for purchasing medicines.

INSURANCE HEARING SLATED—State Board of Insurance announced investment income of insurance companies writing auto coverage in Texas and its effect on rates will be the major subject of a special hearing on July 14-15.

Main hearing on statewide automobile rates is tentatively set for August 17. Board promised study and review of the entire rating formula.

AG RULES—Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin slapped down Texas Water Development Board's plan to commit itself to the purchase of political subdivision bonds in the future, subject to availability of the funds at marketable interest rates.

At the same time, Martin held constitutional a 1969 statute authorizing at authorizing political subdivisions to purchase water development board bonds and sell them at a discount. Opinion put the Board out of water project aid business for the time being.

Martin also upheld the constitutionality of the new destination franchise tax on out-of-state firms selling products in Texas, but said it can't be collected on strictly-mail order businesses.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that: —County judge cannot grant misdemeanor probation to anyone who has received probationary sentence during the preceding five-year period.

—In a county having only a single jail facility, it must be at the county seat.

—County commissioners, by unanimous consent, may allow temporary flooding of a county road if a suitable alternate route is provided.

—State Board of Health may not by rules expand the amount of equipment to be carried by ambulance, but may define minimum contents of first-aid kits.

—Purchases under \$2,000 may be subsequently ratified at the county commissioners meeting.

—Board of Examiners in Fitting and Dispensing of Hearing Aids can require recording of aid serial numbers on the bill of sale. Any person who can pass the exam or qualifies under the "grandfather clause" or reciprocity provisions is entitled to a license to fit and dispense hearing aids.

—When conviction or indictment is set aside, accused regains his civil rights (to vote and serve on juries) but may not truthfully state in job application he has never been "convicted" of felony.

Committee also put up \$6,000 to hire graduate students to compile inventory of major archeological land sites in Texas. Inventory would enable sites to be nominated to National Register of Historic Places and gain some protection from future destruction.

Wendorf, meanwhile, issued a new statement telling amateur treasure hunters, collectors and beachcombers not to think the Committee is spoiling their fun.

Committee permits are required to dig on state or public land. But activities on private lands are covered only where property is declared a State archeological landmark, and so far none has been so identified.

SCHOOLS ARE TROUBLED—Spokesmen for large, small and medium-sized school districts told a special study committee they face dire financial problems.

Big city districts urged a more-equitable formula for dispensing state aid.

"Small districts have twice as much taxable wealth per student and receive 13 per cent more state aid per student," said Dr. Marvin H. Berkeley, Dallas Independent School District President.

Eighteen-member committee headed by veteran Sen. A. M. Aikin in Jr. of Paris was authorized by the last Legislature to study the financial relationship between state and local districts and examine structure of current economic index for schools. In its first session, the committee heard financial woes of Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, New Braunfels and Lumberton school districts.

PURPOSE OF LAW

American families are shocked on occasion by advertisements which they find offensive or believe to be morally harmful to their children. While in most cases the ads are not legally obscene and are therefore available, they are clearly unwelcome in many homes. This law gives families the right to decide they want no more mail from a firm sending out what they consider pandering advertising, but it does not deny others the right to an unrestricted flow of material which is available.

With the major share of the so-called pandering advertising coming from a small number of dealers, many of whom exchange mailing lists, it is believed that the patron's request will provide substantial relief to those who do not want such material.

HOW THE LAW WORKS

Families receiving advertising through the mail which they believe is pandering can ask a postmaster to direct that the promoter send no more mail, of any kind, to them. The sender is also ordered to remove the family's name from any mailing lists he owns, controls or rents. If a family moves and it wishes to continue the order at the

new address, it is necessary to furnish the new address to the postmaster who issued the order.

ENFORCING THE LAW

The Post Office Department and the Department of Justice are required by the law to follow several specific steps in carrying out a family's request that it receive no more mail from a firm mailing what they believe is pandering advertising.

—When the patron's request is properly submitted the Post Office Department sends a "prohibitory order" directing the sender to refrain from any further mailing of any kind to the complaining patron. This is effective 30 days after sender's receipt of the order.

—The patron must bring any violation of the order to the attention of the postmaster who issued the order, enclosing all evidentiary matter, such as the second mailing and its envelope.

—If the mailer still fails to respect the order, and the Department finds that it is being violated, the Postmaster General will ask the Attorney General to apply for a Federal Court order directing compliance. Failure to observe the court's order may be punishable by a fine or imprisonment.

A family receiving a pandering advertisement which it finds offensive has authority under a new Federal law¹ to ask that its members receive no more mail of any kind from the sender. An advertisement is considered pandering if it offers to sell material which is, in the opinion of the recipient, "erotically arousing or sexually provocative." The material can be in the form of a display, classified, or editorial-style advertisement.

The individual mail patron is the sole judge of whether an advertisement is offensive to him. If you or your family finds the material offered is of a pandering nature, complete the statement on the back page of this leaflet in asking a postmaster to curb the receipt of additional mail from the sender. Children under 19 years of age residing in your house can be listed in the request by name and age.

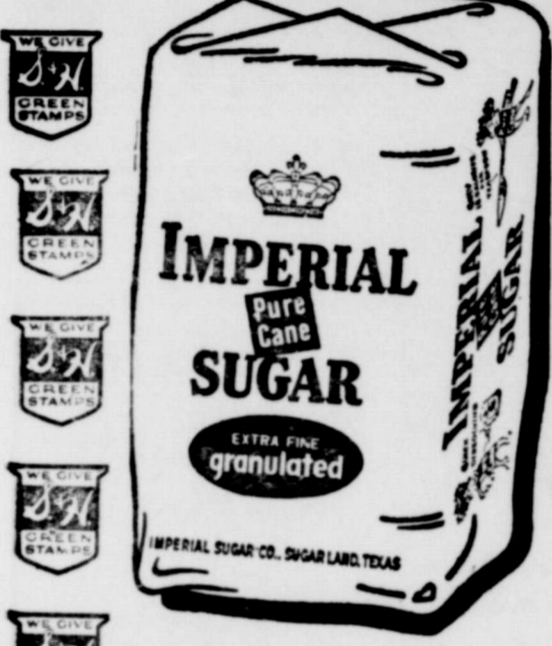

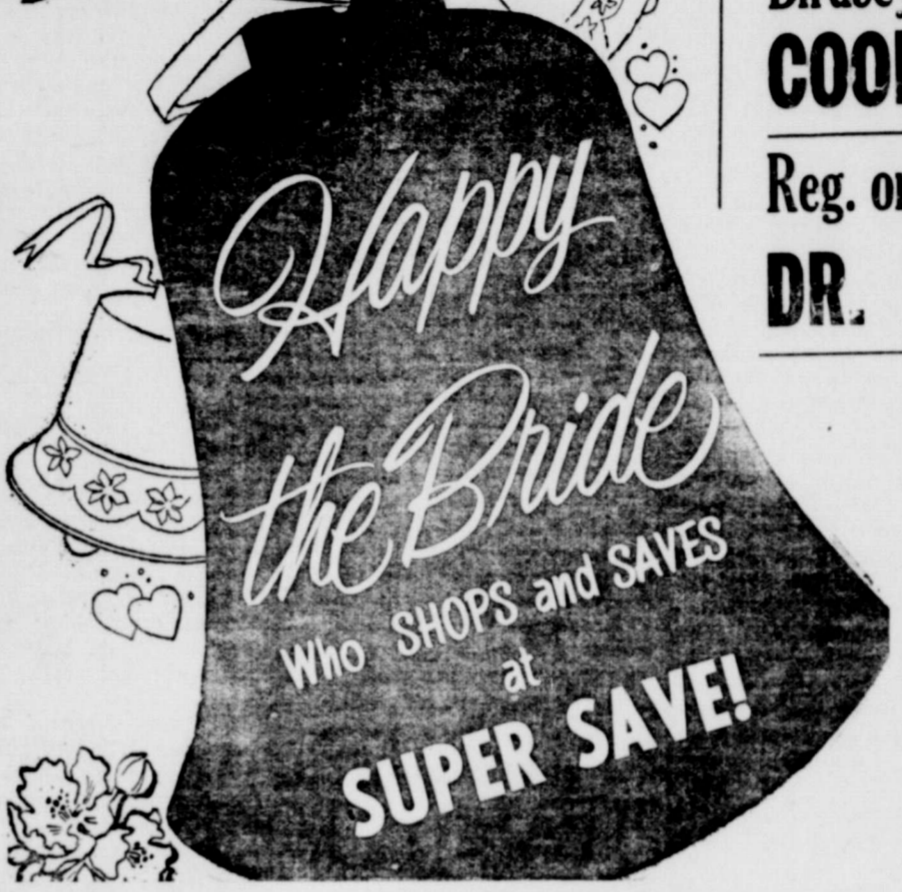

Roger Keith Dennis to Continue Studies at Princeton, N. J.

Roger Keith Dennis, son of Mr.
and Mrs. Fred Dennis of Quanah,
former residents of Foard Coun-
ty, received the degree of Doctor
of Philosophy in the field of math-
ematics from Rice University in
Houston last week. He is the
grandson of the late B. T. Meason
of Crowell, and is a nephew of
Mrs. Lawrence Glover of Crowell.

The title of his dissertation was
"Presentations for the Elementary
Group and the Functor K2."

Exercises were held inside the
Rice gymnasium due to inclement
weather. The commencement ad-
dress was given by Dr. T. Harry
Williams, Professor of History at
Louisiana State University. Dr.
Williams won the Pulitzer Prize
early in May with his biography
of Huey Long.

Dr. Dennis, a 1962 graduate of
Quanah High School, received his
B. A. degree from Rice University
in 1966 and has been in graduate
school there since that time re-
ceiving various grants during his
four years of study. He has taught
in the university during this time,
also.

Dr. Dennis has received an ap-
pointment in the School of Mathe-
matics for Advanced Study in
Princeton, New Jersey, as assis-
tant to Professor Milnor for the
academic year 1970-71.

Members admitted to this in-
stitute already hold the highest
degree in their field and receive
no degrees while there. There is
no formal course of study, the
aim being the free pursuit of ad-
vanced learning. In many ways,
the institute operates like a re-
search institute, but its purposes
are broader and welcomes tem-
porary members.

Possibly the most famous per-
son associated with Princeton In-
stitute was Albert Einstein, who
was a professor there from the
middle 30's until his death in
1955.

Dr. Dennis is married to the
former Petty Onderdonk of Hous-
ton. Mrs. Dennis is a 1968 graduate
of Rice University and has taught
in Houston Public Schools. At
present, she is employed by the
Rice University Library in the
German department. She will ac-
company Dr. Dennis to New Jer-
sey and will enroll in Rutgers
University in New Brunswick, N.
J., where she will be taking ad-
vanced work in library science.

The couple will remain in Hous-
ton until the latter part of August
and will visit his parents in Quan-
ah and relatives here in Crowell
before going to New Jersey.

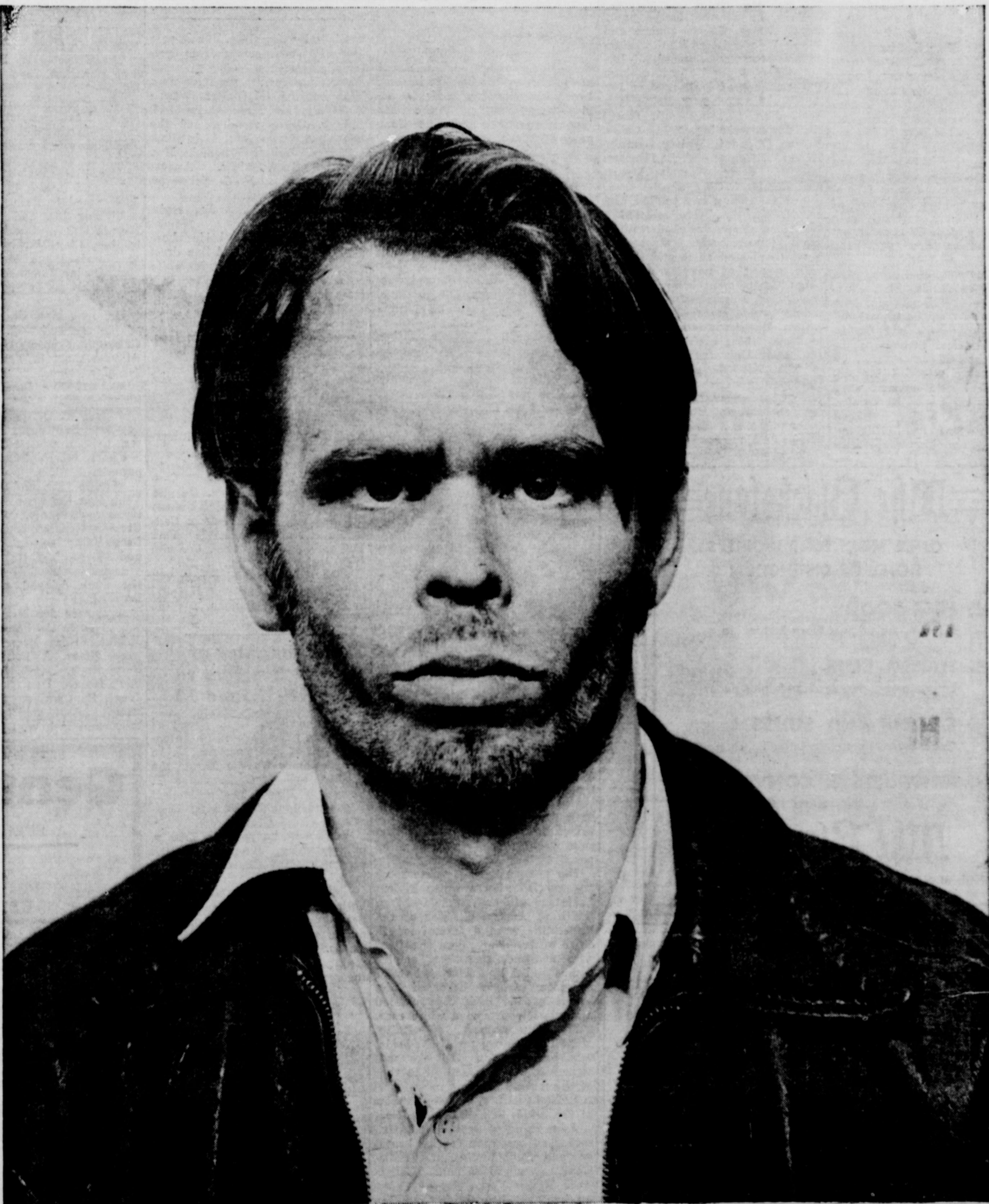

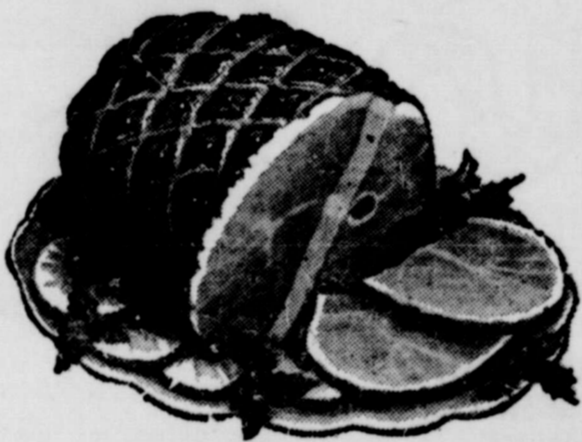

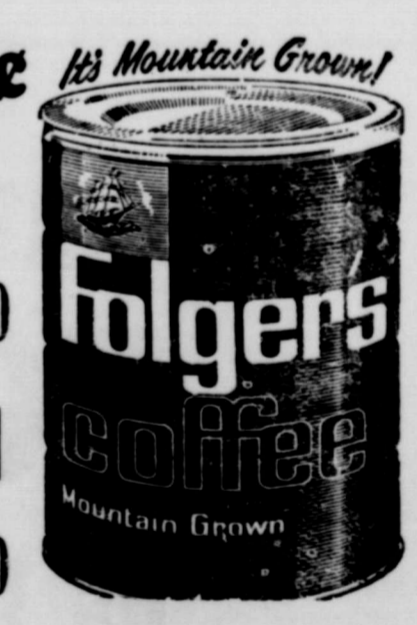
